## TEXAS GUARD GETS SOME FACILITIES AT NORTH CAMP HOOD

WASHINGTON, March 28—Facilities at Camp Hood not used by the army will be made available to the Texas National Guard, Representative W. R. Poage of Waco has been informed by War Department authorities.

Camp Hood has become the permanent home of the 2nd Armored Division, but the division will occupy the more permanent type of barracks and other installations at the south camp, Poage has been told.

This will leave the installations at the north camp available to the National Guard. Coryell County officials have been promised that all permanent installations at the north end, including utilities and storage buildings, will be kept intact, Poage said.

It was understood by Poage that Texas National Guard no longer has possession of the camp at Palacios, long used for summer encampments.

Reports have reached Texas Congressman that the army is now moving equipment from Camp Bowie to Camp Hood. Camp Bowie is now on a temporary inactive

## HOOD TO OBSERVE ARMY DAY WITH DISPLAY

CAMP HOOD, Mar. 26—A full-scale display of the kind of gun and military equipment that carried the United States to victory in the war will be exhibited by Camp Hood units in Temple, Belton Lampasas and Gatesville for Army Day April 6.

Representative weapons and service equipment used by soldier during the war will be the feature of the exhibits, with all display manned by informed soldiers to explain their uses to Army Day visitors.

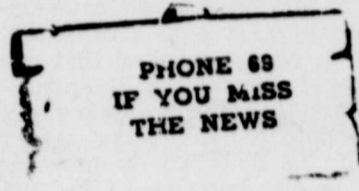
The exhibit will include the famous 155 mm gun Long Tom which carried the weight of our artillery in Europe and the Pacific, small arms carried and used by most soldiers; displays of quartermaster articles and action types; treadway bridge constructed by engineers, a bulldozer and other heavy duty engineer equipment, chaplains field facilities; a chemical warfare demonstration and a mobile hospital unit. Along with each exhibit will be a model troop bivouac and an army recruiting booth.

The Hood exhibits will represent some of the combined service and ground force units in camp and give local residents a close view of how the Army fights, handles supplies, cares for the health of soldiers and attends to the religious needs of all faiths.

### PROGRAM TO BUILD F-TO-M HWYS IN TEXAS

MEXIA, Texas, April 4 (AP)—John Reddit, Texas Highway Commission Chairman, has outlined a broad program designed to build up Texas' farm-to-market roads over the next ten years.

Described at a pay-as-you-go proposition, Reddit told 150 members of Groesbeck and Mexia Chamber of Commerce that about 25,000 miles of road will be built.

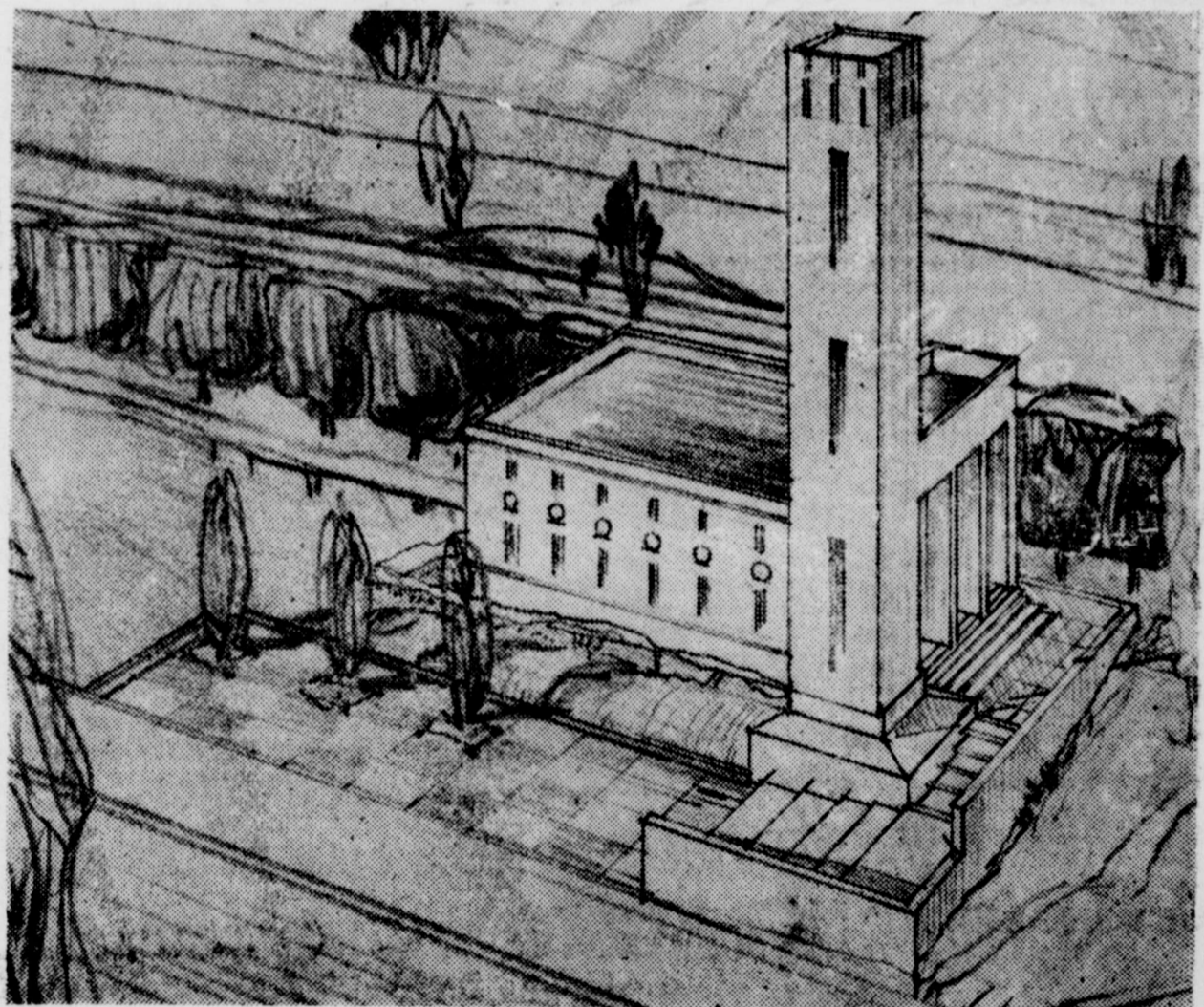
### CITY ELECTION DRAWS CROWD OF "75": NO PLATFORM

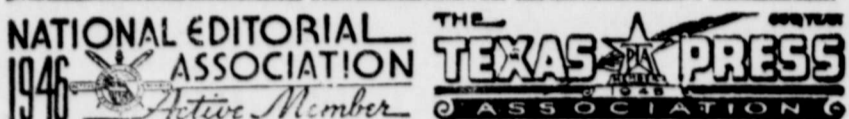

**WASHINGTON NEWS**  
FROM OUR CONGRESSMAN  
**W. R. POAGE**

March 29, 1946.

Dear Friends:  
On July 4, 1946, the Philippine Islands are to become independent. For almost half a century they have, as an American territory, enjoyed a favorable trade situation with the United States. In fact, almost four-fifths of their trade has been with us. It has long been recognized that it would be most difficult for these people to adjust themselves to our high tariffs. Their situation has been made even more difficult as a result of the complete destruction of their economy by the Japs. Today the House passed a bill to provide for a gradual transition whereby it is hoped that the Philippine Republic will be able to function. I felt that this consideration was necessary, and I realize that it will doubtless be necessary for us to do even more to aid these people. We must not forget that though their country was brutally ravaged by war and their great cities were destroyed

(largely by American guns and American bombs as we sought to dislodge the Japs) that the Filipino people never swerved in their loyalty to us.

I have had so many letters recently protesting against the atomic bomb experiment which the Navy propose to hold that I feel that it should be again pointed out that: (1) No one knows just what an atomic bomb will do to naval vessels or how it will affect different types of naval vessels. (It may be that an atomic bomb will not sink a modern warship unless it scores a direct hit). (2) Until these things are known it is impossible to know what kind of new naval vessels we should build and yet we are proposing to spend five billion dollars building new ships. (This test might save us that entire sum.) (3) The ships that are to be used in the test do include some modern and some expensive ships, but to be of value the test must be against modern, not wooden sailing vessels. (Be-

sides every one of the ships to be used would be retired from service anyway, just as we are replacing B-17's, which were built at great cost two years ago.) Surely our country must retain the lead that we have acquired in scientific knowledge. We must know. We cannot afford to risk the lives of our boys and the very existence of our country to guess as to what this bomb will do.

The Agriculture Committee has spent this week hearing the cattle growers, the packers, and the butchers tell of the difficulty they have had with OPA. Their story is very similar to that of the lumber people, the grain men, and dozens of others. It seems plain that the OPA is making the difficult problem of price control even more difficult by refusing to use common sense or reason. We all know that as long as we do not have adequate supply of goods and have a large demand backed up with lots of money that prices are bound to go up and so long as it is impossible to produce the needed goods because of war we need some control on prices. We still have some very severe shortages but OPA insists on price control on many commodities of which we certainly have an adequate supply, and in many cases, as in the case of lumber, it is argued that OPA keeps the ceiling so low that people can't afford to produce except for the black market.

It is a most difficult problem, but it is one of tremendous importance. I believe that we should try to prevent uncontrolled inflation, but we simply must recognize that when we allowed industrial wages to go up that prices had to follow. The OPA recognized this when they allowed steel to go up. Now it is inevitable that other prices are going up, and the wages of other groups are going up (and as I see it, all other groups are entitled to the same consideration.) This means that the wages of Federal workers must go up, and I am sure they will. It also means that school teachers and local employees are entitled to similar treatment, but it is going to be most difficult for them to get commensurate raise. It also means that common justice requires that our farmers get more for their products as this is the farmer's wage. The Senate has just taken a long step in this direction by adopting the Russell Amendment to the wage and hour bill now before that body. This should help to keep a fair relationship between the income of various groups, but it is now crystal clear that the basic fight for price control was lost when the House turned down the amendment to the original Price Control Act, which I supported, to freeze all prices, and all wages at the beginning of the war. Today we simply must recognize that the entire price and wage level has gone up. This is bound to work hardships. We must try to see that everyone is treated as nearly alike as possible.

Sgt. Herschell T. Wilhelm of Ames, son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Wilhelm is in the U. S. Marine Corps, and is holder of the Silver Star. Here is the citation received for the action in which he received this prized award:

"DECORATED. Ex-Marine Sergeant Herschel T. Wilhelm of Ames, Texas, who fearlessly di-



rected the fire of a flame thrower tank against strong Jap positions on Okinawa while exposed to the enemy's fire, recently was awarded the Silver Star Medal for his bravery. The Texas Marine, son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Wilhelm, Ames, was directing fire from his own tank with radio when the radio failed. He then left his own tank and "with utter disregard for his own personal safety", mounted the flame thrower tank, continuing to direct fire while personally exposed to the enemy. The citation accompanying the Medal credited Wilhelm with outstanding devotion to duty at a critical time". Official Marine Corps Photo.

S-1c Charles Wise of Gatesville, son of Mrs. Ruth Wise is in the Navy and was last stationed at San Francisco. He trained at San Diego and was then assigned to a transport and he has made numerous trips to China and Japan. His ship the USS Bexar was scheduled to take part in the atom bomb test and is now being fitted in San Francisco. His is one of 32 vessels which will accompany the carrier Saratoga to Bikini atoll, but not for destruction. They will haul supplies and assist in the test—



naturally, from a long distance. Part of their cargo will consist of sheep, goats and pigs, which will be left on certain ships to test the effect of probable radiation on crews of ships subject to an atomic attack.

CM 3-c King Huddleston of Jonesboro, who's wife is Mrs. Freda Huddleston is in the U. S. Navy. He trained at San Diego,



and holds the European and Asiatic campaign Ribbons. He was discharged September 18, 1943, and during his "cruise" traveled aboard ship to all parts of South America. He now lives in Corsicana.

T-5 Mono Pruitt, of Turnersville, was in the U. S. Army and is holder of the Bronze Star. He successfully drew his platoon from enemy fire by manning a vehicular machine gun, as shown by the fol-

Technician Pruitt's exemplary courage, aggressive spirit, and devotion to duty reflect credit on himself and the armed forces.

Overseas since April 19, 1945, Lindley is now serving with the 27th Ordnance Company. A veteran of one campaign he wears the Asiatic-Pacific Theater Ribbon with one campaign star for Luzon, the Philippine Liberation Ribbon with one star, Good Conduct Medal Unit Citation with one gold star, and the World War II Victory Ribbon.

As a civilian, Lindley attended the Gatesville School, and later was employed by Wyatt C. Hedric, Fort Worth, Texas, as a civil engineer. He entered the Army November 1, 1944. After discharge, he plans to return to his old job.

## FAS Now Has Money Congress Kicked In: Get It, 3rd Floor

The Farm Security Administration, which recently ran out of money, has been given an additional appropriation by Congress and is once again ready to help needy

World War II veterans and other Coryell County farmers with loans for crop and livestock operations. County Supervisor, Wilburn H. Denham said today that he is making loans for livestock, equipment, feed, seed, fertilizer, and other things needed for farmers to make their crop and improve living conditions.

At the present time loan funds are restricted to ex-servicemen and farmers not previously served by FSA. "We have no authority to make loans to 'old borrowers' or farmers who have previously borrowed from FSA but haven't received their loan this year." Veterans are given preference, but other farmers and stockmen

may receive them. Veterans and other farmers are urged to call at the office immediately, as loan funds are still not ample and may be exhausted before all those needing them can be taken care of. The FSA makes loans only to those who cannot obtain suitable financing from other sources.

Offices are located at Gatesville on the third floor of the County Courthouse.

## WASHINGTON : GIs Booming The Cast

WASHINGTON — The Army's own investigation of the so-called "military caste" system might well be the source of some of the greatest changes in officer-enlisted man relationship in 160-odd years. The very hush-hush hearings already are under way. It probably will be mid-May or later before a report is made public. Secretary of war Patterson's appointment of the investigating board was quite a surprise. Even more surprising was its membership. Headed by Lt. Gen James H. Doolittle, all six of the members are reservists. Not one West Point man in the carload. However, there already are complaints. One is that the board is officer-packed. This is a little ridiculous. All six were at one time enlisted men. Two of the members were discharged as sergeants. They are former T-Sgt. Jake Lindsay, who won the congressional medal of honor in the infantry and now works for the Veterans Administration at Lex-

ington, Mass.; and former Sgt. Meryll Frost, of Hanover, N. H., who was a bombardier in the Air Forces and was badly wounded in Italy. He is now a vice-president of the Air Force Association. THE other four are former officers, but they all came up the traditional hard way—through the ranks. Other than Gen Doolittle, they are: former paratroop Capt. Adna H. Underhill, Freeville, N. Y., now employed by the N. Y. State Conservation Department; Lieut. Col. Robert Neville, formerly with Stars and Stripes in the Mediterranean theater, and one of the chief critics of the caste system; and former Lt. Gen Troy H. Middleton, hero of the North African and Sicilian campaigns and now comptroller general of Louisiana State University. Arguing that he wanted no possible charge of regular army influence levelled against the board, Gen. Doolittle insisted that the hearings be held at some other

place than the Pentagon Building. All of the hearings are "executive"—which means that the press is barred. Gen. Doolittle's contention is that better results will be obtained from informal discussions, without putting witnesses on the spot through fear that their testimony will make tomorrow's headlines. THE committee doesn't plan to concentrate on adverse criticism of the military caste system. Some persons who approve of the present officer-enlisted man relationship will be called. Civilians and Red Cross workers who served with GIs in the field also will be asked to state their views. During the revolution Gen. George Washington called on Baron Von Steuben to give some semblance of organization to the hodge-podge Continental Army. There has been little change since then of that Prussian general's concept of relationship between officers and enlisted men.

en, locating a party who is away from home when sudden illness arises, getting in touch with a doctor who is not in his office and countless other difficult feats are performed regularly by telephone operators.

Many "career" fields are comparatively crowded today, especially those termed "glamour" fields. But, at the present time, there is an actual need for more telephone operators. This condition is undoubtedly due to the fact that the industry is expanding rapidly now that war-time restrictions have been lifted.

The basic requirements for a telephone operator—normal intelligence, good health, friendly of telephone operators through the years which followed has won for the women the acknowledged right to this particular phase of telephone work.

During the war and in peace times when disaster strikes communities or individuals, "hello girls" have rendered service for beyond the call of duty. Rallying immediate aid when floods threaten—disposition—are the same now as they were when the first "hello girl" began work in 1878, according to Bill Bamburg of the Gulf States Telephone Company. But today's operators find working conditions a tremendous improvement over those of the early days of the industry. The first "hello girls", who lived in Jersey City, reached work in Manhattan by taking a horse-car, the ferry, another horse-car and then walking up six-flights to the office where she worked ten hours a day.
