MRS. D. W. STANSELL DIED NEAR LIBERTY AT AGE OF 102

One of the oldest pioneer citizens in Texas died May 1, 1946. She was Mrs. D. W. Stansell of Liberty Community. Had she lived until September, she would have been 103 years of age.

After a lingering illness of some two months, she died at 6:40 p. m. May 1, 1946. She just went to sleep as calmly and serenely as she had lived for so many years.

Mary Elmore S. Mansell was born September 26, 1843 in Franklin county, Alabama. She was married to David Wilson Stansell December 28, 1861 at Russellville, Alabama.

They came to Texas in May 1901 and after living two years at San Marcos, they came to Hamilton county.

To this union, eleven children were born, nine of them preceding Mrs. Stansell in death. Those living are Mervin Stansell, 68, Russellville, Ala., Mrs. Emma Rose, 70, of Santa Anna, Calif., and David Stansell, 74 of Alford, Texas.

Her living descendants number over 250 people. They are scattered all over the world.

At an early age, she became an active member of the church and her long years of christian service has inspired and blessed multitudes.

Funeral services were held at the Live Oak Cemetery Tabernacle by her pastor, Rev. Cotton and a very close friend, Rev. Len Dalton.

Pallbearers were: E. B. Hedgpeth, Ocran Moore, A. L. McFadden, Fred Hartgraves, J. B. Jones, and W. T. Perryman.

The immense funeral cortege, and the great banks of lovely floral offerings were silent manifestations of the love and esteem hundreds had for this noble soldier of the Cross.

J. W. Tyson, Sr., lived only a few hours after suffering a stroke last Wednesday. He died at 6:40 a. m. May 2, 1946, at the advanced age of 92.

He was born in Alabama June 20, 1854. His family moved to Tennessee while he was young. As he grew up he developed an uncontrollable urge to come to the frontier of Texas. When his family could no longer restrain this desire, they decided to sell their holdings and come with the youth rather than for him to come alone. It was in 1873 that their wagon train arrived at Gatesville.

He married Francis Jane Hedypeth, October, 1878. To this union was born four children, only one, Elbert Tyson, survives. Other survivors are his three sisters, one of them, Dr. Blanche Lewis of Comanche was able to be with him during his last hours.

In 1925 he joined the Primitive Baptist Church at Sardas.

Funeral services were conducted by Rev. Len Dalton at the Live Oak Cemetery tabernacle, May 3, 1946 at 10:30 a. m. He was laid to rest in Live Oak Cemetery.

DEFICIT FINANCING

You hear a lot about deficit financing, which according to our idea, means spending more than you make. We've done that, too.

Now this deficit financing is practiced by the government, and the government supervises the Federal Reserve System which in turn supervises all members of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation. So, by logic, the banks should agree with deficit financing, because their superiors in Washington do that kind of financing.

Now, we hoped the local banks would believe in this "deficit financing", but, in our case, we found, they'd rather have black ink on our ledger sheet in the bank accounts, than red ink.

The other morning, ours had "red". And, it was pretty red, but the red was not "pretty" to the bank, the personnel of which had one of those "I've got you on my hip" grins as we walked in "to cover up" and did.

Now, if deficit banking is good for Paul, we don't know why it isn't good for Silas, but if any of you other Silases think the government'll allow you to do deficit financing on your own at your "Member F. D. I. C." bank, don't fool yourself. Rather firmly, they'll inform you, it's black ink they're after, not red, or even "pink". Just solid midnight black.

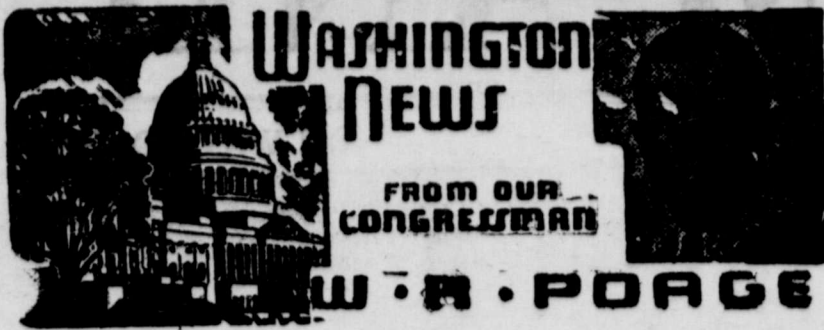

Dear Friends:

After a week in Central Texas I returned to find a great accumulation of mail in the office. Some people have the idea that Congressmen never bother to read their mail, but I always try to read every letter, I also read all the local papers from our district. Just the reading takes lots of time, and as you know many of the letters require lots of contacts and other letters in behalf of the friends who write to us. I know that you will realize that it is physically impossible for any one person to personally handle every detail of this office, but I do try to see to it that I personally know about as much as possible of the business of the office.

Helping me I have some of the best assistants from Central Texas. Three of these are regular clerks in my office and are paid for this service by the government. They are Mr. Lacey C. Sharp, of Bell County; Miss Iva Earl Heath, of Cameron, Milam County, and Miss Ernestine Green of Rosebud, Falls County. In addition to our regular staff we have two young men who are

just back from the service. They are regularly employed in the Congressional Post Office, but they each help out in our office in an effective manner. They are Captain Neal Grimland of Clifton, Bosque County, and Sergeant Robert Cross, of Gatesville, Coryell County.

While Mrs. Poage is not and never has been on the office payroll she works here much of the time. It is only with the help of everyone connected with the office that we are able to begin to keep up with the problems presented by our constituents, but we all welcome the opportunity to do all we can to serve the people of the 11th District.

While in Texas last week, I was again reminded of the fact (which I always try to keep in mind) that a Congressman has many important duties which are not at all legislative in character. Among such duties is helping in every possible way to assist in the development of his district. We have been very fortunate in Central Texas. Among the projects that have recently been successfully consummated are:

(1) The Whitney dam which will greatly benefit Bosque, McLennan, and Falls Counties. (2) The establishment of Camp Hood as a permanent installation which will particularly benefit Bell County. (3) The use by the Veterans Administration of beds at McCloskey Hospital which will mean much to Bell County. (4) The retention of Headquarters of the Veterans Administration at Waco, which will aid that city and serve veterans all over the district. (5) The transfer of C. C. C. camp buildings to the Hamilton-Coryell County Soil Conservation District, providing headquarters for that service in Gatesville. (6) The transfer of similar buildings for public purposes in Waco, Temple, and Bartlett—thus providing

homes for the American Legion. (7) The retention of the disciplinary barracks at Gatesville. (8) The transfer of military structures for veterans housing at Waco and Clifton and the construction of a number of permanent dwelling units for military personnel at Killeen.

Among the most important projects now pending and which seem assured for our District are:

(1) The Miller Springs Dam on the Leon at Belton, which will mean so much to all of the little river bottoms in Milam and Bell Counties. (2) The vast extension of R. E. A. facilities all over the District. (3) The erection of a government hospital at Marlin which has been unreasonably delayed, but for which I still have high hopes. (4) The addition of two buildings to the Veterans Hospital at Waco. (5) The construction of a Regional Office building for the Veterans Administration in downtown Waco. (6) The use of a large portion of McCloskey Hospital at Temple as headquarters for various agricultural agencies. (7) The survey and development of the Leon and Bosque Valleys by the Flood Control Division of the Soil Conservation Service giving up stream flood control to Coryell, Bosque, McLennan, and Bell Counties. (8) The transformation of the Bluebonnet Ordnance Works into a branch of the Texas A. & M. College with extensive experimental and demonstrative areas.

Of course there are other current projects of interest to our people, but the above list will give an idea of the importance and the varied character of the efforts of a Congressional Office in behalf of the material welfare of a District.

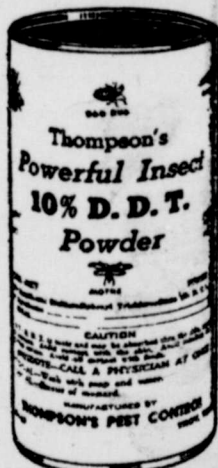

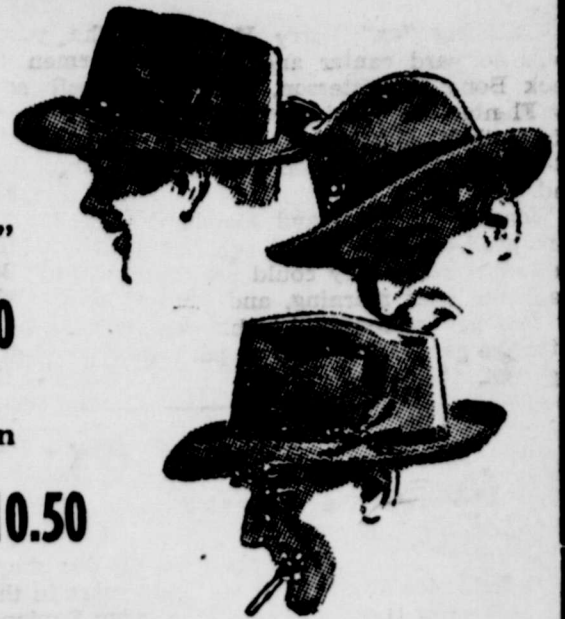

NEW YORK — Judy Holiday, the Star of "Born Yesterday," which is the biggest hit on Broadway and, according to the man himself, Max Gordon's biggest hit in his prosperous career as a Broadway producer, is a young lady of great ability, solid good sense, some pretty high-flying ideals and a rather good idea of just where she stands in the theater.

She has for instance, just finished a play. And how is it?

"It stinks" she told me the other evening. "I'm going to tear it up. About all I have are a couple of good characters."

This uninhibited, honest attitude toward her own shortcomings is quite typical of Judy's entire approach to her recent success. The result is that most persons who have seen the play can't quite see how anyone other than Judy could do the part any better.

Judy was mentioned in a magazine piece the other day by George Jean Nathan, who noted that

Judy is the sort of gal men like but women don't. I mentioned this situation to her, and she immediately said it wasn't so.

"I WISH it were true," she said "but the very opposite is the truth. I can feel it at matinees, when the audience is almost entirely women. If you can find any way of reversing the matter I'd be glad to try it."

I tried my best to assure her that while I know nothing about women's attitude on the subject at hand, I do know my own and the attitude of a few male friends all of whom think Judy is a terrific little gal with a lithe figure and a great deal of whatever it was press agents once tried to describe as "Oomph."

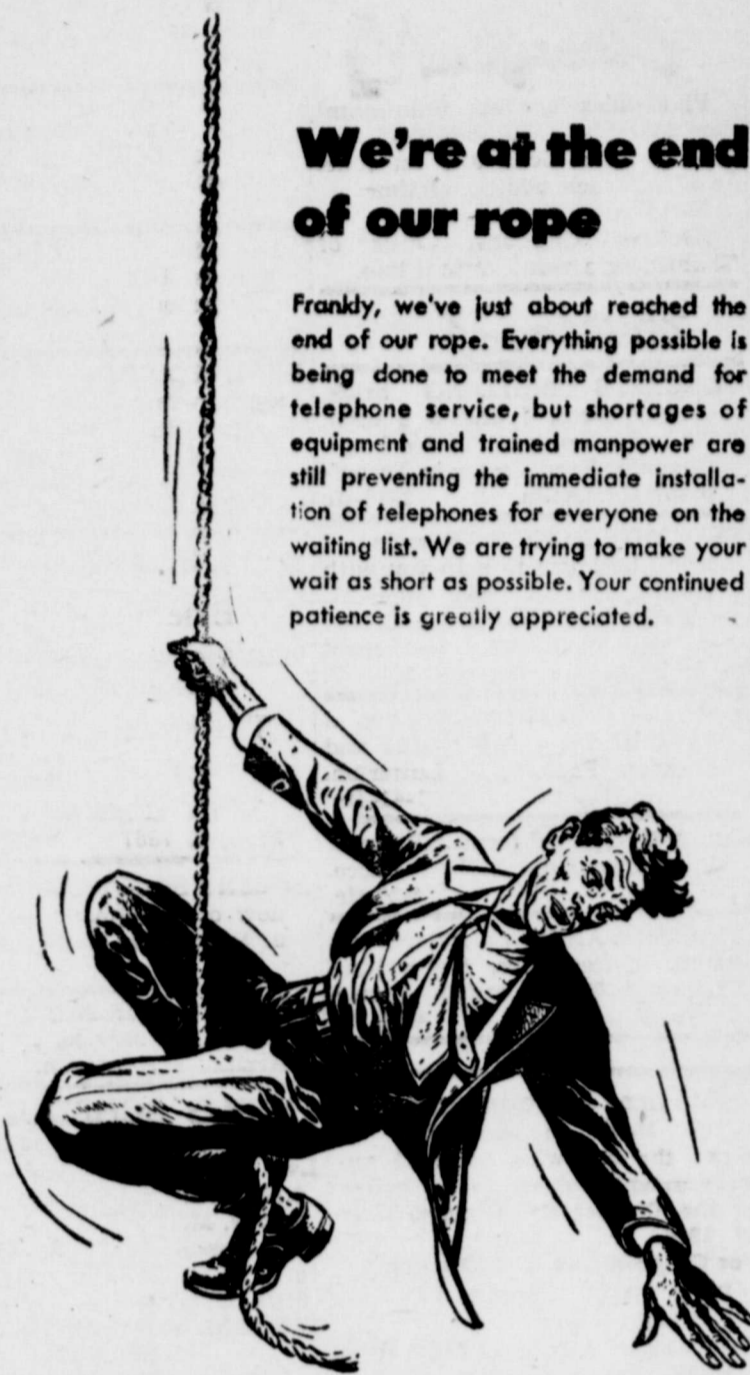

WASHINGTON :

WASHINGTON — "If I had to pick one of the so-called doubtful Congressional districts that the Republicans are certain to win in November, I couldn't do it; and don't let anybody in the Democratic camp tell you he could either.

This was an honest statement, off the record of course, from a man close to the G. O. P. top cam-close personal friend—as politicians often are—of a political enemy equally close to the Democratic strategists.

I come this near to violation of a confidence only because I want to emphasize how close veterans on the political front feel the elections will be this fall—the

elections which will determine if the House retains its narrow Democratic margin or goes Republican.

ANYBODY who has paid the slightest attention to elections knows that no candidate ever admits defeat in advance. It's politically axiomatic that confidence breeds votes.

Nevertheless, bigwigs in both parties know that the balance of power in November could well swing the other way.

Since the administration's legislative program already is bogged down by varying coalitions of Republicans and Democratic fence jumpers, it's fair to ask "What difference will it make?"

Politicians will brush the question off as stupid. It is and it isn't. From a legislative standpoint, the administration could hardly have fared worse even if the Republicans had been in control of the House this past year.

But outside of that, the difference would be tremendous.

In the first place, never in the history of our Congress has the anti-administration party captured control of the House in a Congressional election year but what it hasn't captured the White House two years later.

IN THE second place, the shake-up in committees would make stalling the administration legislative program elementary.

The House (and Senate, too) operates through committees. The party in power, the majority, elects its committee chairmen and has the privilege of naming a majority on the committees. The powerful Rules Committee, for example, schedules practically all legislation (tax and appropriation bills excepted). It now has eight Democrats and four Republicans. Reverse this situation and virtually any Democratic administration measure could be withheld from the calendar—even if it had cleared the hurdle of being reported favorably by the committee to which it had been assigned.

What would happen in the matter of prestige, important patronage, etc., is a story by itself. (Tomorrow: The Marginal Districts)

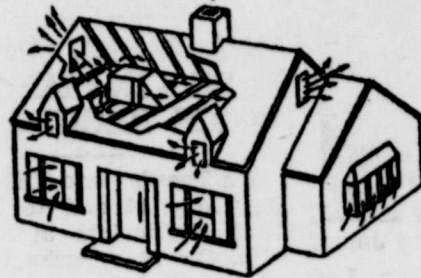
