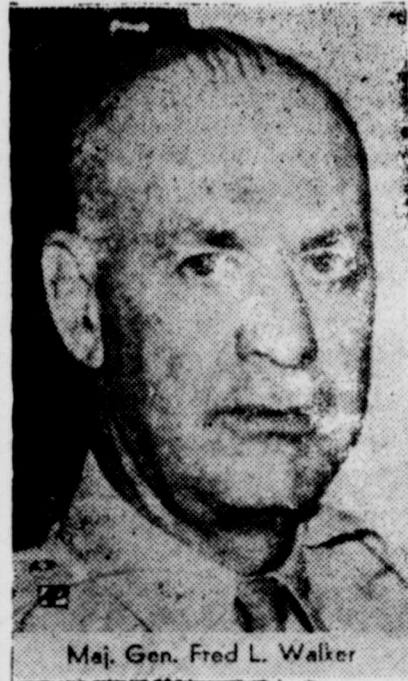

Local Men Have Conference With General Walker

of Commerce Secretary Frank Higginbotham, in company with delegations from Waco and Temple held a conference with General Fred S. Walker, Commanding Officer of the Texas National Guard in Austin, Wednesday.

The conference was regarding North Camp Hood, and its occupation, or de-occupation, or, the possibility of turning the land back to the former citizens. It seems from the conference, and from other information, that the federal government frankly intends to maintain all this land.

There is a possibility that it might be used as a Texas National Guard Camp, and as a result of this possibility, Gen. Fred S. Walker is scheduled to be here soon to look over the grounds with this in view.

Nothing definite will be known however, until he looks the situation over, and releases whatever statement he may have.

Dr. Homer P. Rainey, Wednesday at the Gatesville Lions Club said he was always asked three questions, as follows: "Were you 'fired' as president of the University of Texas? (or a reasonable facsimile); "What are you doing to make a living?, and, "ARE YOU A CANDIDATE FOR GOVERNOR?"

He answered two of them—the first two.

A representative of the News asked him point blank: "Are you going to announce as a candidate for governor?" and he said: "Can't talk politics in a church or commercial club".

Suggestion by a News reporter was: "Well, let's just go out side and have an answer". This question, or suggestion was also handled as discretely, as all the questions Dr. Homer P. Rainey handled in his talk to the Gatesville Lions Club, the subject of which was ude'atenio was "Education and Citizenship."

In this, with extreme logic, and careful choice of words, though his speech was not written, he gave Texas' position in education, health, and a number of other things that effect the economy of the state. With Texas' natural resources, no equal part of the world is as rich, but, in education, health, and ingenuity, we rank way down the ladder. He said technological education was the answer.

Dr. Rainey, college man that he is, didn't impress himself on his audience as a man with a string of degrees, both honorary and actual, but as a clear-thinking hard hitting practical man. We believe he made a very good impression on his Lion Club audience of about 100 Lions and visitors.

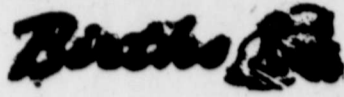
SPECIAL NOTICE TO FARMERS OF COUNTY

Producers should turn their sales receipts on all whole milk, cream and butter for the months of January, February and March in to the AAA Office by May 31st in order to receive their Dairy Production payment for this period.

Farmers who carried out practices for payment under the 1945 Agricultural Conservation Program must sign an application for payment by June 30, 1946, if they are to receive payment for these practices carried out in 1945.

Farmers having 1920 acres of

pasture land in 1946 must sign a Range Management Plan before May 31st, 1946, in order to be eligible to carry out pasture practices under the 1946 Agricultural Conservation Program.



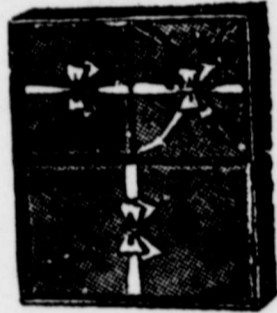

POSSUM FLATS . . . "TALK ABOUT ENERGY"

By GRAHAM HUNTER



May 10, 1946.

Dear Friends:

At the moment the House is working on the Appropriation Bill for the Department of Interior. Toward the very end of this bill there is an item of great interest to the people of the Southwest. It involves an effort that will be made to include sufficient funds to enable the Southwestern Power Authority to connect the Denison Dam with the Brazos Dams, the Colorado Dams, and with similar projects in Oklahoma, Arkansas, and Missouri. By tying all of these projects together with adequate transmission lines, it will make

them much more valuable than they can possibly be as separate projects. This is true because one dam may well have a surplus of power while another is short of power.

I believe that our people, particularly rural people, are entitled to the cheapest and the most dependable source of power that we can give them. The private utility companies, of course, oppose the construction of these lines even though they are themselves unwilling to deliver the power over their lines without various burdensome provisions in their contracts. For instance, they will announce that they will sell power

very cheaply to the R. E. A. Cooperatives but on examination the contract will often be found to contain clauses that make it impossible for the R. E. A. Cooperative to resell the power to run a gin, an alfalfa curing plant, etc. I want to see ever home in Central Texas provided with the cheapest possible electricity. Therefore, I am for the coordination of all of our public power projects.

Yesterday the House agreed to a Senate proposal to pay certain producers of building material nearly half a billion dollars as subsidies in connection with the so-called "G. I. Housing Program". I have often expressed my conviction that subsidies were unsound and were in themselves inflationary. I believe that in this case, where the money is simply to be handed out to whomever the Housing Expeditor wants to give it, it is especially dangerous. I fear that this program will give rise to some very serious charges of fraud.

While I voted to give ex-service men priority in securing the scarce supply of building material, and while I voted to provide additional funds for F. H. A. loans, I could not support this subsidy plan.

As I write this, there are many rumors of a settlement or at least of a truce in the coal strike. I do not yet know what will happen, but it seems clear that Mr. Lewis has decided that if he goes much further in his destruction of American economy that public sentiment will reach a point that will force the Senate to pass some of the labor legislation that the house has sent over there such as the Case Bill or the Hobbs Bill. The majority in the House has on several occasions passed bills to limit the power of the rufles leaders like Mr. Lewis, but the majority of the Senate has always refused to take any action. This does not apply to our Texas Senators. Now it is becoming clear to everyone that this country can never get back to normal production until the big industry strikes stop. Until that happens goods are going to remain scarce and prices are going to continue to advance. The coal strike has surely added more to the cost of living than any other factor since the close of the war. If it continues it is certain to create the most violent kind of inflation. Even if it is compromised, its evil effect will last for months and if it is followed by further strikes, there is no chance to hold any "line". We should not allow any retreat on the part of Mr. Lewis at this time to keep us from going ahead with some real effective legislation to prevent interference with those who want to produce.

On Monday, I appeared before the Senate Appropriations Committee to urge them to appropriate funds for the purchase of surplus dirt moving equipment for the Department of Agriculture. The Senators expressed great interest in this idea, and I am encouraged to feel that we now have a very good chance of getting at least some of this equipment for use in the conservation of our soils.
