Grand Jury Returns Eight Bills, Seven Were Felonies

The Grand Jury, with T. L. Conner as Foreman, and Wells Watson, as secretary, returned 8 true bills of indictment, 7 of which are felonies, after examining 61 witnesses.

In their report they say, "conditions are generally good, but there are some instances of rowdyism and vandalism, which resulted in destruction of property by unthinking people. Action is recommended.

They thanked the citizenry for cooperation, and urged its continuance, and "equality before the la wwas stressed". Also, they thanked the Judge for his charge, the officials, bailiffs, and say the jail is kept in good condition.




