WASHINGTON NEWS
FROM OUR CONGRESSMAN
W. R. POAGE

May 31, 1946.

Dear Friends:

Mr. Poage, with whose staff I have been associated since the first of the year, has given me the privilege of writing his news letter this week, so I thought perhaps you would like to hear about the joint session of Congress which took place Saturday May 25.

The joint session was to start at 4:00 p. m. Each Congressman gets but on ticket to the gallery on occasions such as this and I had Mr. Poage's ticket. Because I knew that it would be crowded I left the House Office building sometime before the appointed hour. As I walked up the hill to the Capitol I could see a great crowd of people standing along the sidewalk across the street from the historic building. They were waiting to get a glimpse of the President when his car came along. There were thirty or forty policemen keeping the crowd back on the sidewalk and also directing traffic.

Just before I reached the entrance to the Capitol a guard asked if I had a pass. I flashed it in front of him as I walked into the building, another guard asked if I had a pass. I followed the same procedure with him. If I had not had a pass I could not have even gotten near the building. On the inside there were guards all over the place—at the elevators, stairways and doors. There were so many people trying to go up on the elevators that I walked up the stairs. When I reached the gallery floor, there was a guard to tear off the stub of my ticket. At the door of the gallery there was a man from the FBI to look me over before I entered and took my seat. About five minutes until four, the Speaker, Mr. Rayburn, called the House to order. Then the doorkeeper announced the arrival of the Senate; Senator George, the presiding officer of the Senate for the day, took the chair at the right of the speaker and the members of the Senate took the seats reserved for them.

Shortly after four o'clock the doorkeeper announced "The President of the United States". The President entered escorted by a committee of Senators and Representatives. The members and the people in the gallery rose and gave him applause. He walked up on the speakers rostrum, shook hands with Mr. Rayburn and Senator George, stepped down to the microphone and commenced his speech, which you no doubt heard over the radio or read in the paper. At the point in his speech where

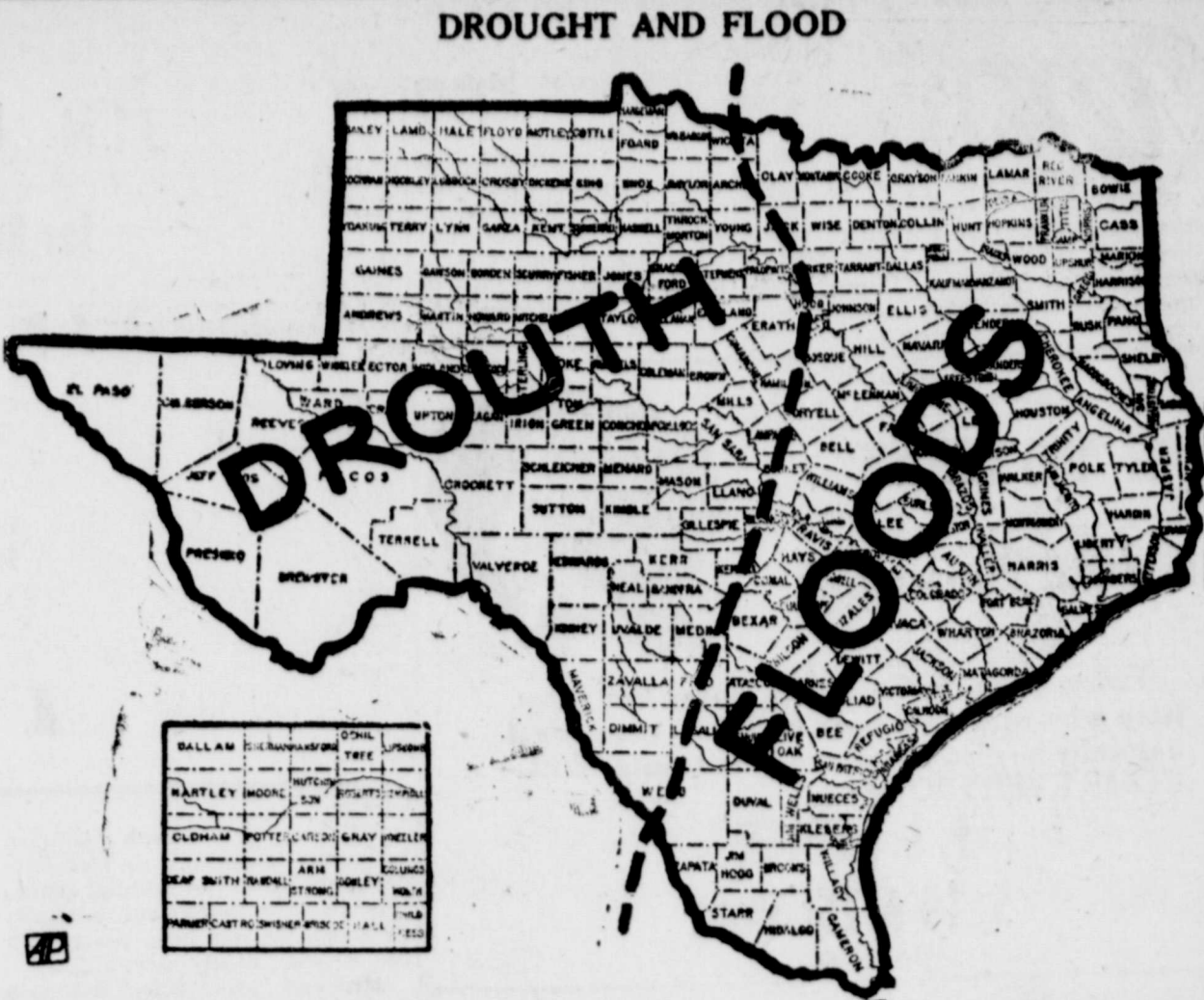

AUSTIN, June 10. (AP)—Postal authorities today are attempting to check the origin of a stink bomb mailed last week to Lieutenant Governor John Lee Smith, gubernatorial candidate.

THINK MORE GEMS HIDDEN IN GERMANY
