Leon Dam Bill To White House

The Miller Springs dam on the Leon river north of Belton, long sought by the people of Central Texas to curb devastating floods on the Leon and the Little rivers, was included in flood control legislation given final approval by congress Thursday.

The measure was sent to the White House to await President Truman's signature, the Associated Press reported.

The house and senate completed passage of the billion-dollar flood control bill Thursday as it was recommended by a joint conference committee which straightened out minor differences in previously passed versions.

The bill authorized the army engineer to proceed with planning the approved construction but does not provide any funds. Money must be appropriated in subsequent legislation.

The Miller Springs dam was included with a cost estimate of \$15,500,000. Supporters of the dam here believe that it will be 1947 before any appropriation for it can be expected.

Also included in the measure was the Whitney dam on the Brazos near Hillsboro, at \$2,000,000. The Whitney dam is part of the over-all Brazos River Conservation and Reclamation district program, as is the Miller Springs dam. — The Temple Daily Telegram.

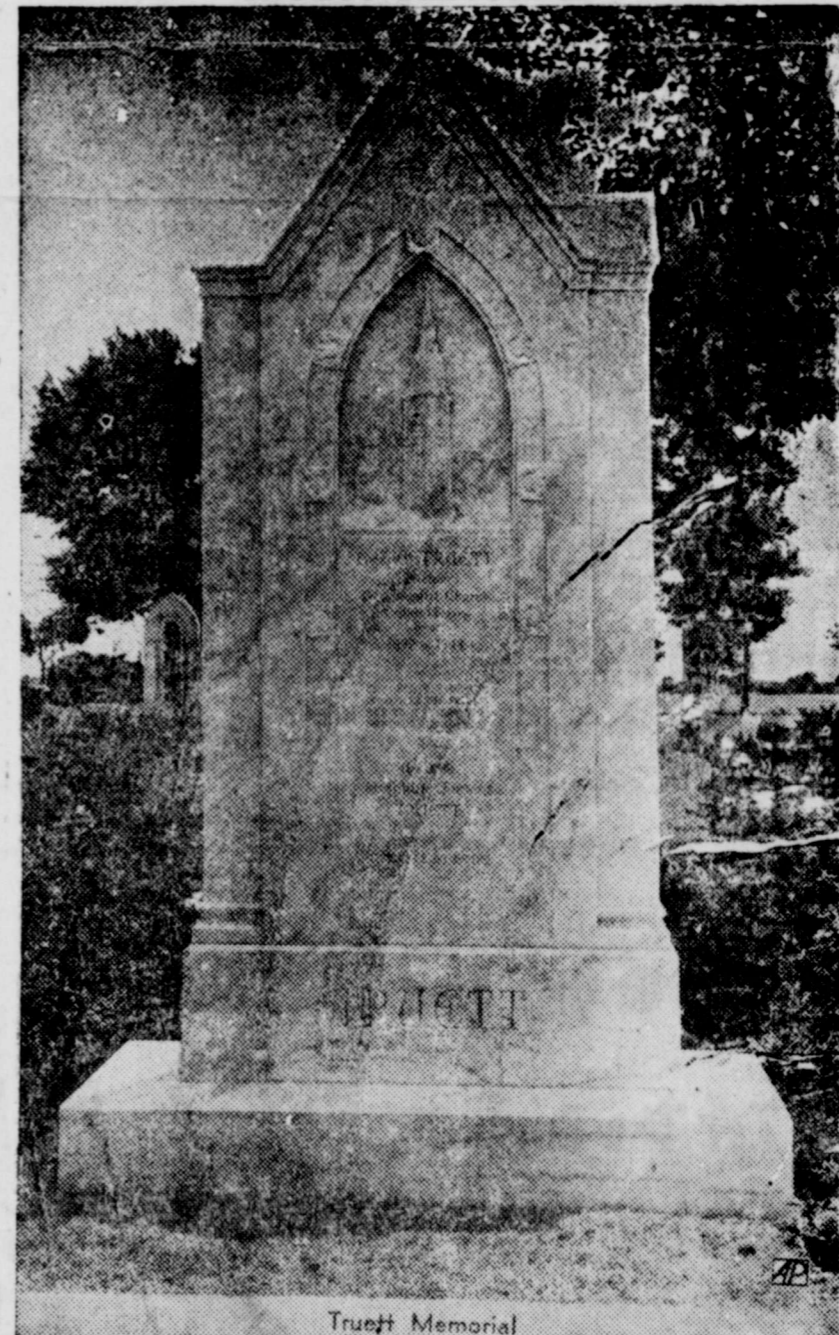
BARKLEY SAYS OPA LEGISLATION HOPED FOR

Truett Memorial

This memorial to Dr. Truett was erected at Hillcrest Memorial Park in Dallas by members of the First Baptist Church of Dallas where Dr. Truett was pastor 47 years. It is 10 feet high and weighs five tons. A likeness of the church the late pastor built into one of the largest in the world is chiseled into the Vermont white marble shaft. Beneath appear the following inscriptions: GEO. W. TRUETT, PASTOR, FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH, DALLAS, TEXAS, FROM 1897 TO 1944 . . . "MY GREATEST DESIRE IS TO HELP THE PEOPLE AND TO MAGNIFY THE MATCHLESS NAME OF CHRIST" (excerpt from one of his sermons) . . . HIS WIFE, JOSEPHINE JENKINS TRUETT . . . THEY WILL BE DONE.

It Was Tried

Soon after V-E Day, Col. Edward D. Churchill, surgical consultant of the Allied Mediterranean forces, toured six German military hospital areas and reported his findings. The report is most significant in the light of efforts to make medicine the servant of politics in America. Comments on the report are here reprinted by permission of COLLIERS, the National Weekly.

"As we all know, American doctors' care of wounded in this war has been and continues phenomenal as regards its record-breaking percentages of cures and its development of new techniques and remedies. There was considerable expectation that the German doctors would have some pretty phenomenal achievements of their own to report . . . but Colonel Churchill did not find them.

A Generation Behind
"His over-all conclusion . . . was that German handling of wounded was about 20 years behind the American procedure. Going into details, he reported that German army doctors as a rule just casually passed up badly wounded men on the assumption that they were going to die anyway, whereas our doctors fight to the last gasp for every wounded man's life, and frequently win. . . .

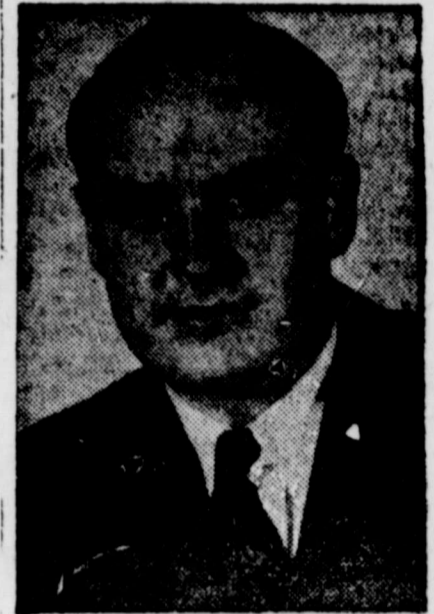
"As for professional pride in pulling off near-miracles of cure or amelioration, such pride just was not in the bulk of German military physicians and surgeons. . . . They were victims of apathy and lack of ambition which would enrage a typical American doctor. This is a sad backslide from Germany's proud position as world leader in medicine and surgery in the pre-Hitler days.

How Did It Happen?
"Are there any lessons in it for us? It began to happen soon after Hitler saddled his brand of totalitarianism on Germany. It seems reasonable to conclude that it happened because Hitler saddled Nazi totalitarianism on Germany. . . . In Nazi philosophy, your race and politics matter far more than your brains and talents.

You might be a brilliant physician or surgeon or research scientist, but if you were a Jew or an anti-Nazi of any description, you had to get out of Germany if you could. . . . go to a concentration camp if you couldn't get out. Thus Hitler and his crew decimated German science. Their master race convictions, too, led logically to . . . the use, in some concentration camps, of humans of "inferior" breed as guinea pigs for . . . laboratory experiments.

Medicine vs. Politics
"Ruled by the politicians and browbeaten by Nazi gangsters, German medicine (on the strength of Colonel Churchill's findings, at any rate) withered and, in due time, the German armed forces paid, in . . . bigger death totals than they need have suffered." Here is the sound conclusion reached by Collier's, a conclusion in which America's best doctors concur:

"The lesson in the German experience seems clear enough. . . . There is no substitute for a free, bold and inquisitive medical profession or for generously financed and expertly staffed medical research, carried on year-in and year-out. It is devotedly to be hoped that the lesson of the German medical collapse will not be lost on us."

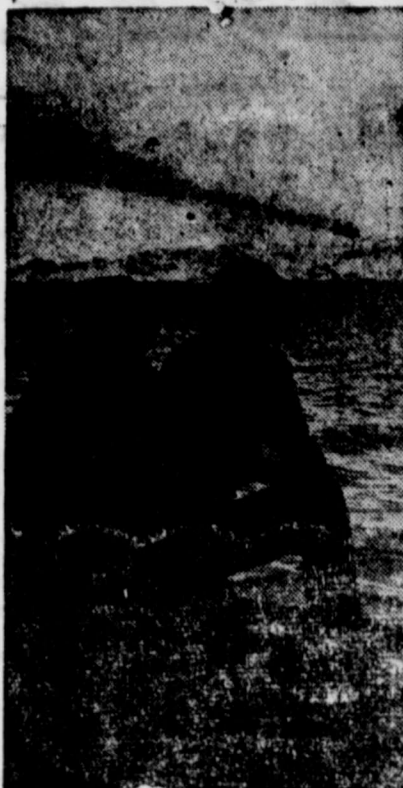

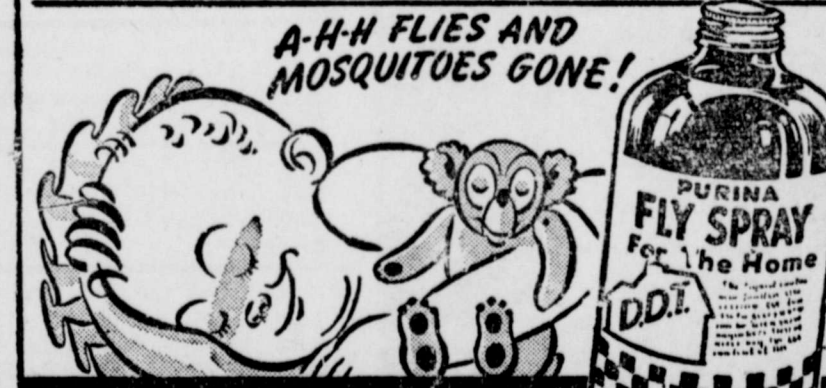

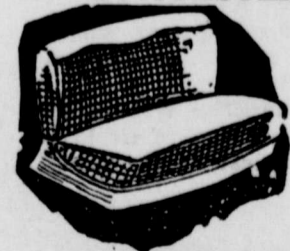

Newspaper slogans, that is. Ever notice them, usually under the name of the paper on page one? They're interesting, and give a fair idea of the community they serve.

Many emphasize their age proudly. The Dallas Morning News, for example, carried daily on page one: "Oldest business institution in Texas." It was founded at Galveston in 1842.

The Galveston News says: "Texas' oldest newspaper." It was established in 1842. The Victoria Advocate claims it is Texas' second oldest newspaper. The Advocate is in its 100th year.

The Austin Statesman carries the line: "Founded on July 26, 1871, by the Texas Democratic convention."

There are those which give an insight into their sections. Take The Athens Daily Review. It goes in for alliteration: "Athens— noted for peaches, peas, potatoes, peanuts, pigs, pottery, poultry and petroleum." On an inside page, under the headline, it says "Athens always advancing."

Others are: Palestine Daily-Herald—"home of hospitality"; Fort Worth Star-Telegram—"where the

West begins"; Lubbock Morning Avalanche—"starts the day on the South Paines"; Dawson County Courier (Lamesa)—"Where Texans are Texans"; The Kilgore News Herald—"The capitol of the world's largest oil field"; Borger Daily Herald—"The carbon black center of the world"; The Valley Evening Monitor (McAllen)—"Serving the richest agricultural county in America"; Amarillo Globe—"The hub of the great plains empire."

The Houston Post says "Every morning since 1885," The Brownsville Herald "Serving the Rio Grande Valley for over 50 years" and The Beaumont Enterprise "Your home newspaper for 65 years."

The Midland Reporter says: "The best investment for your advertising dollar."

The Pampa News says it pictorially—A neat little drawing depicts: (1) oil wells, (2) wheat, (3) sunshine and (4) the Associated Press logo-type.

The newspapers slogans have flavor of Texas. Take, for example, The Coryell County News (Gatesville) which right on page one, under the name, says bluntly "Fustest with the mostest." —The Texas Press Messenger.
