There's a limit to how far home wiring will "stretch," just as there's a limit to how far a bathing suit will stretch.

If the wiring in the walls of a home is too small, it chokes down the flow of rent to lights and appliances. Lights on when the refrigerator starts up or the iron is in use. Heating appliances come up to temperature slowly, taking longer to do their jobs and wasting cur-

If there are not enough branch circuits and outlets, it necessitates resorting to unsightly tangles of extension cords or disconnecting one appliance to plug in another. Circuits become overloaded, cauting wires to heat up dangerously or . ... blow out.


