Aviation: Working toward an all weather runway, and trying to get teal mats for this from Uncle Sam, so that freight and passenger lines may land here, and working to get CAA approval and a GI training program.

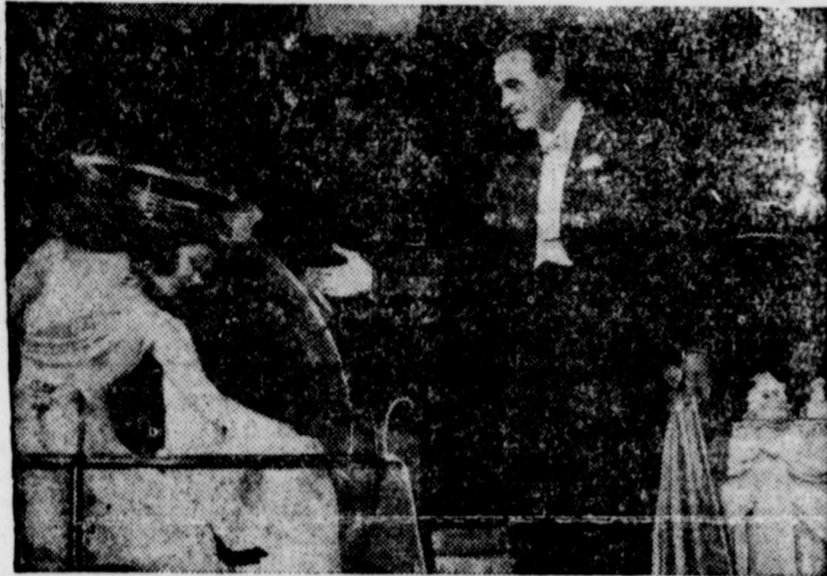
In his study, the Bishop pondered the batting averages of certain National League members of the decade who were not doing well, and awaited Don, who was taking him to the ball game that afternoon.
