PLANE PROTECTION IN YUGOSLAVIA PLANNED

WASHINGTON, Aug. 22. (AP)—Fighter protection for American transport planes on Austrian-Italian route skirting Yugoslavia was under consideration today as a showdown between U. S. and Yugoslavia involving world peace machinery drew closer, top diplomatic authorities said.

PATTERSON FLIES TO CONFER WITH TITO

BELGRADE, Aug. 22. (AP)—OOU. S. Ambassador Richard C. Patterson flew to Bled today to confer with Premier Marshal Tito, carrying a copy of the American 48-hour ultimatum demanding release of occupants of transports shot down by Yugoslav fighters.

WAA STOPS TRANSFER OF PROPERTY

WASHINGTON, Aug. 22. (AP)—The War Assets Administration today halted the proposed transfer of 53 surplus camps and war plants to educational institutions pending a Congressional inquiry into such "gifts".

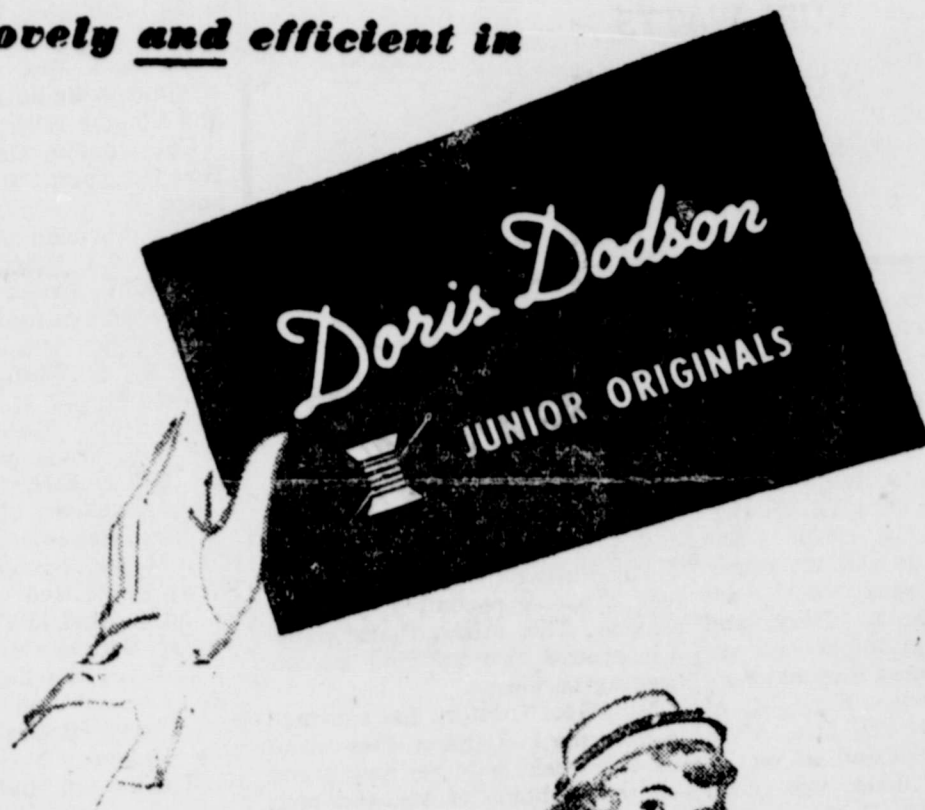

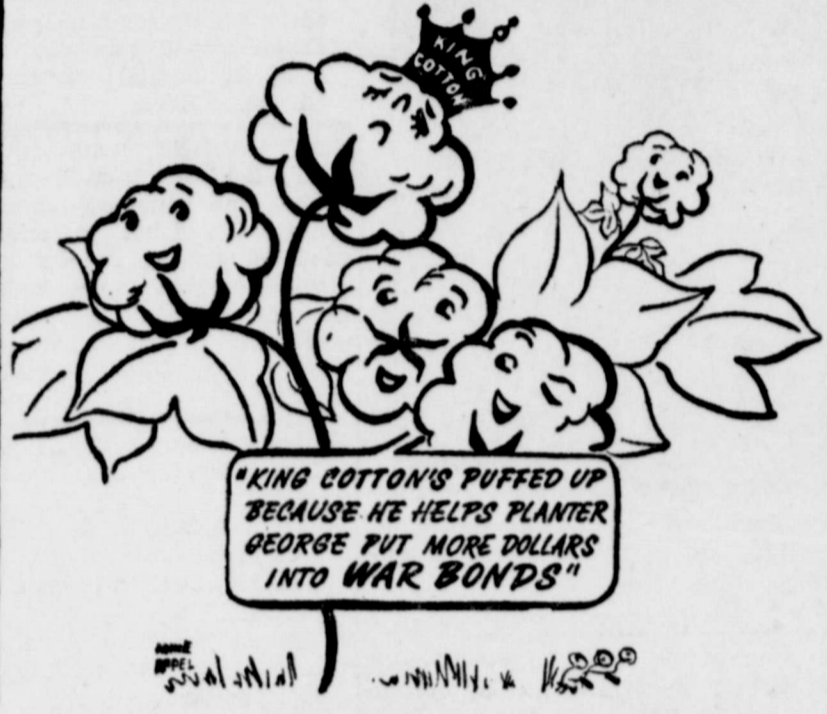

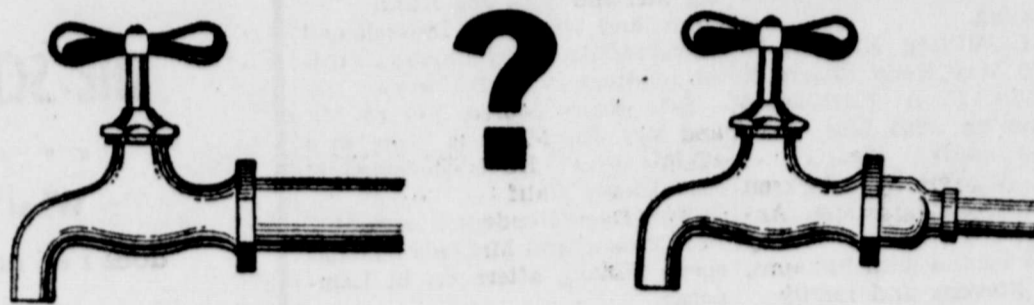
"Well, Don..." she murmured. "He said our hands didn't match..." Don said.

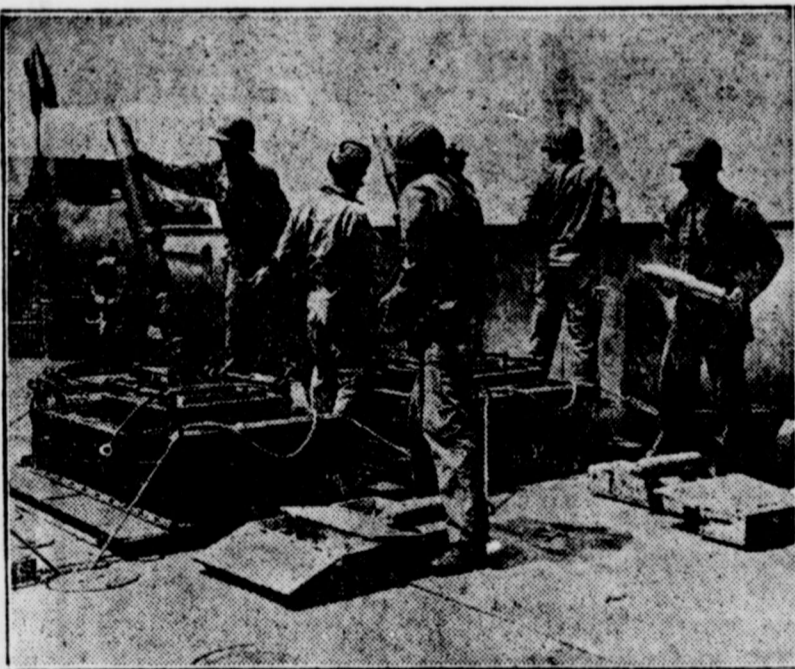

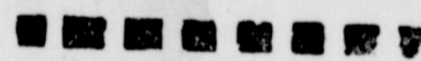

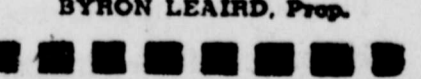
