S/Sgt. E. L. White, of the U. S. Marine Corps will be at the Post Office from 8 to 4:30 this week in the interest of the U. S. Marines.

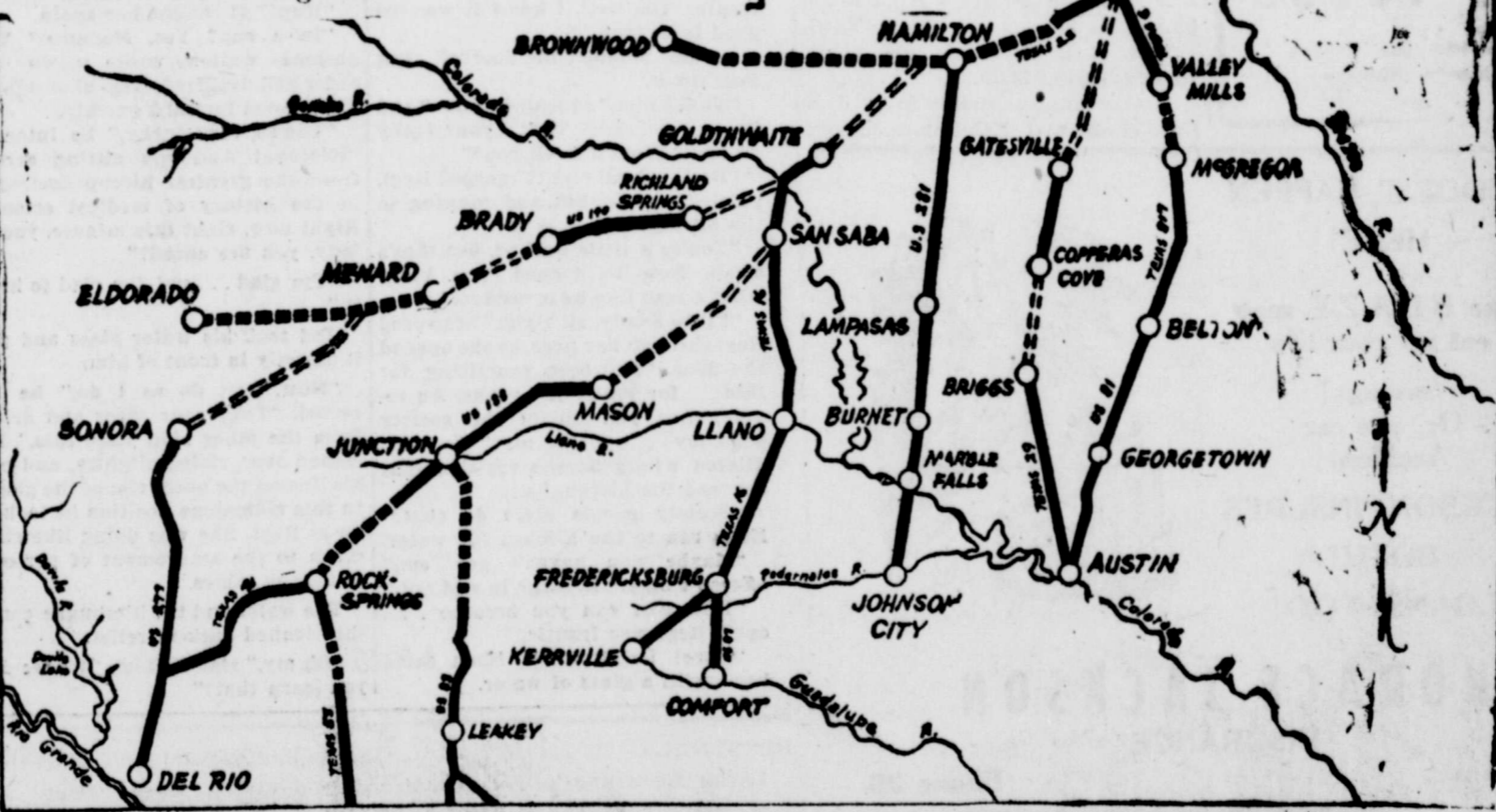

## Veterans Drawing Disability Compensation May Enter Vocational School

Under the new contract disabled veterans may now enroll in the Coryell County Vocational School and participate in the full benefits of Part VII, Public Law 16. Prior to the new contract disabled veterans could only enroll under Part VIII, Public Law 346, which does not allow as many benefits to veterans who are drawing disability compensation; however, the veteran must have the consent of the Veterans Administration to make this change.

The Coryell County Vocational School is a public school organized for the benefit of World War II veterans under the provisions of the GI Bill of Rights. It is non-profit institution directed by the Coryell County Board and Mr. Ollie Little, County School Superintendent, and it is now under the supervision of the State Board of Vocational Education. The Coryell County Vocational School is now offering training in Distributive Education. In the field of Distributive Education Courses in Book-keeping, Typing, Business Arithmetic and Retailing are being offered. In Trades and Industrial Education Courses in Electronics (radio repair and servicing, and general electrical wiring), Carpentry and Automobile Mechanics.

In order to attend these classes a student may attend 12½ hours per week provided he is employed in a field related to the course he is taking, or he may choose to attend 25 hours per week and take a course not related to his field of occupation.

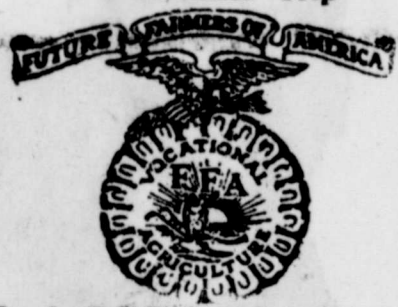

## With The FFA Boys On Summer Trip

Special (Delayed) to the Coryell County News:

These FFA boys have been taking me so fast I hardly had time to report.

We have slept under from one to two quilts each night. The coldest night was spent at Ft. Davis, Tex. Jack Bone and Erbie Necessary built a camp fire the next morning to thaw the bunch out.

We took a twelve mile boat ride at Corpus Christi where E. C. Bauman led the crowd in fish caught. Altogether the boys caught about 50 pounds. We iced them and had them cooked at Premont, Texas.

It was here we saw burning flames of gas, 10 or 15 feet high. We asked why the waste. I passed it off as a controversial political problem.

We next visited at the King Ranch where we saw three year old, grass fed fat steers recognized as a cross between the shorthorn and Brahma.

Next, we visited the citrus fruit orchards in the Winter Garden District at Carrizo Springs. We slept in their football field. Bertram Davis called signals. Ed McClarty and I scored two touchdowns a piece—Ed snoring and mine, slumbering.

Then to Del Rio, we journeyed to laundry our underwear. Here we barely escaped a sad tragedy—Joe Daniel almost got married.

Mr. Kirby, Vo-Ag man at Del Rio gave us a royal reception. With him, we visited a combination sheep and quarter-horse ranch to study management problems. The one perplexing problem was "How Can Livestock Stay So Fat on Such Scanty Grass?"

At Alpine, the head of the agriculture department made an explanation of the above problem and showed us some show stock that grazed on such pasture with a feed supplement of a handful of cubes per day per cow.

At Ft. Davis, we saw our first apple orchards. A half bushel of apples fresh from the trees was more than all could eat.

This "dirty" bunch a ked for a swim at Balmorhea. The pool is fed by bubbling springs that issued 20,000,000 gallons of water per hour.

Well, after I got them thawed out, we moved up into an extremely dry section around Pecos.

Pecos is dry except for some oasis made possible by irrigation projects. A friend and former student of mine accompanied us to irrigated farms of cotton, cantalope and alfalfa. The gross income per acre on cantelopes is approximately \$800 an acre.

Now, we are at Carlsbad where our story temporarily ends.
