Then, I have heard it mentioned that another project is in process of forming, which will include a dam ross Running water draw a few miles east of Lazbuddy, which will give that locality a large area of water conservation, and add immensely to the total area for Parmer county

#### BOVINA CONSERVATION MEETING

At the county-wide conservation neeting held at Bovina on Friday night of last week. Friona was repre sented by Messrs. J. A. Blackwell, J. T. Gee, Howard Morris and Dan Ethridge.

The time of the meeting was de voted largely to the discussion of four contemplated major conservation projects for Parmer county, viz: No. 1. a dam to be constructed on the Runningwater draw about nine miles south of Friona and about seven miles east of Bovina, the said dam to be of sufficient height and breadth to form a level highway across the draw, and to cover area enough to conserve a vast amount of water for the Bovina precinct. No. 2 west of Friona and six miles north of Bovina, on the Frio Draw, which tournament with \$6 points. will form a lake covering 640 acres or more. No. 3 is a dam on Frio draw south of the Rhea school, as a conservation project for the Rhea community. No. 4 will be a second dam on Runningwater draw a few miles north of Lazbuddy, which is proposed to supply conservation water for the Lazbuddy precinct.

Those in attendance, however were not in possession of enough information to make any of ther plans definite and could only form a primitive sketch of these four proposed projects, which were to be presented at the general meeting of the Pan handle counties held at Amarillo on Saturday morning

The Mistletoe Hunt By FRANCES GRINSTEAD

But that isn't exactly what daddy does down there. When it come the time of year that the baby needs warmer covering, dadd takes his gun and goes out to shoo down mistletoe! This he sells for the Christmas trade and buys Baby Bunting a different kind of rai For mistletoe, with its well known holiday meaning, grows in abundance there and is always found high among the bare winte branches of the native elm. Little boys climb for it, of course, but the quickest way to gather it for commercial use is to shoot it down.

"Open season" for mistletoe hunting begins about the last o November and the demand increases steadily until Christmas. Truck loads of the green sprigs with their wax-white berries are driven to the cities of the north for the holiday trade. As the mistletoe is not always uniformly ripe at the time it is wanted, much 'hunting'' is required to find sprigs whose berries are at a stage to suit the demands of the buyers. At such times the roadsides may be strewn with discarded mistletoe, for the condition of the berries cannot be seen until the sprig has been shot down. But such waste is not lamented, for mistletoc is a parasite that reappears in abundance each year, however ruthlessly it may be treated.



DENTON, Dec. 24 .- The cranberry is highly prized for sauce and jelly Its beautiful red color enhances its value for decoration of the table, and the slightly acid flavor is particular ly well suited to serve as a sauce with meats and poultry. The use of cran berries has been recommended for patients suffering with chronic rheumatism probably because the alkaline carbonates formed in the system from the organic acids stimulate the action of the kidneys.
