WASHINGTON, D. C. Oct. 3 (AP)—President Harry S. Truman agreed with Reconversion Director Steelman that the meat shortage may grow worse this winter. He told a news conference there will be shortages ahead even though he looked for improvement soon, but that there e no meat famine.

The President called on business, labor and consumers to do their "utmost to keep industrial peace" and to 'maintain production". He said the Federal Budget will be in black at the end of the fiscal year for the first time in sixteen years.
