AIRLINE PLANE PLUNGES IN FLAMES

NEW YORK, N. Y. Oct. 3 (AP)—An American overseas airline plane plunged in flames into a hill near Stephenville, Newfoundland, early today and early reports indicated all 39 persons aboard were dead, including six children and twelve women.

PRESIDENT SAYS NO MEAT FAMINE

WASHINGTON, D. C. Oct. 3 (AP)—President Harry S. Truman agreed with Reconversion Director Steelman that the meat shortage may grow worse this winter. He told a news conference there will be shortages ahead even though he looked for improvement soon, but that there is no meat famine.

The President called on business, labor and consumers to do their "utmost to keep industrial peace" and to "maintain production". He said the Federal Budget will be in black at the end of the fiscal year for the first time in sixteen years.

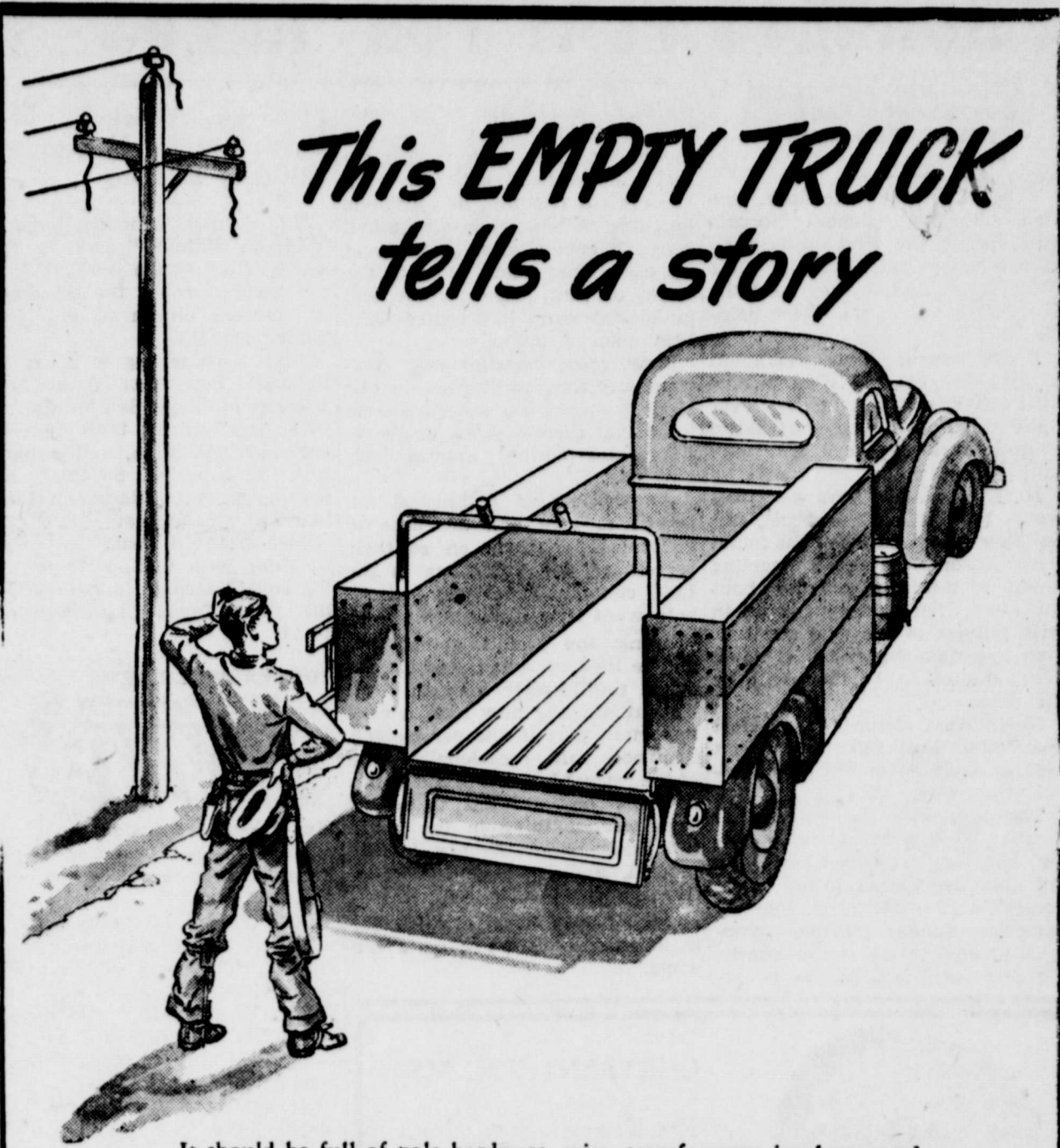

Free Cotton Classing And Market News For Farmers

Free cotton classification and market news services provided under the Smith-Doxey Act, which was passed by Congress in 1937, will again be available this season to farmers who are organized to promote cotton improvement. According to the Cotton Branch of the U. S. Department of Agriculture in Austin, five Coryell County gin communities have qualified to receive these services; namely, the patrons of the F. B. Lam Gin, Oglesby; Whitson Gin, RFD, Moody; Gatesville Gin Co., Gatesville; Brown's Gin, Gatesville; and Edmondson Gin, Route 3, Gatesville.

Patrons of the above gins who have their bales sampled by a bonded sampler will be furnished within 36 hours the grade and staple of each sample submitted to the Austin classing office. The sampler will insert in each sample a Form 1 or green card, showing the farmer's name and address, and mail it to the Austin classing office in sacks provided by the Department. The sample is then classed unbiased under proper conditions by experienced classifiers according to the U. S. Official Cotton Standards, the classification written on the green card and returned by mail direct to the producer whose name appears on the card.

In addition to the classing service, the Department also furnishes free market news which is posted at the gins or other conspicuous places so that growers may figure out what their cotton is worth.

Some of the benefits of receiving these free services are:

- (1) The grower will know the correct grade and staple and true value of his cotton after spending long hours of hard work during the growing season producing the crop.
- (2) It will enable the grower to be in a favorable position to work,

and in many communities sell his cotton on the basis of the Form 1 certificate or "green card." This practice will do much to eliminate the hog-round buyer, and will promote buying cotton on actual quality and value.

(3) It will show the effect of good harvesting and ginning on the quality.

(4) It will encourage cotton growers to work together and determine what varieties of cotton are best adapted to their communities and to their own farm.

(5) It will check on the performance of planting seed.

Last season more than 40 percent of the Texas ginnings was classified under the Smith-Doxey Act. This season it is predicted that an even higher percentage will be classified because it is felt that with the wide differences in prices of various grades of cotton, growers may profit more than ever before by the use of these services.
