The County Agriculture Agent, W. P. Graham, and Seth Turner returned Tuesday, from Dallas. Seth exhibited a 4-H Club calf at the Dallas Fair. His calf placed 12th in the class of calves weighing between 850 and 1000 pounds. The money premium for 12th place was \$25.00. His calf sold for 46c a pound and weighed 945 at sale date.

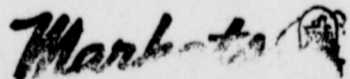

This gave three calves to each extension service district. Coryell county is in District 8. The other two calves for this district were awarded to boys in Falls and Lampasas counties. To the credit of young Turner, it might be stated that these other two counties failed to place. Congressman W. R. (Bob) Poage speaking to the Gatesville Lions Club Wednesday noon, said Camp Hood, unless the Army changes its mind, is here to stay, and he would not recommend that the land be given back and more bought in McLennan county.

That was that! And, he explained why. Other posts have been abandoned, and this one is considered one of the best, and the army definitely wants to keep it.

He said he would recommend that payments be made the county in lieu of taxes lost in the acquisition of land for the camp.

He also said, he would urge the utilization of the North Camp, so as to as nearly as possible, compensate from the economic loss which the county and town have and will have to sustain.

It is the home of the Second Armored Division, and the National Guard is authorized to establish an armored division and he said it was the "reasonable and logical" place for the headquarters and that he "would recommend its establishment", and would urge that "no permanent buildings now on North Camp Hood site be removed!"

FLOOD CONTROL
The Miller Springs Dam was brought up and discussed, and he said in reference to this, that the government had three programs for flood control:

1. The Tank Plan, handled by the AAA Office.
2. The minor dams, handled by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

3. The "Big Dam" business, like Whitney and Miller Springs. The Tank Program is ponds or tanks on farms. The No. 2 proposition is like dams on minor streams and "sub-dams" on the larger ones.

He said definitely, the Miller Springs proposition was a FLOOD CONTROL Dam, and not a Power Dam.

After the Lions Luncheon, he conferred with county, city and chamber of commerce officials, concerning the benefits of Camp Hood, and the further utilization of the 137,000 acre reservation. He left shortly afterward as he had an engagement in Evant.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 10 (AP)—The Beef Industry coupled demand for immediate scrapping of price controls today with a promise of ample supplies of meat "very soon" if the Administration acts.

R. G. Haynie, Chairman, OPA Beef Industry Advisory Committee which petitioned formally for decontrol, said plenty of calves and cattle are ready for market as soon as price ceilings are lifted.

AMERICAN FLIGHT STOPPAGE LIFTED

FRANKFURT, Germany, Oct. 10 (AP)—An unexplained suspension of American plane flights over Czechoslovakia was lifted suddenly today by United States Headquarters in Europe, but the military ban was continued on flights either by civil or military planes over Romania and Hungary.

US-BRITAIN ASK FOR SOVIET COOPERATION

PARIS, France, Oct. 10 (AP)—The United States and Britain joined forces today in calling upon the Soviet Union and Slav States to remove the barrier between east and west with positive Peace Conference action on the opening of the Danube to Free commerce.

Senator Arthur Vandenberg of Michigan, led off the Plenary Sessions deliberations on the Romanian Peace Treaty draft by declaring "Free Danube" was indispensable to the economic health and peace of Central Europe, and that failure to open Europe's most important inland waterway would be "tragic, reactionary mistake".

In reply the Yugoslav deputy Premier Edward Kardelj said the conference was "not competent to deal with the Danube question".

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Major General Hobbs Takes Command Of Second Armored Division

Major General Leland S. Hobbs, former commander of the III Corps at Camp Polk, Louisiana, will arrive at Camp Hood, Texas, on Wednesday, October 9th, to take command of the Second Armored Division in accordance with recent War Department orders. He will replace Brig. Gen. John M. Devine.

General Hobbs was born in Gloucester, Massachusetts, on 24 February 1892. He attended Dickinson High School, Jersey City, N. J., starting in football, baseball, basketball and track. General Hobbs was appointed to the Military Academy from New Jersey and following his graduation, 12 June 1915, was commissioned a Second Lieutenant of Infantry. After graduation from West Point, General Hobbs served with infantry units, including the 12th Infantry on the Mexican Border, the 33rd Infantry at Presidio of San Francisco, California, and Fort Meade, Maryland. He was also with the 11th Division in France.

Upon his return to the United States in 1918, he again served with the 63rd Infantry and then was detailed as an instructor at West Point. From West Point, the General went to Hawaii and upon

his return was stationed at Fort Benning, Ga., Washington, D. C., Atlanta, Ga., Fort Snelling, Minn., Camp Robinson, Ark., and Camp Forrest, Tenn. General Hobbs assumed command of the 30th Infantry Division in September 1942.

During the European phase of World War II, General Hobbs commanded the famous 30th Infantry Division which landed on Omaha Beach in France on 9 June 1944. He led the Division through the ensuing five campaigns in France, Belgium, Holland, and Germany. Combat for his Division ceased only when the Russians were met at the Elbe River.

The Division was on occupation duty in Germany until it redeployed to the Pacific Theater of Operations.

Following the Japanese collapse it was inactivated at Fort Jackson, S. C. and General Hobbs was assigned to Fort Dix, N. J., as Commanding General.

General Hobbs is a graduate of the following Service Schools: The Advanced Course, Infantry School; the Command and General Staff School; Army War College; and Naval War College.

Among his decorations, General Hobbs holds the Distinguished Service Medal, Silver Star with Oak Leaf Cluster, Bronze Star with two Oak Leaf Clusters, E. T. O. Ribbon with five battle stars, French Legion of Honor, French Croix de Guerre, Belgian Croix de Guerre, the Russian Order of the Red Star and the Dutch Order of Orange Nassau.

General Hobbs was promoted to 1st Lieutenant on July 1, 1916, to Captain on 15 May 1917, to Major (temporary) on 17 June 1918, to Major (permanent) on 1 July 1920, to Lieutenant Colonel on 26 June 1936, to Colonel (temporary) on 26 June 1941, to Brigadier General (temporary) on May 23, 1942, to Major General (temporary) on 11 September 1942.

Charley Blankenship Dies At Moshiem Home Buried Wednesday Oct. 9

A long illness proved fatal to Charley Claude Blankenship, 64, who died at his Moshiem home Tuesday afternoon, October 8, at 5:45 o'clock.

Mr. Blankenship, a prosperous farmer and stockman of the Moshiem section, was universally liked and highly respected as a citizen. He was active while in health in the Moshiem Baptist Church, and was a friend to all religious programs promoted by other churches. A great concourse of friends gathered with the bereaved family for the funeral service held in the Baptist Church sanctuary on Wednesday at 2:00 o'clock. The pastor, Rev. Charles D. Conner, assisted by the Rev. Frank Stone, minister to the

Methodist congregation, conducted the memorial ceremonies. The 4r.BTG services requiem music and the masses of beautiful flowers were tenderly expressive of love for the good man. Burial was made in the Gatesville City Cemetery under the direction of the Morton Scott and Son Funeral Home, with pallbearers including the following: Monroe Miles, Otis Mills, Ernest Blankenship, Clyde Blankenship, Page Blankenship and Earl Blankenship.

A native of Coryell county, Charley C. Blankenship lived his entire life in this section of the state. He was married to Miss Jennie Owens, who with their son, Harold Blankenship, an only child survives him. He leaves three sisters and five brothers, who are Mrs. I. M. Farris of Washington, D. C., Mrs. Arthur Miles, Moshiem; Mrs. M. Carlthorp, Turnersville; Dr. W. W. Blankenship, Moshiem; John Blankenship, Tom Blankenship and Monroe Blankenship of Gatesville, and A. S. Blankenship of Commerce, Texas.

Mr. Blankenship and his family moved from Coryell City to Moshiem in 1921, and he had been active in agricultural enterprises, and in civic and church life until stricken ill a month before his death.

Mrs. King was graduated from the Gatesville High School and attended Baylor University. For the past few months she has been the clerk at the Soil Conservation Service office here.

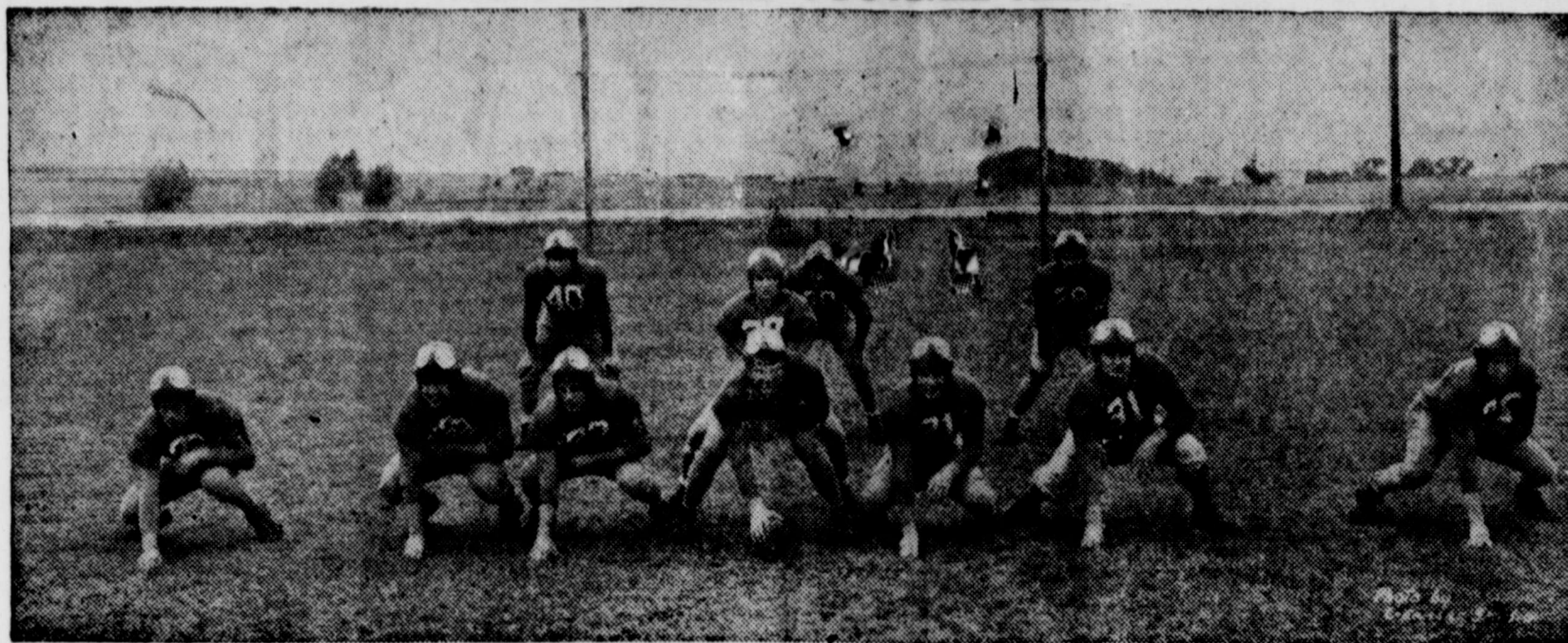

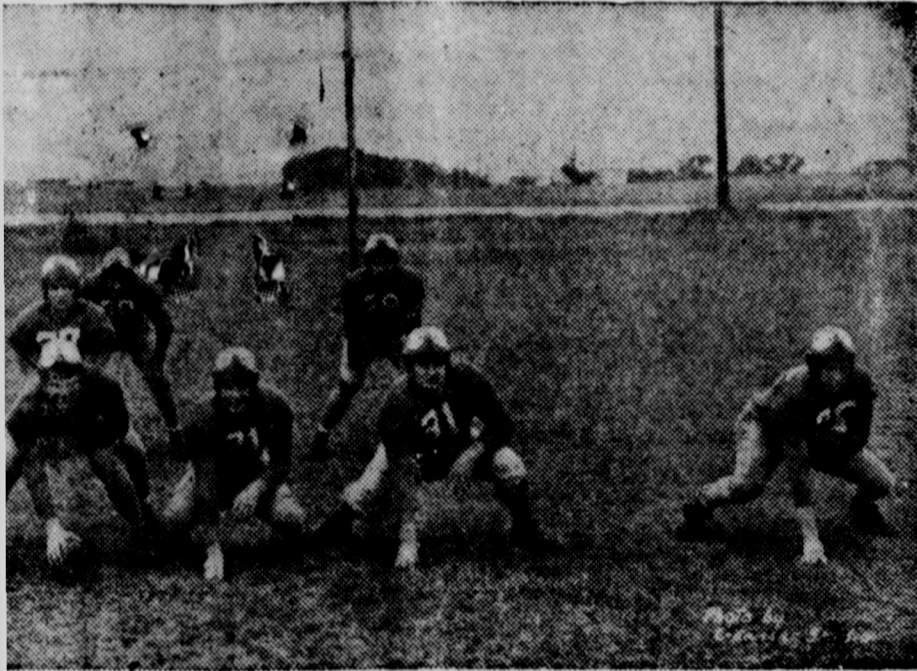
