Briefly, the game was one of the better ones, and Clifton, in the late part of the game managed to mar the clean slate of the Hornets with an ugly 7.

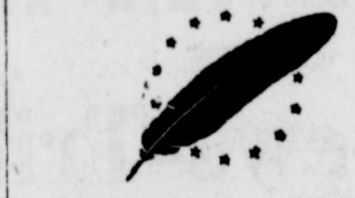

The luncheon or banquet was served by the ladies of the First Methodist church in the High school gymnasium.

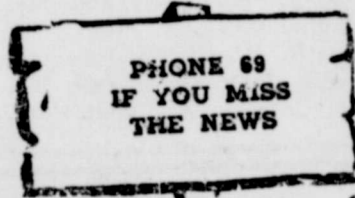

Mrs. Elbert Tyson was called to Hamilton last week when her brother, Art Kissel suffered a heart attack. He is improving.

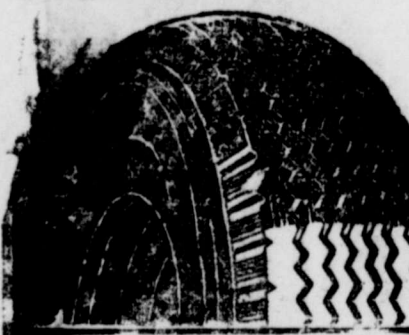
Future Homemakers Hold Candlelight Service

BOYER HOTEL SELLS TO MILLSTAD

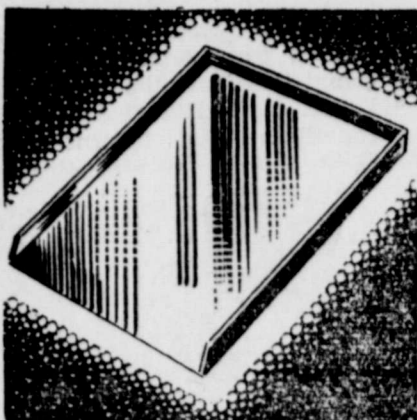

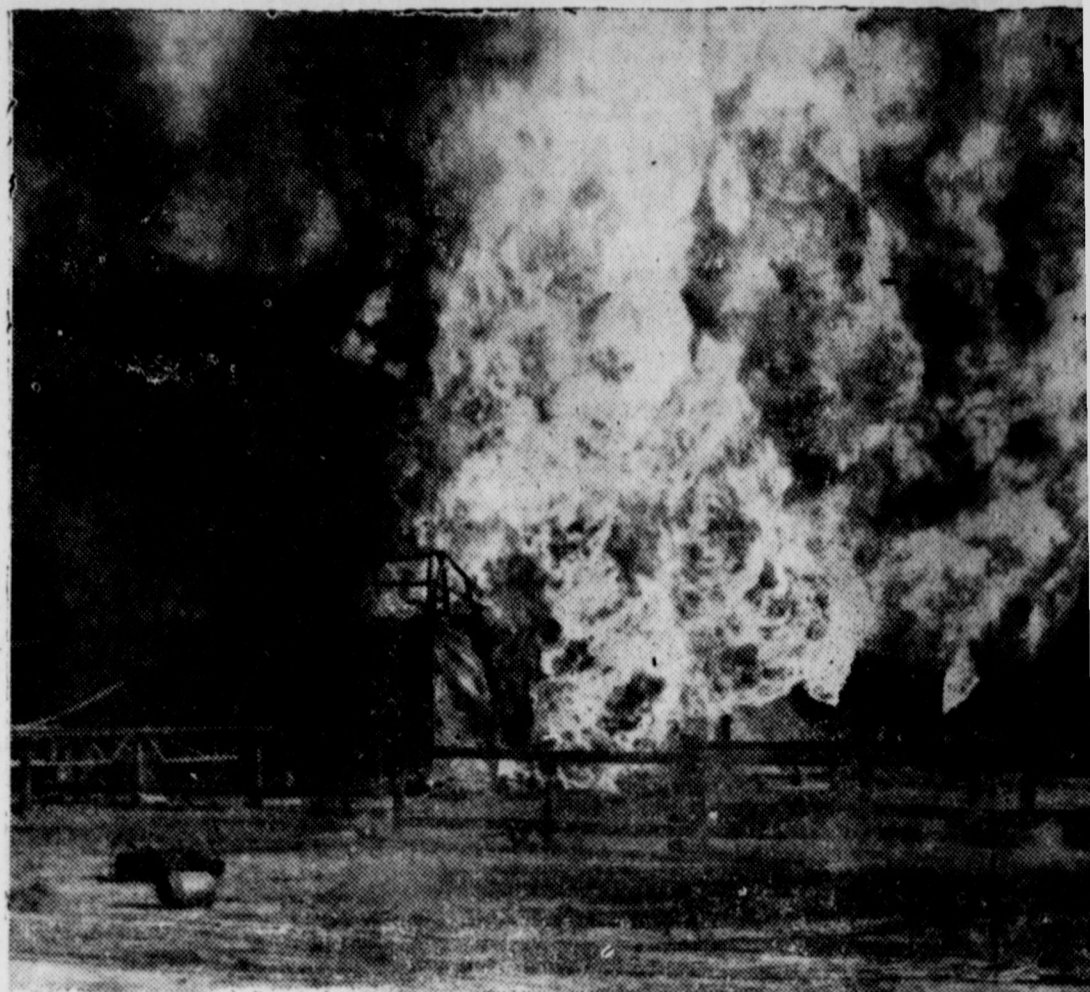
Following a short wedding trip the couple will be at home in Ireland, where Mr. Faubin is engaged in farming and operates a barber shop.
