Little Schoolgirl Struck by Auto and killed Instantly

Wilma Dean Cooper was instantly killed when struck by a car driven by Winfield Scott, elderly Gatesville Citizen, at 5:15 p. m., Monday, October 28.

The child, 11 years old, and her sister Hazel, 13, were returning to the home of their parents, Mr. and Mrs. Donnie Cooper, on Waco Highway just outside of Gatesville, after turning the family cow out at the pasture gate to drive her to the lot. Wilma Dean was walking a few feet ahead of her sister just off the road. Hazel glanced back to see that the cow was coming, and in that moment the tragedy occurred. Hazel and Mr. Scott reached the prostrate form of the little girl at the same time, and Mr. Scott wrapped his coat about the dead child and held her in his arms until nearby neighbors reached the scene. An ambulance and Gatesville police arrived on the scene, and the body of the child was taken to the Scott Funeral Home.

Officers state that Mr. Scott explained that in driving west, the low sun rays struck across the windshield of his car and momentarily blinded him. He is griet-stricken at the fatality of the accident.

Others than her parents and the sister named above, Wilma Dean Cooper is survived by a sister, Freda, and a brother, Raymond Cooper, in hteservice of the U. S. Army, stationed at Fort Belvoir, Va.; her grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Cooper and a number of aunts and uncles and other relatives and many friends among the Gatesville school students and teachers.

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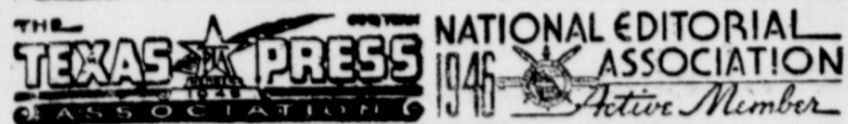

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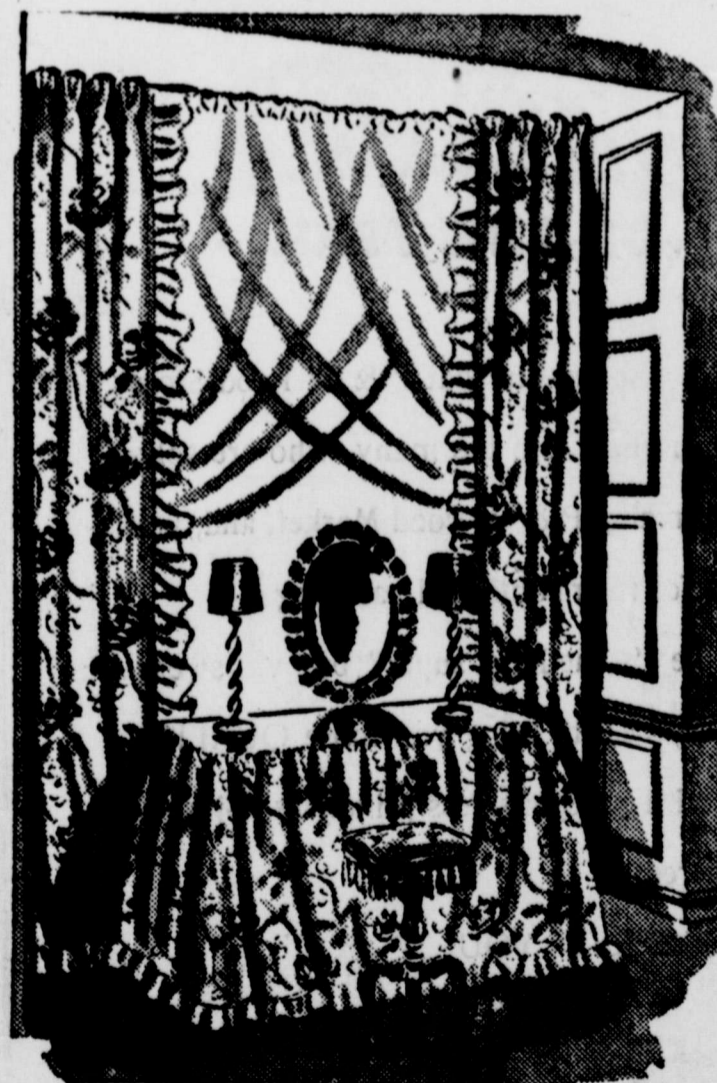

Lion Gayle Pruitt Tells Story From Bataan Back to Manila, P. I.

Members of the Gatesville Lions Club were present almost one hundred percent Wednesday at the luncheon meeting to hear Lion Gayle Pruitt tell of his experience as a prisoner of the Japs.

In his introduction of the speaker Lion Jackson paid the young veteran a very fine tribute in commendation of his excellent spirit of apparently forgetful and forgiving attitude toward the Jap enemy and his progressive efforts in carrying on as a private citizen and business man of Gatesville the city of his nativity.

Lion Pruitt was with the National Guards in the Phillipines when Bataan fell and he was taken prisoner. He somehow robbed his

story of all vestiture of horrors however these were readily supplied by his hearers in their own minds when he told of days without food because there was so very little water to drink and other atrocious treatment of prisoners by the Japs. He said 46 percent of the men with him died of starvation sickness and other hardships. They were subjected to many forms of humiliation by the Japs in the enemy's effort to break their spirits. Gayle Pruitt said "I always believed I was going to live through it and here I am".

The roll was called and one new member admitted to the club. All other business was dispensed with in order to hear Lion Pruitt's story of a Jap POW told. He was voted a typical American boy and was presented with a certificate of Appreciation from the Lions Club.

Coryell Ranchers Are Invited to Hear Lecture By Dr. Boughton at Evant

Dr. I. B. Boughton, State Veterinarian at the Sonora Ranch Experiment Station, will address the class enrolled in the Veterans Agriculture Educational Program at Evant, and all farmers and ranchers interested in the external and internal parasites influencing sheep and goat production, at the Evant Gymnasium on Tuesday, November 5, at 1:30 p. m.

Since sheep and goat production comprises a large portion of Coryell County's annual income the importance of efficient and economical production cannot be overlooked. This county is fortunate to have Dr. Boughton as he is considered one of the states foremost authorities on sheep and goats. 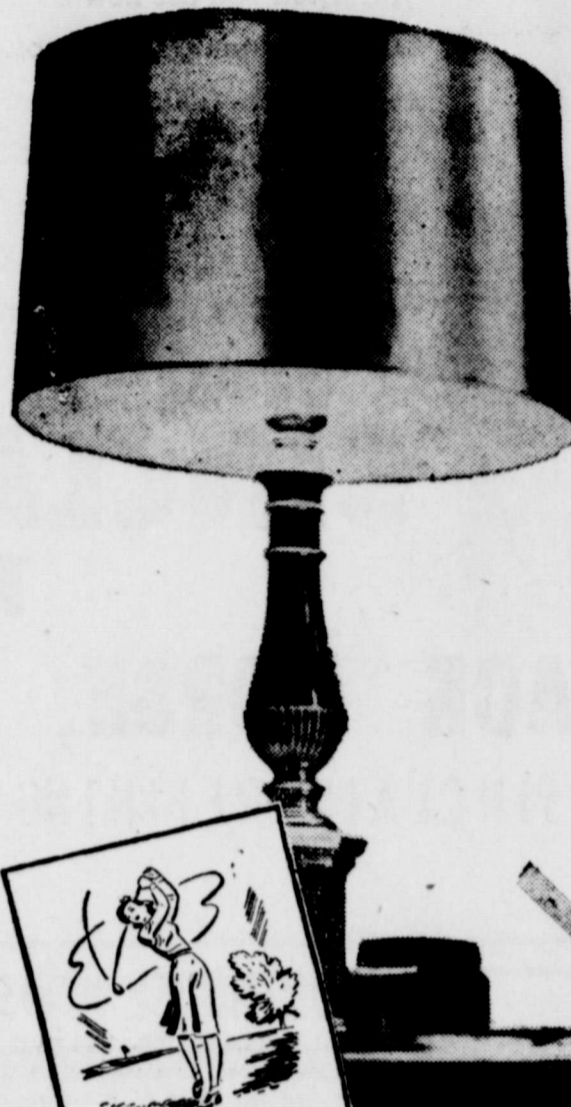

The work on the Airstrip proper will be advertised later, pending the completion of detailed plans and specifications by district engineers at Gaveston.

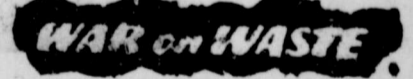
