In a recent edition of the Waco News-Tribune, the regional editor has the following story from Gatesville, dated November 17: An organization for the exter-

mination of cats and wolves in Coryell county has been established by a group of sheep and goat raisers with W. E. Grimes of Copperas Cove as president and Lenola Baize as secretary. The group voted to organize a year-round control program, with the aid of a government trapper working in each communityp art of the year.



Predatory Animals In Corvell Doomed To Early Extinction

In a recent edition of the Waco News-Tribune, the regional editor has the following story from Gatesville, dated November 17:

An organization for the extermination of cats and wolves in Coryell county has been established by a group of sheep and goat raisers with W. E. Grimes of Copperas Cove as president and Lenola Baize as secretary. The group voted to organize a year-round control program, with the aid of a government trapper working in each communityp art of the year.

It was estimated that the services of the government trapper can be had with the average donation of \$5 from 2000 heep and goat raisers. The small operator might contribute less and the larger rancher could contribute more, but all will be asked to give financial assistance.

The Copperas Cove community has already had a government trapper and found his work very satisfactory, it was reported. A trapper will start in the Oglesby community thsi month.

Ranchers are requested to contact their community leaders and help raise the necessary money. Where this is not convenient the ecretary in the county agent's office will give a receipt for any funds received for the organiza-





Last Wednesday at the noon luncheon meeting a large group of Gatesville Lions gave audience to the Rev. Jack Lewis of Austin, former U. S. Navy Chaplain, whose duties during World War II took him from California to Maine; the Canadian border to the Pacific, where he had many harrowing experiences in burying the youthful dead, and in seeing and administering to thousands of the armed forces lying desperately and permanently wounded, some without eyes, some without arms, some without legs, and some with brain nerves shattered. He said he wondered why he was left unscratched by gunshot and that nothing had fallen on him, and, said to his hearere, "Gentlemen, it must be that ou rjob is not yet finished."

The speaker was presented by his friend and war buddy, Chaplain Jan McMurry of Camp Hood, who had known him as a ministerial student; in the Pacific during the great war holocaust, and had h∈ard him speak to the 28,-000 Navy men dischargees at Camp Wallace soon after victory was shouted.

Chaplain Lewis, as he is best known, chose the theme of his address, "Personal Adjustment to Civilian Life", and adapted the admonition to men whom he faced and called out from complacency to fight the ever increasing menace of crime; racial hatred and religious intolerence in political problems that threaten our democracy. The fire-fast upsweep of crime committed by youth was largely attributed by him to broken homes, laxity in morals of parents themselves and indifference of men toward personal responsibility. He made an especially strong plea to men to live exempneed them, adopting the policy, "What I have is yours if you need it."
