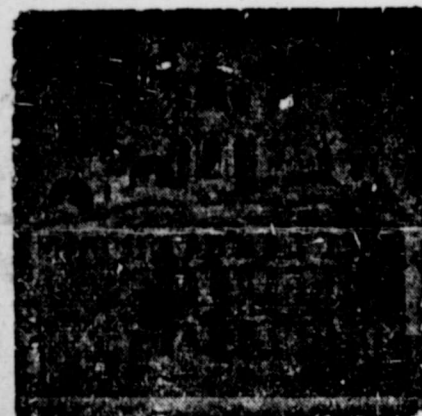

He wired back (collect, naturally) ARRIVE SUNDAY DEC. 1. SECURE APARTMENT IF POSSIBLE, JOE BLANK.

Well, he and friend wife arrived Sunday, December 1, looked the shop over, went out for 15 minutes, and we left about that time, meeting him on street, and he says: "Don't believe we'll stay", and we said: "Okeh, good luck!"

SAYS LEWIS INTERFERES, 'SOVERIGN FUNCTION'

WASHINGTON, D. C. Dec. 2. (AP)—Federal Attorneys today poured evidence into John Lewis' contempt trial in an effort to show that soft coal strike inteferes with a "soverign function" of government.

Evidence, the government counsel told the court, is aimed at smashing the United Mine Workers' contention that private operators actually run the mines under Federal seizure and that the walkout, therefore, was not interference with the Government.

ARNOLD PROPOSES BIG, LITTLE INCH USE

WASHINGTON, D. C. Dec. 3. (AP)—Thurman Arnold, former anti-trust chief of the Justice Department, proposed today the operation of the \$145,000,000 Big and Little Inch pipelines by a non-profit co-operative to help break what he termed "monopoly" in oil industry.

LAKE SUCCESS, Dec. 3. (AP)—The United States charged today the primary object of Russia's armamentations program seemed to be to get rid of the atomic bomb and then place all other arms questions under the United Nations Security Council where they would be subject to "atom bomb of the veto".

He bought it from A. E. Wiese, who's been here for some time, and has proven very popular among the trade and here in town. Mr. Wiese had to retire for his health.

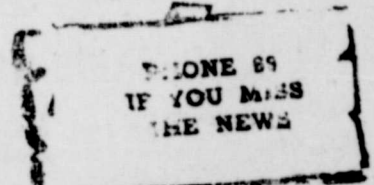

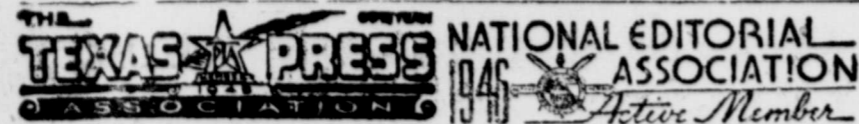

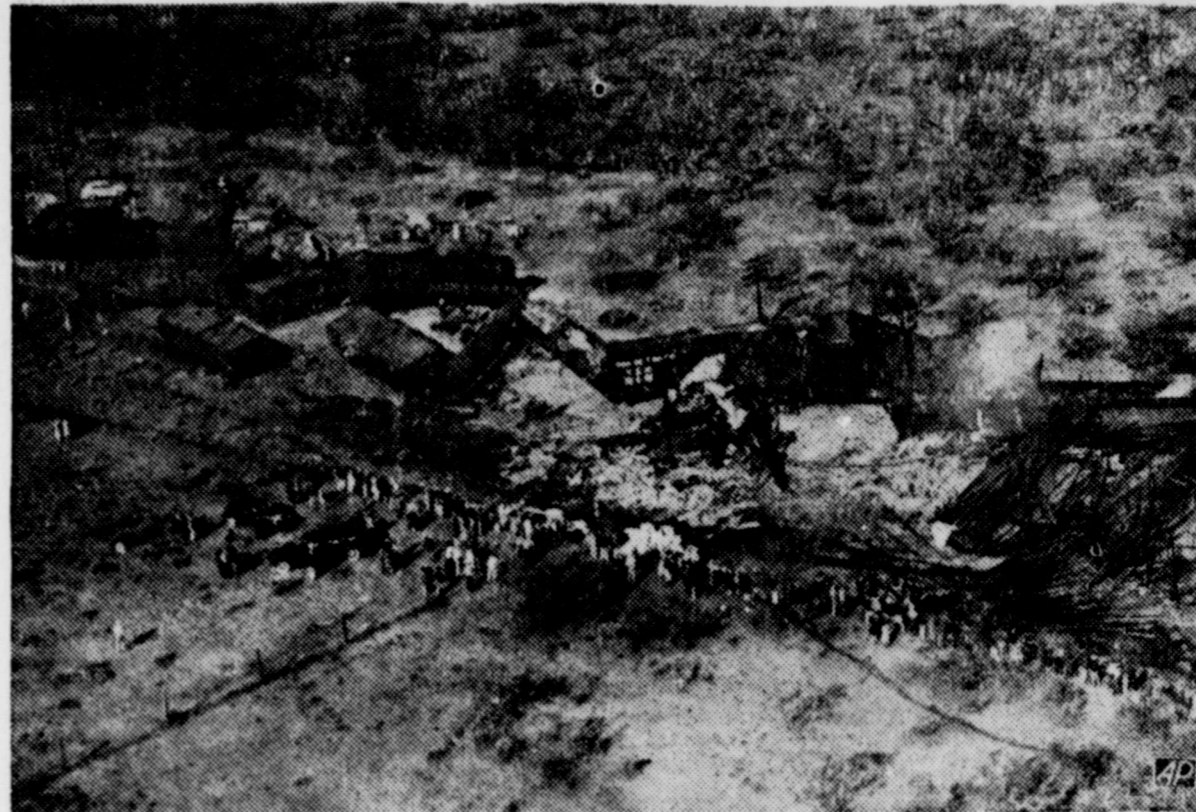
