SAYS LEWIS INTERFERES, 'SOVERIGN FUNCTION'

WASHINGTON, D. C. Dec. 2.(AP)—Federal Attorneys today poured evidence into John Lewis' contempt trial in an effort to show that soft coal strike inteferes with a "soverign function" of government.

Evidence, the government counsel told the court, is aimed at smashing the United Mine Workers' contention that private operators actually run the mines under Federal seizure and that the walkout, therefore, was not interference with the Government.


