Federal Lunch Support Ends February 1, Schools Say Write Washington

According to Superintendent George Wier, the funds supplied by the Federal government will all be used up February 1. And unless Congress does something about it, prices for the school lunches must go up from about 16c to 25c.

For many families, this would be prohibitive and Supt. Wier asks that all write Senators W. Lee O'Daniel and Tom Connally, and Congressman W. R. Poage urging them to see, if possible, something be done about this.

At present, about 800 students in the local school, not mentioning the rural schools, are getting lunches at approximately 15c for each child. This is very urgent, according to Supt. Wier, and letters can be addressed either to Senate Office Building or House Office Building, Washington, D.C.

Black 'n White Numbers For Cars In '47. On April 1

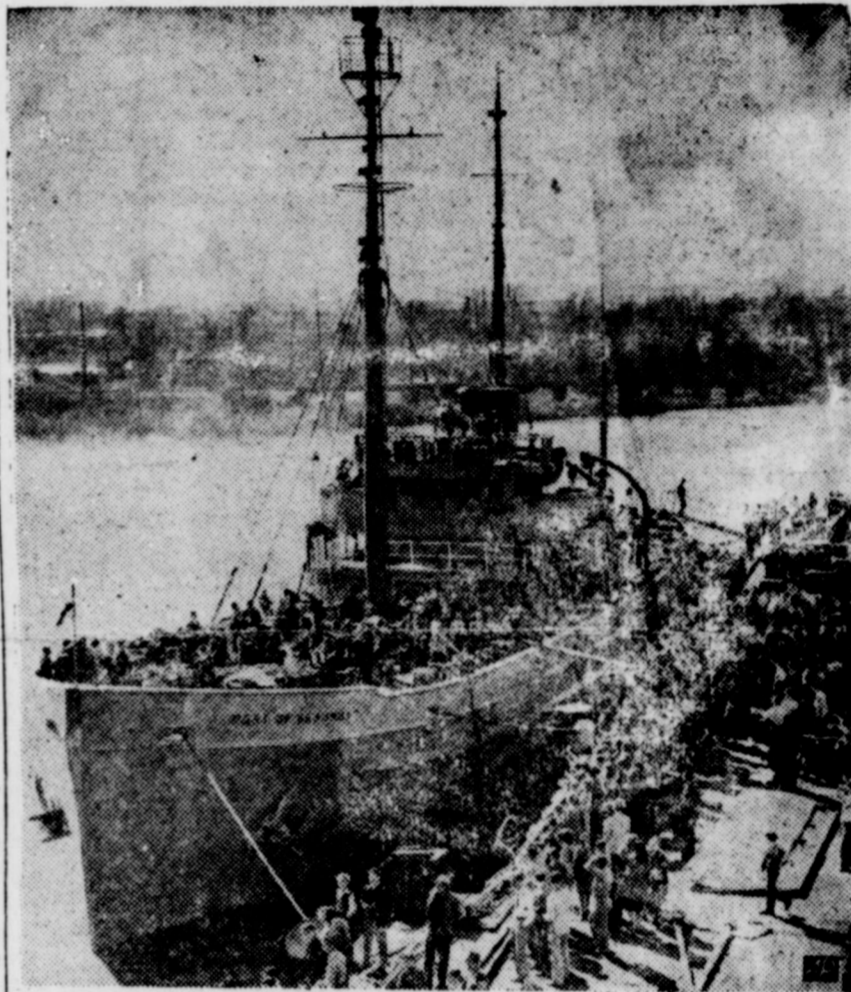
It'll be black and white numbers to decorate the jalopy, or that "premium" new car this year. They'll go on sale about April 10.
