Poage Says School Lunch Program To Be Left to State

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6—(AP)—
Continuance of the school lunch
program in Texas after March 1
probably will depend on appropri-
ations from the state legislature,
Texas congressmen indicate here
today.
Several Texas representatives
have predicted that the national
congress pledged to economy mea-
sures by the republican majority,
will not approve a \$10,000,000 de-
ficiency appropriation needed for
continuance of federal aid in the
project.

Last Allocation

Rep. Poage, democrat, Texas,
said the federal government at
present is making its last alloca-
tion of funds to Texas, in the
amount of \$1,200,000.
"Considering January obliga-
tions that yet must be paid, this
is sufficient to continue the pro-
gram only until about March 1,"
Poage said. "I don't see much
likelihood that the republicans
will approve a deficiency appro-
priation to supplement the \$75-
000,000 already provided for the
current fiscal year."

Poage has supported lunch pro-
grams in the past and has an-
nounced his backing of the budget
bureau estimate of \$75,000,000 for
the national program next fiscal
year.

The Waco congressman said
Texas schools received this year
\$2,860,000 for food and \$592,000
for equipment under the school
lunch program.

States Fail to Match Cash

Poage attributed the shortage of
lunch room funds to failure of
states to match federal appropri-
ations dollar for dollar. He said
the states actually put up little
cash because they are given credit
for space and services supplied by
the various schools.

Under any condition, however,
the commodity credit corporation
would continue to furnish schools
free surplus farm commodities
such as potatoes, Poage said. He
added that cheese and eggs prob-
ably would be placed on the sur-
plus list soon.

Rep. Bursleson, Democrat, Texas,
expressed views similar to those
of Poage, while several other
Texas congressmen said they felt
the responsibility rested with the
state legislatures.

Meeting of Mothers Wednesday at School Gives No Quarters

This is not flippant!
It's deathly serious, and just
THAT important.

Mothers of students in Gates-
ville schools were summoned to the
"graveled hill" to get the low-
down on the school and school
building situation. We horned in,
and were welcomed.

Mr. Father, you can just "give
in" now, because that many "war
departments" thinking and want-
ing a school or schools, it's, you
might as well say, a foregone con-
clusion. Personally, we've already
said "yes".

Now, the "how" is the big ques-
tion, and here is information fur-
nished by school authorities, and
it's not "colored" by us, but in
their words. One note, before.
This shows that the rural children
are NOT crowding our school,
and that they're actually getting
MORE money for the school than
the town children.

But here it is:

"Why The Change is Necessary"

1. Present tax is inadequate to support school and city.
2. Responsibility is not definitely fixed.
3. Almost all other schools in Texas are independent of the City.
4. The separation is recommended by the State Department of Education.
5. Local School History definitely shows that adequate buildings for schools cannot be built under the present set up.
6. The City Council approves the separation.
7. Many of the Leading Citizens have requested that the change be made.
8. All Faculty members favor the separation.
9. Leading educators advocate this plan.
10. Present school tax is now 60c. Surrounding schools have up to \$1.50.
11. Legislation now under consideration in the Legislature requires a minimum of 75c for local maintenance in order to be eligible for tuition and transportation aid.

"How The Change Can Be Made"

1. A petition requesting the separation of the school from the city will be signed by 100 or more qualified voters. (A qualified voter is anyone entitled to vote in a city election.)
2. An election will then be ordered and the qualified voters in the City of Gatesville will vote to separate the City and Schools.
3. In like manner a tax election will be held to set the school tax at \$1.50.
4. Then on the basis of this tax a bond can be voted to construct the buildings.
5. In the tax and bond election a qualified voter is a person who renders property for tax in the city of Gatesville and who has paid his poll tax.

Gatesville should provide build-
ings for all students now attend-
ing the Gatesville Public schools.

During the past few years stu-
dents from the rural districts
have provided more revenue per
capita for local school operation
than those in the City of Gates-
ville. This is why these outlying
districts have been contracted in-
stead of consolidating with them.

Several of these districts have a
75c tax and one has a .1 tax.

Gregory to Ask Law To Exempt Vets for Life From Poll Tax

Via radio and otherwise, Rep.
Sid Gregory, Jr. says he'll ask the
passage of a bill by the 50th legis-
lature exempting Texas veterans
of World War II from paying of
poll tax for life.

He said, a poll of house mem-
bers indicate no opposition.

The bill will provide voting
without payment of poll taxes to
Texas 700,000 veterans. The total
vote in last election was approxi-
mately 1,100,000.

"The Way the \$1.50 School Tax Will be Used"

"I. 50c will be used for con-
struction of buildings:

1. An elementary building will be the first to be constructed.
- (1) present buildings were erected in 1907 and are unsafe. (2) The boiler is under the building. It is fired with gas. This is a hazard. (3) Auditorium is used for classrooms. These are unsatisfactory rooms. There is no auditorium for elementary students. (4) 20 classrooms are needed. The elementary building will cost around \$120,000.00. This could be paid for in from ten to twelve years with 50c tax for bonds.

2. A high school building will be needed in less than ten years so the elementary building should be built and paid for as soon as possible.

II. 10c will be used for addi-
tional maintenance and repair of
the High School, Junior High

School and Gymnasium.

- (1) The lighting is deficient in almost all rooms. (2) The floors need to be replaced in many of the rooms of the High School and all floors in Junior High School and the Gymnasium 20 7P eyism need to be sand d and finished. (3) Many of the windows in the Junior High School and Gymnasium need to be replaced. (4) The walls and roof of Junior High School need major repairs. (5) The new band house needs to be finished on the inside. (6) Arcades are needed between buildings to protect the students going from on building to another during bad weather.

III. The additional 25c will go on teachers salaries. This will amount to at least \$150 per teacher per year.

At present the average class-
room teacher receives during a
calendar year approximately the
same as a cafe worker or a grocery
clerk in town. Nearly all teachers
have 4 years college training plus
4 or 5 thousand dollars invested
in an education. Other schools are
increasing salaries from addition-
al local taxes. Gatesville should
do the same thing."

EISLER WON'T SWEAR OR TESTIFY

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6.—(AP)—Gerhard Eisler, al-
leged chief communist agent in the United States refused
to take an oath or to testify before the House Un-Ameri-
can Activity Committee today and was cited for con-
tempt. The charge must be tried before the jury. The
committee called Eisler in an effort to develop what is
the "chain of command" between American Communists
and the International Communist leaders.

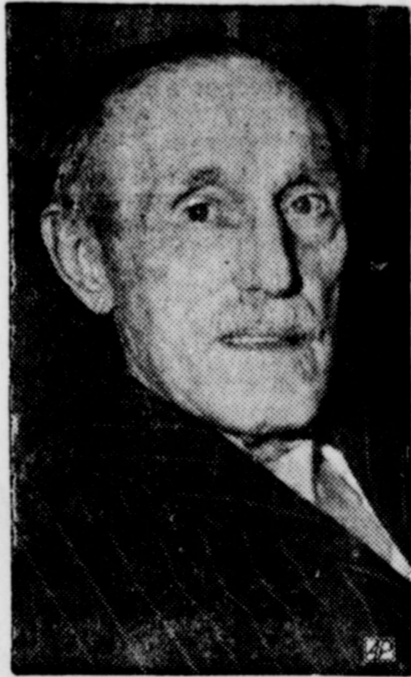

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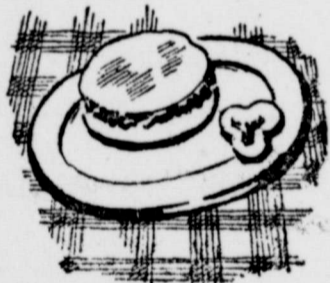
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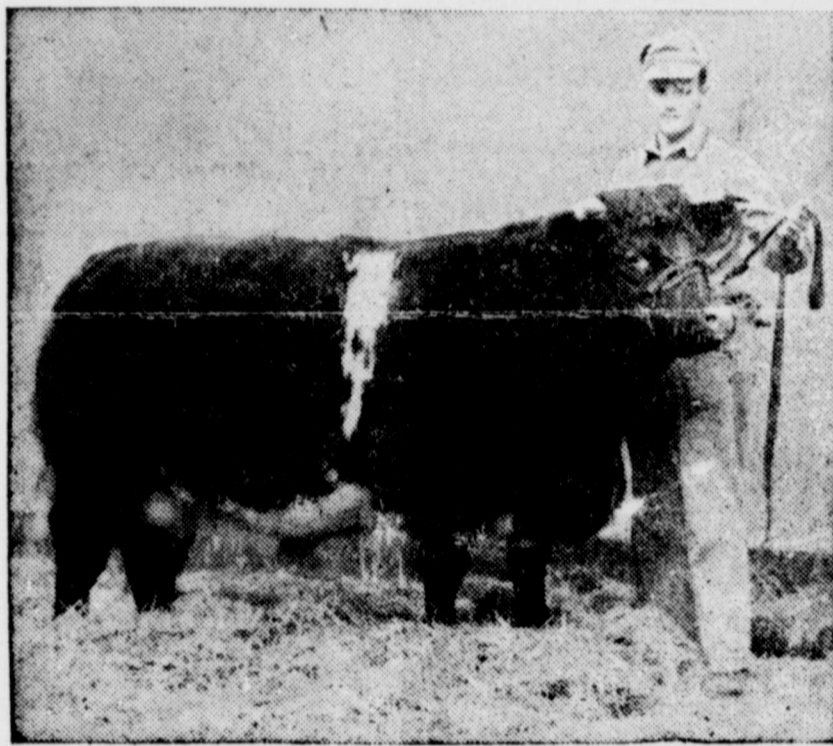

February 15 Is Last Day To Make Application For Cotton Insurance

Coryelli County cotton farmers are reminded that February 15th is the final date to sign an application for Federal Crop Insurance on their 1947 crop, according to James F. Blair, Chairman of the County ACA Committee.

This Federal all-risk crop insurance covers loss from all natural hazards, such as floods, hail, grasshoppers, boll weevils, drought, fire and storms. There are three different coverage groups to select from, and each offers protection on crop investment at all stages of growth. The premiums do not come due until around harvest time and the payment terms are responsible should a disaster be reasonable.

This Federal insurance is set up on a non-profit basis, as the administrative expenses for operating the program do not come out



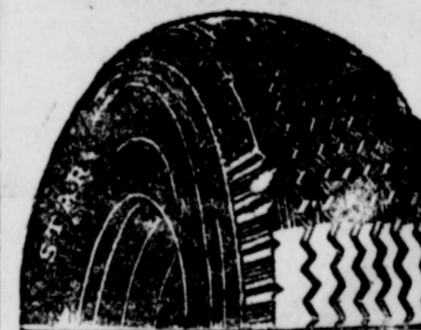
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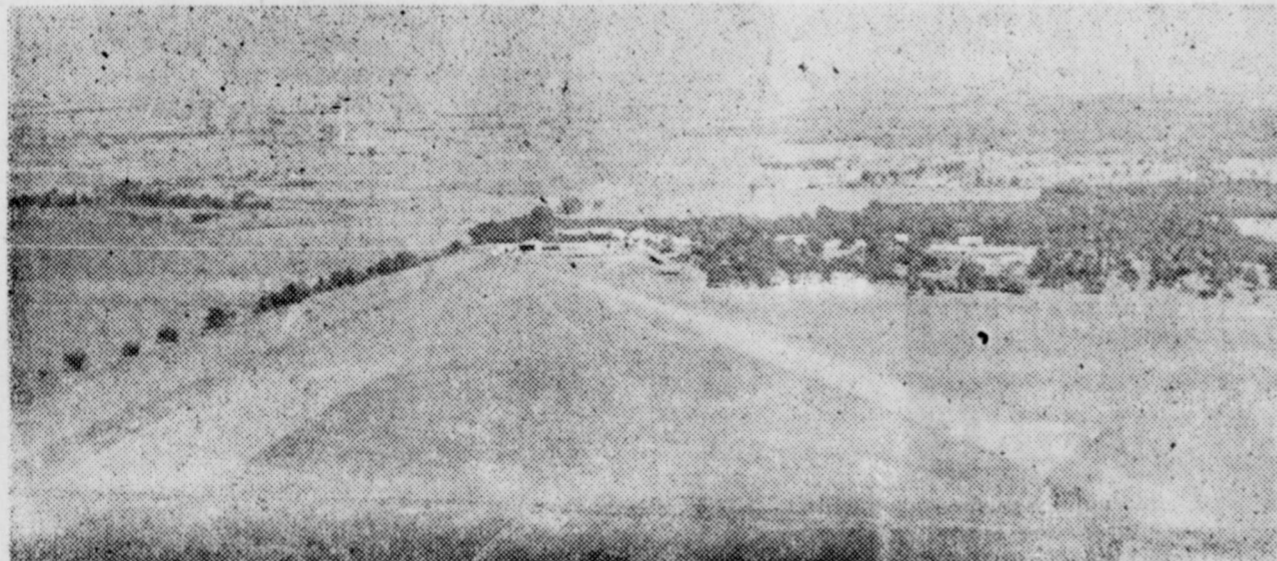
