Plan Proposes Training National Guard at Camp Hood

CAMP HOOD, Feb. 15. (AP)—A plan which has been submitted to the Fourth Army by the adjutant general of Texas calls for 5,000 men of the Texas National Guard to spend a two weeks' training period at North Camp Hood from August 10 to August 24.

The field training would be staged at an estimated cost of \$680,000.

Fourth Army is contemplating the rehabilitation of site facilities in North Camp Hood necessary to conduct this training. If it comes, it will bring 1,000 officers and 4,000 enlisted men, parts of the 36th Infantry Division, the 49th Armored Division and 24 non-divisional units.

Training to be given the men will be a continuation of army training, including range practice, specialist training, training instructors.

Clarence Smith, 16-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Otis Smith, of Route 3, Gatesville, was on the beam in his first calf scramble at the Houston Fat Stock Show. Not only did he come out of the 14th scramble with a Hereford calf, sponsored by L. D. Cain, left, of Houston, but also a fine pair of boots which he's shown receiving from R. W. Rowley, of The Dow Chemical Company's Houston office. Dow presented a pair of boots to the first boy to cross the finish line in each of the 15 calf

scrambles and also awarded a \$250 saddle, bridle and blanket to a Hays County boy who took his calf over the line in 50.2 seconds, the best time recorded during the Show.

Clarence, who plans to attend Texas A. & M. to study animal husbandry, is a junior at Gatesville High School where he's specializing in vocational agriculture and also is a member of the track team. Last year he exhibited a Hereford at the Fort Worth Fat Stock Show and this year expects to show an Angus there. He belongs to the Gatesville 4-H Club and his leader is W. P. Graham, Coryell County Agent.

"There are some restrictions connected with the winning of scramble calves. Among these are that the boy must make a monthly report to the person in Houston who furnished the money to buy the calf, and he must return to Houston in 1948 with a fitted calf, and, we hope, a fattened one," says County Agent W. H. Graham.

Coryell County Boy Goes On 14-Day Cruise With Navy

Along with 600 other officers and men of the Naval Reserve, Raymond C. Snyder, water tender, first class, of Gatesville, Texas arrived at New Orleans, La., Feb. 8, after a 14-day training cruise to the Canal Zone and Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, aboard the destroyer-min layer USS Shannon.

This was the first postwar training cruise for the Eighth Naval District. The trip included sham battles, gunnery practice and a three-day liberty in Christobal, Canal Zone. Planes towed targets above the destroyer-min layer for anti-aircraft practice. Also making the cruise was the cruiser USS Macon.

Reservists left the ships after the cruise in civilian clothes and with checks for full pay allowance for their two-week annual tour of active duty. The Navy provided transportation to homes in the eight-state district, which includes Alabama, Arkansas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Oklahoma, Tennessee, Texas and extreme Northwest of Florida.

Next Friday Set For FFA and 4-H Club Boys Fat Stock Show Here

An event of wide interest is due to be staged in Gatesville, Friday, February 21, when the FFA Chapter Boys and the 4-H Clubs will hold their Fat Stock Show. The exhibit will be at the Ball Park in Gatesville and opens at ten o'clock.

According to County Agent W. P. Graham the boys will exhibit 18 fat calves 13 hogs and a number of sheep.

Two classes are designated with a \$25 award for the winner of each. A special prize has been arranged for the grand champion of the show, and possibly one for the reserve champion.

The Black Angus breed of cattle predominates in the calves being made ready for the show.

The event will be sponsored by the Gatesville Chamber of Commerce and County Agent Graham, general manager. The prizes are to be given by the Gatesville business men and firms.

There will be some 11 boys in the show. These are the highest quality Duroc. Most of these will go to Fort Worth March 5. For the first time in the history of the show, there will be entries of breeding cattle and sheep. Seth Turner will show a white Shorthorn heifer and a Shorthorn bull which he will take to Fort Worth. Mary Sue and Winifred Grimes will show four fine wool sheep.

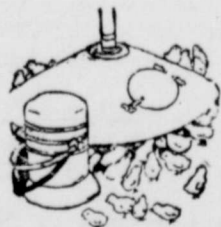

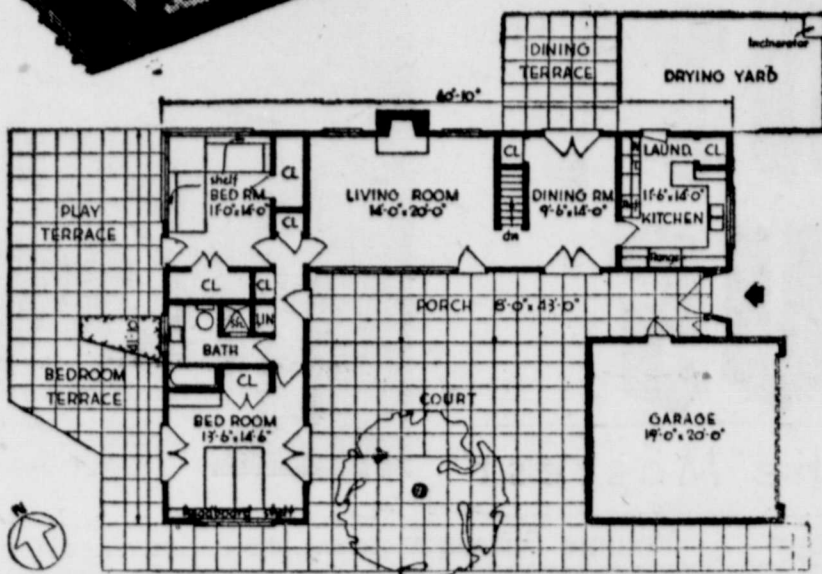

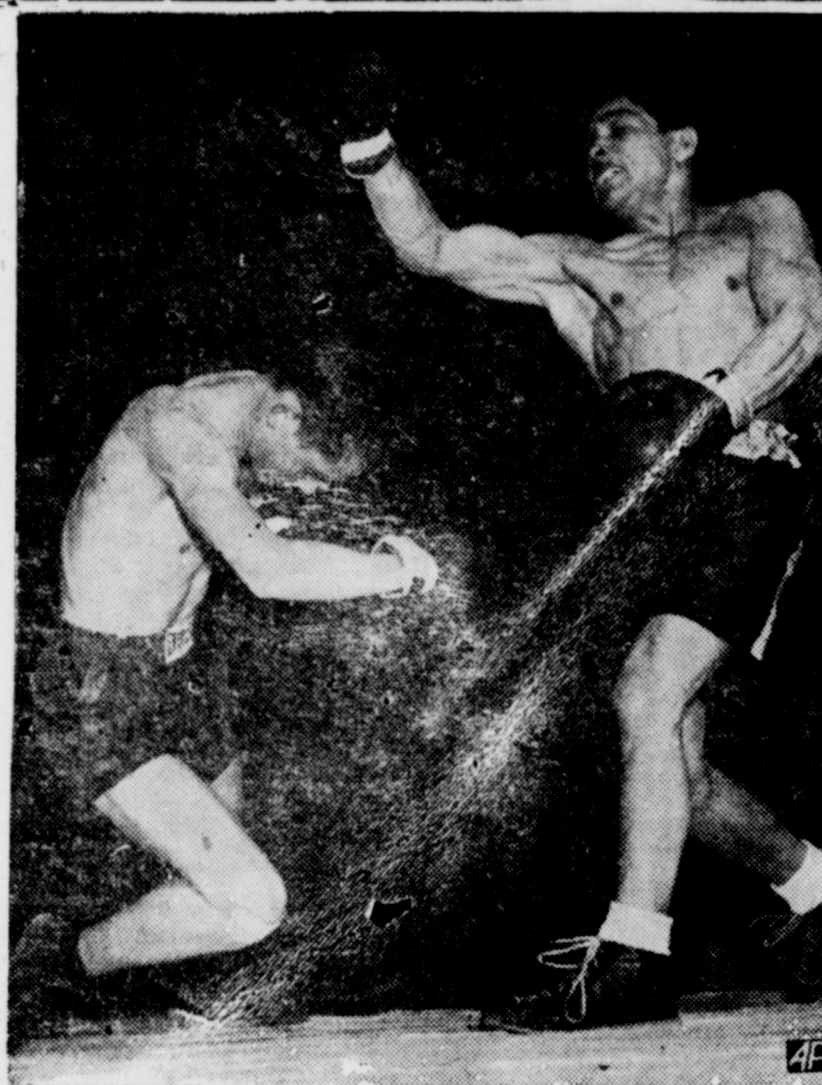

FIRE DESTROYS HOMES OF COLORED RESIDENTS AT NOON HOUR, SUNDAY

Fire became a serious threat to the colored colony of Gatesville last Sunday at about 12:30 o'clock.

The explosion of an oil cook stove being used in the preparation of the noon meal at the home of Otis (Bodiddle) Armstrong started a blaze that completely destroyed the residence and contents valued at some \$2,300.

Flying firebrands from the Armstrong home set on fire the house next door, residence of Johnny Dave (Buckshot) Easley, who was away at work. His wife was alone at home, and was able to save a few clothes from the holocaust, and these were said to be damaged. "Buckshot" computed his loss to be around \$1,100, and neither man carried insurance.

The blaze spread to the nearby church building, and to other home of the residents of "The Hill" but the response of the Gatesville firefighters to the alarm stopped the ravages before any other serious damage was done.

Chief of Staff of Siamese Army Visits Camp Hood Monday

As a C-47 taxied down the runway of the airstrip at Camp Hood, Monday afternoon, a 13-gun salute was rendered in honor of Maj. Gen. Netra Khemayothin, Deputy Chief of Staff of the Siamese army who arrived for an inspection of units of the 2nd Armored Division and post installations.

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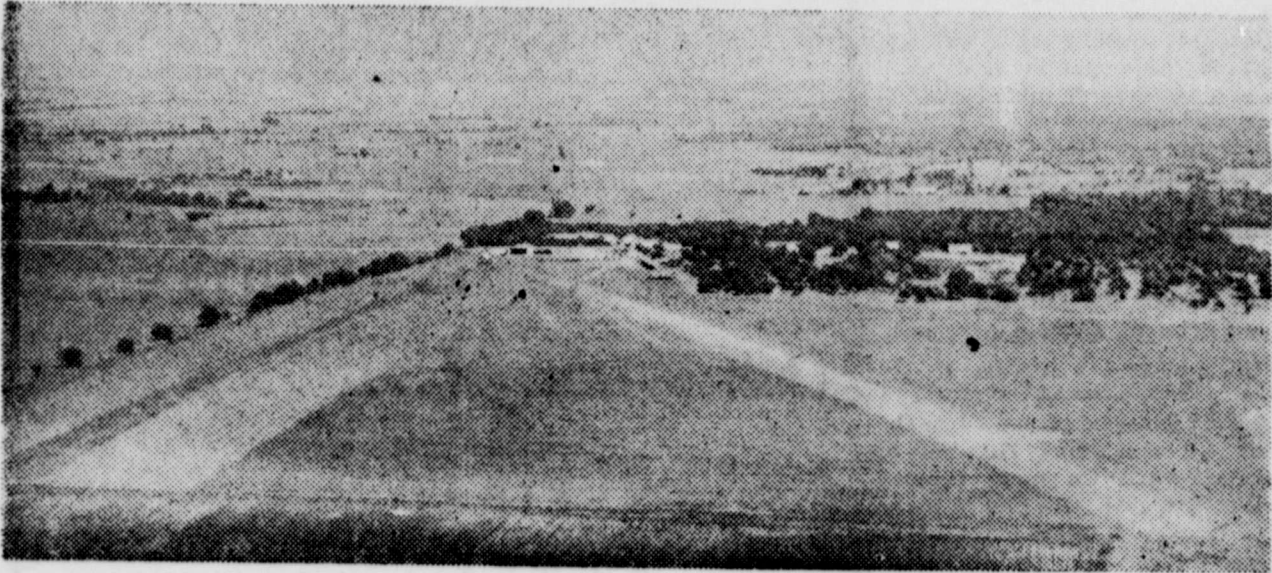

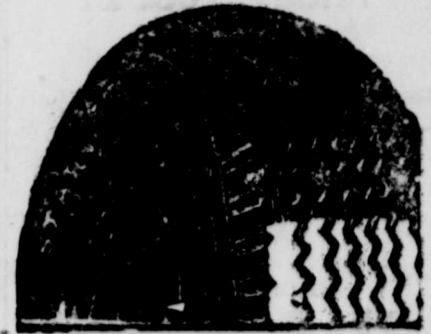
