





I returned today in time to attend a meeting with the Secretary of Agriculture and his staff in r gard to the foot and mouth disease. Our Agriculture Committee has just given a favorable report to a bill authorizing full cooperation with Mexico in an effort to stamp this terrible scourge out while it is sti'l in Mexico, and th Secretary has just assured us; that his Department is already working to try to protect the livestock industry of this country.

Last June, the 79th Congress passed a bill written in the Agricultural Committee of which I am a Member, known as the National School Lunch Act, which set up a p rmanent school lunch program. This Act authorized, and Congress later appropriated, \$75,000,000.00 for the fiscal year of 1947 (the fiscal year runs from July 1, 1946, through June 30, 1947). Of this \$75,000,000 Texas was allocated \$2,12 449, of which \$2,860,556 was to be spent for food and \$592,-892.00 was to be spent for equip-

This is far more mon y than had ever been provided for school lunches in the past. In fact, in the fiscal year of 1946, the Federal Government a rop and \$51,-000,000 and for some time the Federal appropriations have averaged about \$40,000,000 per year.

Prior to the passage of this Act, the School Lunch Program had been on a year-to-year basis. It was thought that by establishing a perman nt program under which the States would know what they were going to get that we cou'd improve the helpfulness of this Program to safeguard the health and well being of theN ation's poorer children.

,The amount appropriated to each state is based on the number of children in school in a given state and the need for assistance in the state as indicated by the r lation of the per capita income of the entire United States the per capita income in that state. The Law specifically provides for State matching of Federal Funds, but so far, our State has made no appropriation for this purpose.

I understand, however, that legislation has recently been introduced in the Texas L gislature to provide actual cash assistance from the State. It has been estimated that it will require in addition to the \$3,400,000 of Federal funds approximately a million more dollars from the State to carry this program through to the end of this school year.

The President's Budget has recommended that the Federal Government make another \$75,000,000 appropriattion n xt year for school lunches, and I expect to support this amount. There will, however, bes some opposition to
