LONDON, England, Feb. 27.—(AP)—Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin said today he and the foreign ministers of the United States, France and the Soviet Union would discuss at Moscow a Four-Power pact to prevent any new aggression in Europe.

Only a 4-power agreement will make it possible to curb Germany and to re-educate her in the ways of Democracy. Bevin told the House of Commons.

Inspector For City Says Schools Safe Throughout

Oscar Taylor, boilermaker, carpenter, plasterer, bicklayer, machinist, with years of experience in these and other lines of construction, made a report to Mayor Kermit R. Jones Thursday morning, after the City Council had requested a survey of conditions, particularly in the Elementary school building.

He said the boiler and heating system were in perfect shape that is, with just a little repair.

Boiler pressure, with plenty of heat in the rooms, is only 2-3 1/2 pounds per square inch, which he didn't think would blow out a window, much less a wall or a building.

He said there was no place for gas to pocket. That the flue or chimney would take off any waste gas or unburned gas. The automatic control is out of order, and if fixed, would be no more dangerous than a home hot water heater, and work similarly to it.

The boiler is in perfect condition, and the only thing that could be done to it was a few new flues. Radiators and return lines, barring a few minor repairs, leaks, etc., were in perfect shape.

He said there was no question but what a new building was needed, but there were absolutely no structural hazards in the old ones whatsoever.

The boiler has a safety valve soft plugs, and he thought 4 or 5 pounds would make it pop off, and with it carrying 15 pounds of pressure it would still be safe.

Lions Hear State Safety Investigator Of School Buildings

Entour in Texas, Arno'd Wittmann state investigator of school structural safety, was in Gatesville Wednesday on routine duties, and spoke to a large, attentive audience of local Lions at the regular luncheon meeting.

The speaker explained that many school buildings of today jeopardize the lives of the children and teachers and threaten disasters comparable or even worse than that of New London, which apparently has been forgotten.

Mr. Wittman said that a bill due for immediate passage by the Texas Legislature and House will require by law structural provisions for the safety of school children and teachers. Among the changes enumerated are that there are to be no basement boilers, no inside gas pipes, no open face gas stoves, no inside closets no dead-end halls, and all doors fitted with hardware that allows for egress of the school folks at all times under all circumstances, and other safety provisions substituting for the present almost universal structural faults of school buildings and equipment.

Lion Evan J. Smith, manager of the local Retail Merchants Association called attention to the announcement of the dates for the Credit Men's school to be held here next week.

Other announcements made were for the Chamber of Commerce banquet, the Firemen's Ball and Basketball games.
