Municipal Concert Possibilities To Be Presented Thursday, 13th.

William Z. Rozan, representative of Municipal Concerts, Houston, was here Monday in the interest of having Municipal concerts in Gatesville, sponsored by local clubs and civic organizations, with no financial guarantee.

He suggested a meeting Thursday evening, March 13, at the City Hall Auditorium, and requests one or more active representatives of every club and organization—men's and women's—in Gatesville and the surrounding communities, the high school principals, superintendents, school and music teachers, C. of C. Manager, church club representatives, as many members of the P.-T. A. as can come, and all interested persons, including newspaper representatives.

Here, briefly, is the plan, but Mr. Rozan will give the information in full on the evening mentioned above.

Mr. Rozan explained to newspaper men here that the concerts consist of a season of five or six performances of first-rate professionals, and that the concerts were being presented in Gilmer, Wharton, Marlin and other towns of this size. For the series, only an auditorium and piano are "musts".

A non-profit corporation is organized as a Municipal Concert Association and memberships are sold. After a sufficient number are sold, the contract for the performances is drawn up. The Corporation structure is also arranged by Mr. Rozan.

Mr. Rozan's work was recently featured in "Texas Week" (Jan. 25, 1947) and among the stars he has presented are Myron Taylor, formerly of "The Met", Walter Robert, pianist, NTSTC who has appeared in Europe, Canada and Cuba as well as in most states, a RCA-Victor and Columbia recording artist.

Court also upheld \$14,000 fine imposed on Lewis but ordered \$3,500.00 fine assessed against the United Mine Workers reduced to \$700,000.

Penalties grew out of Lewis' refusal to obey court order to head off 17-day soft coal strike last November.

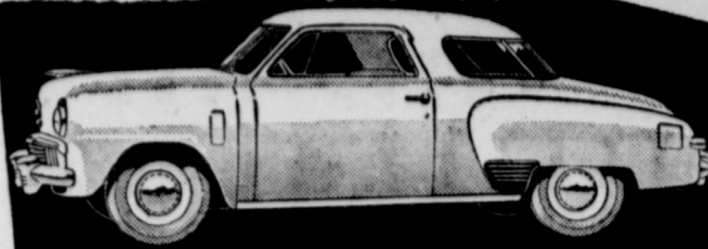

Frigidaire Has New Post-War Lines Coming Out

A complete new 1947 line of electric household ranges are being introduced by Frigidaire Division of General Motors it is announced today by W. T. Hix, Frigidaire dealer here who recently returned from a district meeting in Fort Worth.

"Production of the new ranges is well under way in the Company's huge Dayton, Ohio, plant," Mr. Hix said. "Feature model of the new line is a fully automatic, two-oven deluxe range. Design and construction are completely new—from the ground up," he pointed out.

Mr. Hix stressed the fact that many new features are being incorporated into the new range models. 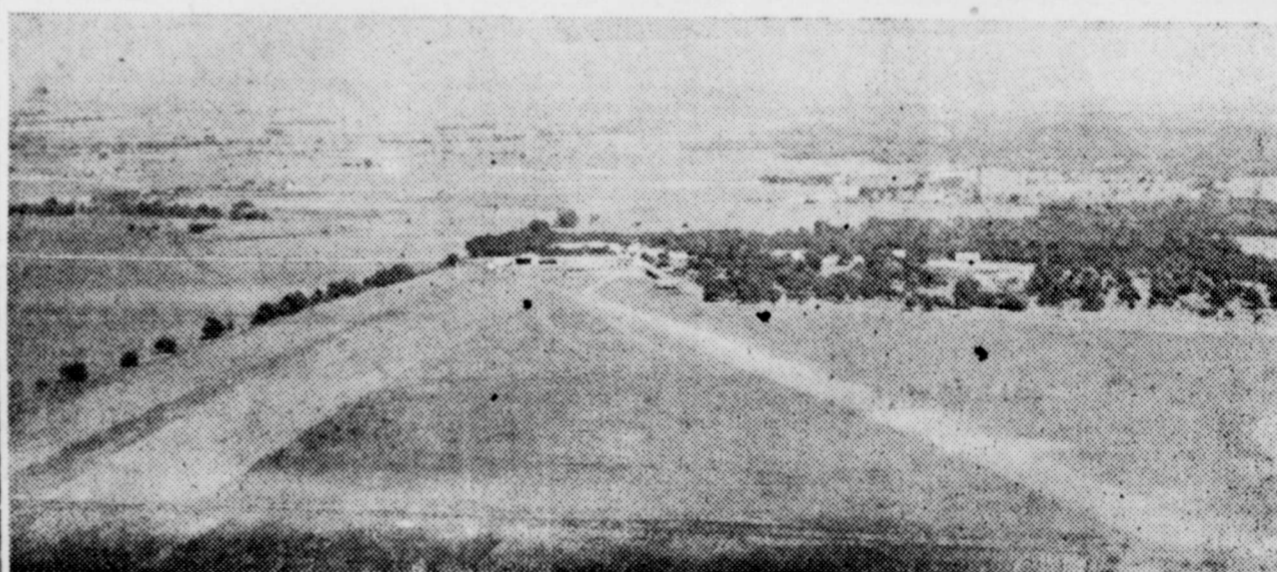


Alexander Graham Bell in an early demonstration of the telephone

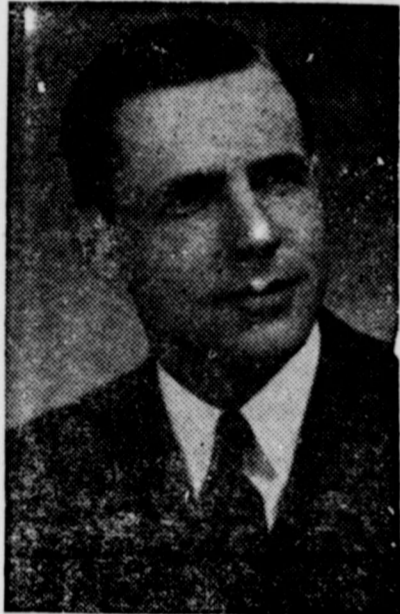
Two Turnersville Basketeers Out With Mumps

The House passed H.B. 300 and 301 raising teachers pay and per capita apportionment. The vote was 132 to 1.

But the job isn't finished. The Senate and Governor must approve this increase before it will go through. They are hesitating because of the cost, and if the peo-

ple fail to push them along, they may continue to hesitate.

It is clear now that teachers salaries cannot be increased without new taxes. If Bills 300 and 301 are passed, the state must find about 20 million extra dollars somewhere. The House now is ready to find that money in the oil fields, gas fields and sulphur mines. We are now waiting on the senate to act on the salary bills, then we can act on the natural resources tax bill.

A movement here is under way now to bring back horse-race gambling to Texas. General Wainwright came down and testified for it, and the committee approved it 100%. But, it will get strong opposition on the House floor. Plenty of us still want to keep old Texas as she is without bookies in every drug store, and without exposing our children to the vice of gambling and all the things that go with it. Once you legalize horse racing, then dog racing will come, then cock-fighting and so on. I feel sure we can defeat the bill even over the strength of the men from Houston, Dallas and other cities. But I may be wrong. Powerful money is behind it.

This morning the Right-to-Work Bill, the anti-picketing Bill and the governors over all plan to stop strikes are scheduled to come up. I am voting for all three measures. Every year new industry is coming to Texas and we have to be ready for it when it comes by getting laws to keep it free to develop. Strikes and labor disputes will not be tolerated in Texas.

The school lunch program has been approved in Committee and it will go through this week. You can thank yourselves for this—you hundreds of school children, parents and teachers who got busy and wrote to Austin. And I hope you fine youngsters will learn a good lesson from this. If you want something done, get together and flood the mails to your congressman. Your government is prone to lie like a sleeping giant. But if you give it a strong enough poke in the ribs, it will move along.

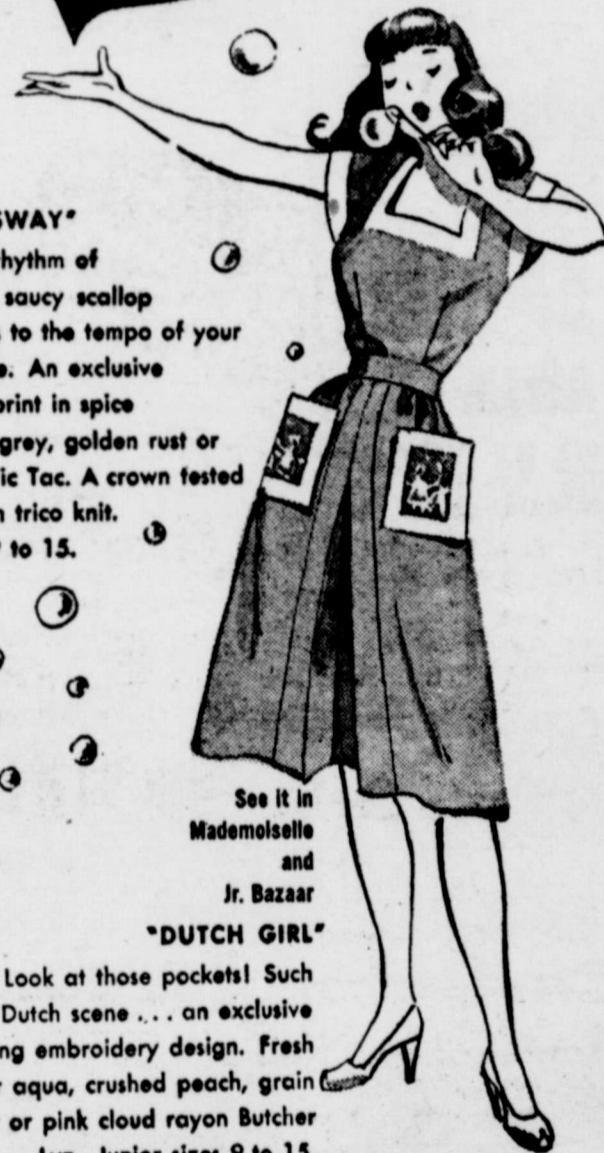
