MARSHALL PROPOSES REDUCTION, GERMANY

MOSCOW, Russia, Mar. 24.—(AP)—Authoritative
sources disclosed tonight that Secretary George M. Mar-
shall had proposed that the Council of Foreign Ministers
in effect order the reduction of Allied Occupation Forces
in Germany to a minimum necessary to carry out the
Allied policies and to protect security.

LEGISLATURE ADJOURNS, STEWART

AUSTIN, Texas, March 24.—(AP)—The 50th Legisla-
ture adjourned today in honor of the late Senator Lacy
Stewart of Houston who died Saturday.

Funeral services for Stewart were held in Houston to-
day. Both the House and the Senate met briefly, then
quit until 10 a. m. tomorrow.

PRORATION PERMITS 2,186,125 BBLs.

AUSTIN, Texas, March 24.—(AP)—An April proration
order designed to fill the "all-time high demand" for
Texas crude oil was issued today by the Texas Railroad
Commission. The order would permit production of
2,186,125 barrels of crude oil daily.

US MUST INVEST IN KOREA, ACHESON

WASHINGTON, D. C. March 24. (AP)—Under Sec-
retary of State Dean Acheson said today the U. S. must
invest funds to put Southern Korea on a sound economic
basis because Russia has blocked any agreement for a
unified government of that country.

Acheson said there are no plans to send troops to Greece
and Turkey.

Gatesville FFA Boys Hatching 600 Chicken Eggs

The Gatesville FFA boys had
600 eggs hatching last week in
their incubator. The eggs were
purchased by individual boys
from tested flocks and each boy
will take his chicks home and
raise them to be shown in a poul-
try show sponsored by the Cham-
ber of Commerce.

After the show the capons will
be sold locally as a means of de-
veloping a local market for the
capon chicken.

The vocational agriculture teach-
er J. J. Bates, said that the boys
are starting with good healthy
chicks and should have good luck
with their flocks. When a boy has
trouble the farm poultry will be
checked for disease, he added.

Farm Plan Sheets Now Being Mailed To ACA Cooperatives

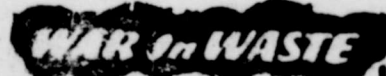
Farm Plan Sheets are now be-
ing mailed by the ACA office to
farm operators for the purpose of
determining 1947 acreages and pro-
duction on certain crops, accord-
ing to C. D. Stone, Administra-
tive officer. "It is thought that
these records will be used in the
future for insurance purposes and
any allotment program that may
come up; therefore, we feel it will
be to the interest of each farmer
to fill out his plan sheet and re-
turn it to the ACA office", Stone
stated.

A list of the 1947 soil-building
practices by which a farmer may
choose to earn his building al-
lowance for this year is being
mailed out along with the plan
sheet. Farmers are again remind-
ed that they must have a prior
approval from the County Com-
mittee for any practice they will
carry out before starting to work
on a practice if payment is to be
made for the practice.

Farmers should report perform-
ance on winter legumes, such as
Austrian Winter Peas and Vetch,
which they planted last fall as
soon as good stands and growth
has been obtained, but not later
than April 15, 1947.

John Henry Blackstock Honored Long Time Citizen Of Coryell Dies at Arnett

Death claimed John Henry Blackstock, affectionately called "Uncle Johnny", at his home at Arnett on Friday, March 14, at 10:45 o'clock in the evening. At his bedside when the end came were members of his devoted family and close friends.

On Sunday afternoon a great company of people gathered at Arnett Baptist church to honor the memory of a man they had loved in life. The memorial service was conducted by the Rev. R. M. Studer and Rev. Hubert Crain. Interment followed the church service, and the body of Uncle Johnny Blackstock was laid to rest in the Arnett cemetery, where the mound was covered with beautiful flowers, the floral pieces adorning the graves of those near by.

Mr. Blackstock, a native Texan, was active in his chosen avocation as a farmer until six years ago, when impaired health and advancing years brought his retirement. Left alone by the death of his wife, he spent his time for the past several years among his children, where he was always gladly welcomed as a member of household. John Henry Blackstock was born to James Blackstock and Mrs. Martha Jane Pennington Blackstock, April 28, 1860, he was married to Miss Abbie Allen, September 7, 1886.
