## AP The Byline of Dependability

### Lewis Denounces Krug

WASHINGTON, D. C., Apr. 3.—(AP)—John L. Lewis today denounced Secretary of the Interior Krug as "dishonorable" politician and demanded Congressional action to oust him from office.

The United Mine Workers chief made his plea to the house Labor Subcommittee shortly after Krug ordered closing of 518 government operated mines for safety reasons. His action involves about 40,000 miners.

Lewis called Krug's order belated, and added: "May God in Heaven forgive him" for not closing the pits before the 111 finers died in Centralia, Illinois mine explosion last week.

### Marshall Tries to "Trade"

MOSCOW, Russia, Apr. 3.—(AP) Secretary of State Geo. Marshall told the Council of Foreign Ministers today that the U. S. would be willing to consider limited German reparations from current production, but only if the Allied Powers agreed to leave in Germany a number of plants now earmarked for capital reparations

### Reparations Conference Is Failure

BERLIN, Germany, April 3.—(AP)—General Lucius D. Clay, the American Military Governor for Germany who was Secretary of State Marshall's chief advisor on German affairs in Moscow, said on his arrival here today from Russian capital that "All hope has been given up of reaching a settlement on reparations at this conference."

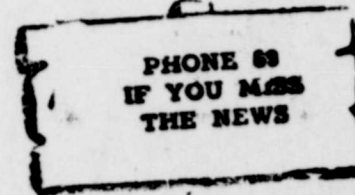

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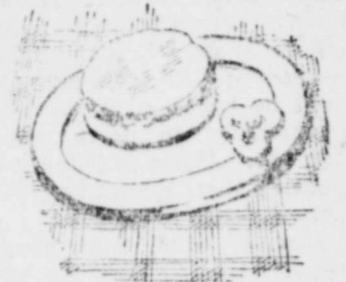
### Coryell Soil Building Practices to be Reported By April 15, 1947

Farmers are reminded that prior approvals on winter cover crops of Austrian winter peas, hairy vetch and ryegrass, will expire on April 15, 1947 and that

performance should be reported on these practices by this expiration date, according to Clois D. Stone, Administrative Officer of the Coryell County ACA. He further states that many approvals on such practices as terracing, cutting cedar, and planting pasture grasses and legumes, will also expire on that date. Each pro-

ducer who has an approval out should check it at once to see when the practice should be reported, as no payment can be made for the practice if it is not reported by the expiration date.

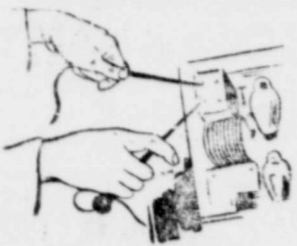

### AID FOR REFUGEES PLANNED BY SWISS

**BERN, Switzerland—(AP)—**The federal justice and police department is studying the possibility of granting permanent asylum to between 4,000 and 5,000 refugees in Switzerland.

During the war, temporary asylum was given to a total of 283,000 refugees from 28 countries. Many of these were persons who came into Switzerland in fear of imprisonment or death. Some of them were remnants of Axis armies routed by allied victors. The bulk of the refugees have been repatriated.

Approximately 5,000 who remain consist mostly of aged persons, children, or individuals too ill to move. Most of them are in internment camps or in homes. Some children are in Swiss homes where they have become almost foster children in Swiss families. The question of granting Swiss citizenship to these children is under consideration.

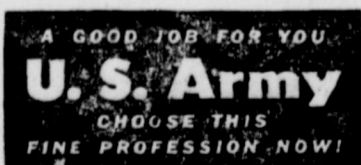

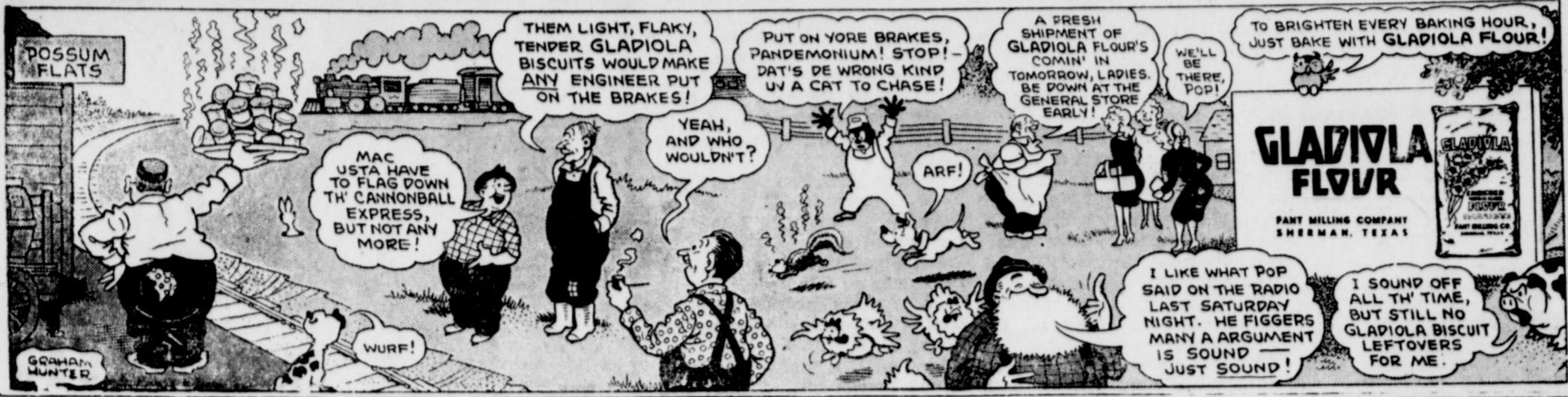

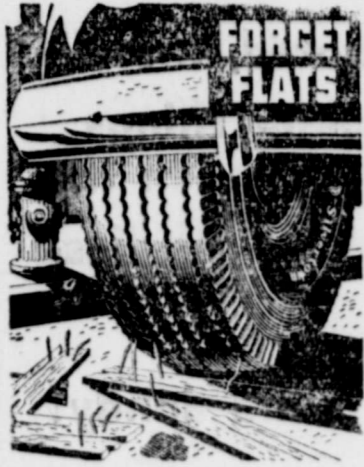
