Razing A Gatesville Residence Landmark For New Building

Workmen are busy this week tearing down the old residence, which for a number of years had been the scott home, and which is." now the property of Irvin Scott.


The house was said to have stood there through fair weather and storms for almost a hundred. years, or maybe quite, but the lumber is fairly well preserved, looking like almost new where it is piled up by the workmen. On Thursday morning the only remnant of the house, which had deteriorated to a point of being uninhabitable, was the brick chimney and wide, blackened fireplace.
