home today.

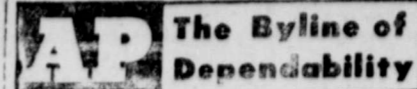
Texas City Fund Started: Red Cross Handles Funds

AFL-CIO Attempt Merger

WASHINGTON, D. C. April 2.
(AP)—The AFL Labor Executive
Council today invited the CIO
Peace CSommittee to confer here
Thursday on the merger of the
two big labor organizations.

meeting of the council to discuss
general problems, including the
prospect that Congress will enact
sharp restrictions on labor union
activities.

Dead In Texas City 421: Still Goin'

TEXAS CITY, April 21.—(AP)—
Roy Wade, an official of Depart-
ment of Public Safety, announced
today the explosion dead in this
sorrowing coastal city now totals
421 and the list will reach not
less than 575.

Wade said 295 persons were
still missing, and 132 victims re-
main unidentified.

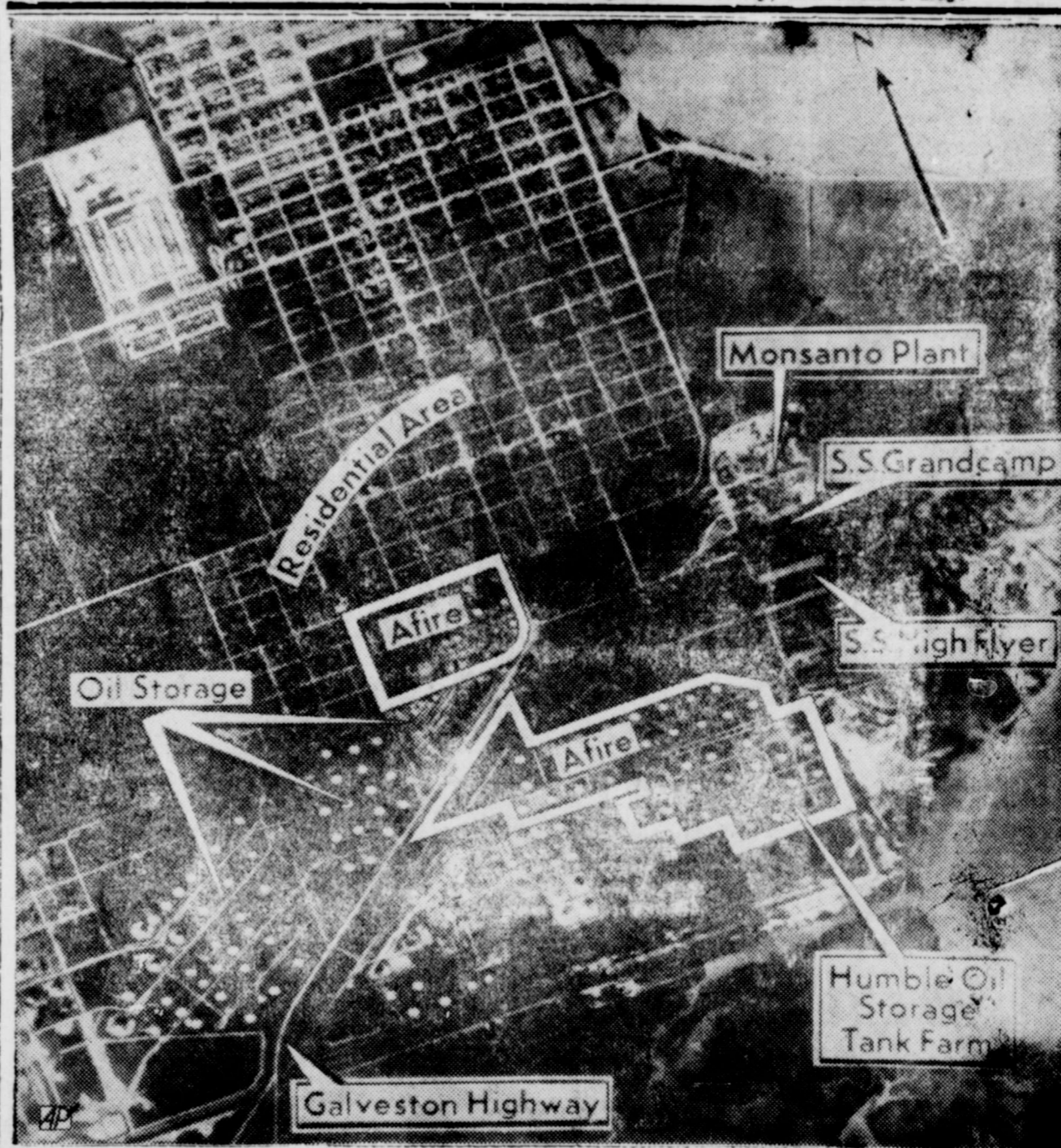
Mayor J. C. Trahan reassured

Trum anCautious, Situation "Acute"

NEW YORK, N. Y. April 21—
(AP)—President Harry S. Truman,
cautioning that the economic sit-
uation was "acute", appealed to-
day for a unified effort to bring
prices down and prevent depres-
sion.

Addressing the annual luncheon
of members of the Associated
Press, the Chief Executive said
there must be moderation on the
part of business, forbearance on
the part of labor, plus greater
productivity, all-out effort on the
part of the farmer, and Jwise
guidance and action on the part
of the government. He reiterated
his plea against cutting taxes now
and called for the extension of
rent, export and credit controls.

Dear Friends:

Once more the House of Representatives has passed a comprehensive labor bill. For many years most of our people have recognized that unless we take steps to control and curb some of the irresponsible labor leaders that they will take over the very control of our country itself. John L. Lewis has made his contempt for the public very clear. Little Caesar Patillo has delightedly thumbed his nose at the public and has insisted that before high school bands could play the "Star Spangled Banner" that a group of his fembers must be paid full wages for doing nothing.

No nation can maintain its sovereignty if any group, be it a labor union or a group of Wall Street bankers, can place their own profits ahead of the public welfare and ignore the rights and needs of the public. Years ago we real-

ized the danger of the concentration of wealth and passed anti-trust laws. We did not, however, recognize that when given the same power combinations of labor unions might become just as dangerous. We, therefore, gave these unions special privileges and denied employers even their fundamental right of free speech by making it unlawful for an employer to present his side of a labor dispute to his employees. Undoubtedly we went too far and unscrupulous labor leaders took advantage of the opportunity.

Some unions (not all) turned their affairs over to little groups often communistic fellow travelers with criminal records) who collected dues and made no reports. Many unions adopted "feather bedding" rules that prevent a man from giving an honest day's work. Other unions have engaged in inexcusable violence

as a part of so-called mass picketing.

These practices have hurt the honest and law abiding unions just as much as they have hurt any other group. They must be corrected. It is evident that the unions themselves can no more clean up the mess than could honest business men of a half a century ago stop the abuses of the trusts. It took legislation then to control the irresponsible elements of capital. It will take legislation now to control the irresponsible elements of labor. Just as it was said then that any legislation would destroy the rights of business, so it is said today that any legislation will destroy labor. Just as it actually helped honest business to control the dishonest, so it will help the patriotic labor organizations to control the activities of the irresponsible and the selfish.

The House bill will not destroy any honest labor union. I voted with the majority of both Democrats and Republicans for the bill and against the delaying motion to recommit. The bill passed by a vote of 308 to 107.

Last week it was my privilege to represent the United States as one of our ten delegates to the meeting of the Interparliamentary Union in Cairo. Our delegation was headed by Senator Alben Barkley of Kentucky and was composed of members of both Houses and both parties. The Interparliamentary Union is one of the oldest and best established international organizations. It has no power to bind the governments represented, but it does provide a means whereby the Representatives of the people may get together and try to work along similar lines. For instance, at this meeting the American delegation was successful in showing the representatives of other legislative bodies some of the problems that confront us in connection with the return of German minorities in Europe.

It would seem at first glance to be desirable to return these people to Germany as rapidly as possible, and this is what many of the small countries wanted to do with the Germans in their countries. We pointed out that while we had allowed the removal of the most troublesome groups, we felt it was unfair to burden the American tax payers with the expense of maintaining more of these people, and that is what it would mean if they were to be sent to our Occupation Zone at this time.

On our way home we stopped in Turkey and Greece. I was happy to find the Turks so determined to resist any aggression from any direction. I believe that with reasonable assurance of aid, these people can be counted on to stop any Russian move to expand at their expense. While conditions are much worse in Greece, which country has suffered terribly as a result of the Italian and German aggression, I was pleased to find much evidence that the elections in that country undoubtedly reflect the views of the majority of the people.

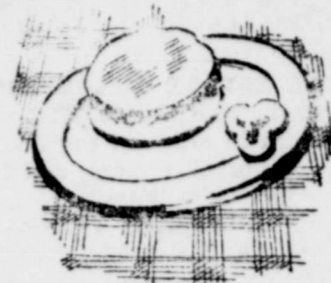

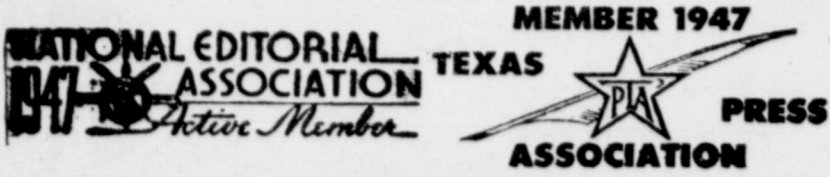

Dear Friends:

The legislature is feeling the pressure of time now. It is a slow process to pass a law, even a good law, and now we have only a month left to pass or kill some 300 prepared laws. So each member is striving to get his bill on top and up for consideration. When we adjourn, all bills not considered will die like a runner on third base.

There is one bill, however, that will not die. It's up now and will have to be killed. That's the redistricting bill. Members from small districts are fighting tooth and nail to kill it, and I'm one of them. If the districts are changed Coryell County can forget about ever again electing a Representative. Our district will be made to include Coryell and McLennan Counties instead of Coryell and Hamilton. Yesterday, however, the Senate voted 15 to 11 not to consider redistricting and thus put a good strong delay on redistricting.

Yesterday, Phil Willis from Kaufman county introduced and passed a bill that will allow five men who live within ten miles of a Lunatic Asylum form an Advisory Board to help the Superintendent of the Institution present the needs and facts about the Institution to the Board of Control.

I had the bill amended to include the Gatesville Training School. Perhaps the boys will not like being classed in a law with lunatics, but I think our people should have some say in policies of the school.

Men in Austin representing the Medical Profession are reported this morning as having accepted a "Grandfather" clause in the Basic Science Bill. This is seeming to revive the bill and some say injures its passage. I am supporting it.

This clause will allow all present practicing chiropractors to take a basic science test given by medical doctors before beginning their study of chiropractics.

The House just voted a constitutional amendment that would let the people decide if they want eliminate the State Ad Valorem Taxes. I am supporting the measure. My idea is to shift as much of the tax burden on to natural resources as possible to relieve the small tax payer. It will take 100 votes out of 150, however, and I doubt that we can get them.

We have just passed a constitutional amendment allowing counties to set up insurance provisions for county employees. It is permissive, that is, the county is permitted not required, to insure its employees.

Dog owners now can rest easier. A bill is on its way through making it a felony for stealing a valuable dog. Also, already passed is a bill allowing dogs and any live stock to be tattooed by the owner as a brand and that brand be registered under the owners.

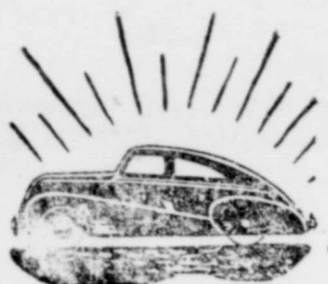

Western Union Helps In Texas City Disaster

TEXAS CITY, April 17—Telegraph people today carried on the handling of a flood of rescue messages in the windowless Western Union office here after many hours of emergency duty.

All available telegraph personnel have been transported here by air, rail and automobile from all over the southwest to assist in handling telegraphed inquiries from relatives of victims and other

urgent messages from all parts of the country. Boy Scouts volunteered the use of their bicycles and services to assist the augmented force of messengers; Red Cross and police officials are lending their cooperation in locating displaced addresses of telegrams in emergency. Telegraph circuits and equipment were made immediately available to the American Red Cross, which set up temporary headquarters in the city to handle the recruiting of disaster units from all over the United States.

Following the fire and explosions here Western Union workers restored telegraph service from the scene of disaster at 1:30 p. m. yesterday. Fortunately no telegraph poles were injured. Damage to the Western Union office and lines was quickly repaired to the extent that operations could be resumed.

Following orders by the U. S. Army and State Police to evacuate the city, the telegraph force moved last night to LaMarque, two miles northwest of Texas City where emergency office was established to handle the flood of rescue messages to and from this stricken city. The local telegraph office reopened this morning and the LaMarque office is being continued to supplement the service there.

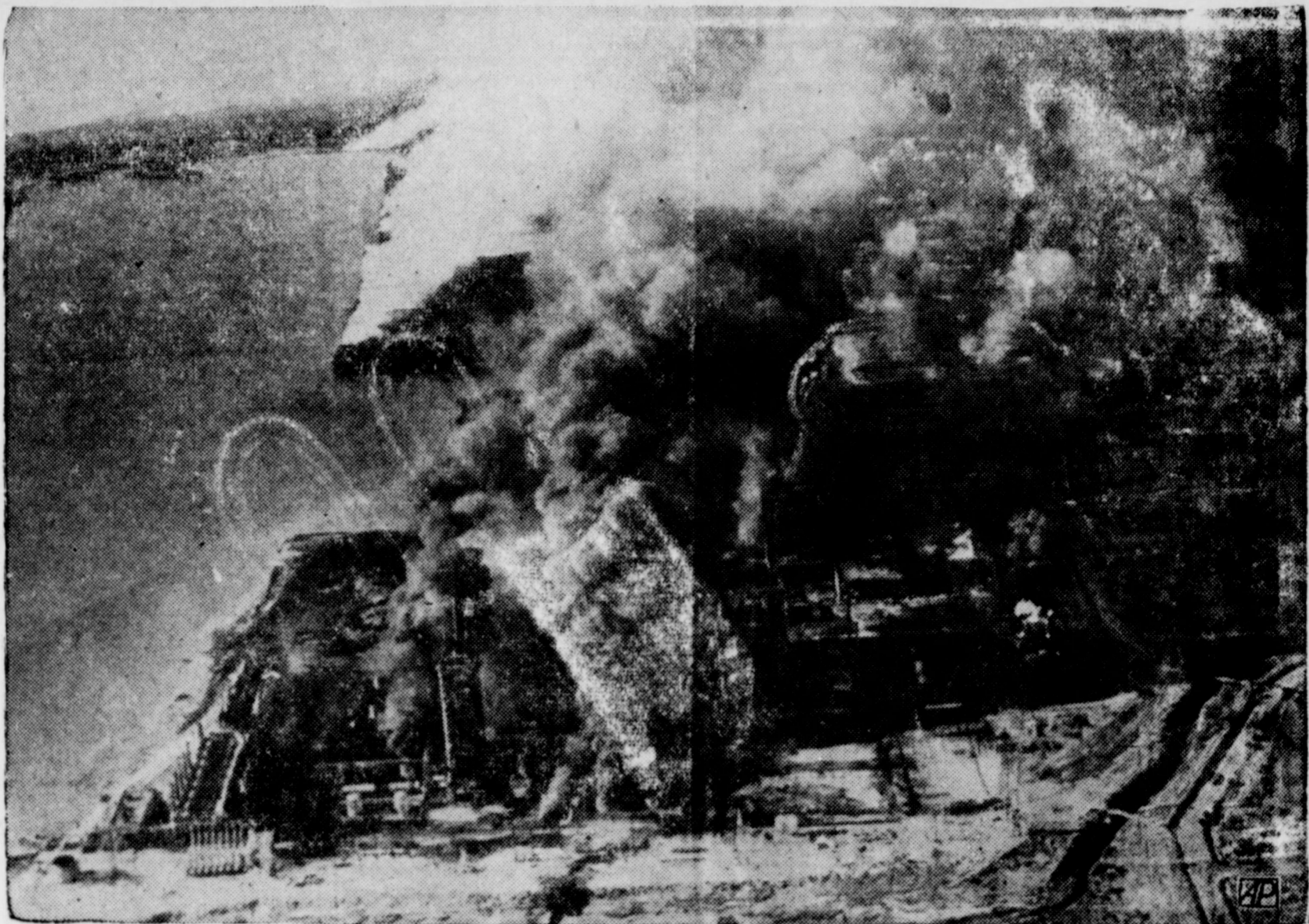
