One Week of Revival Services Begin Next Sunday At First Baptist Church

Beginning next Sunday morning, the First Baptist Church will engage in a one week revival with services at 10 a. m. and 8 p. m. daily. Dr. W. R. White of Austin will do the preaching and Mr. Edgar Spearman of Dallas will direct the singing.

Church leaders feel that Gatesville is fortunate in securing Dr. White for a week's revival. He is known as one of the great preachers in the Southern Baptist territory. He is pastor of the First Baptist Church of Austin where he serves the state as well as the great college center.

Mr. Spearman is well known in the southwest. He served as educational director for the Highland Baptist church, Dallas for 10 years. Attendants at the revival will delight in his rich, mellow, golden baritone solos. Church leaders say he is a great director of Gospel Music and congregational singing. The church plans two choirs during the revival, the regular choir and a Youth Choir located in the balcony.

Mr. Spearman will arrive in Gatesville Saturday and will be in the Sunday services. Dr. White who is attending the St. Louis convention this week, will fly to Austin to fill his pulpit Sunday and will be in Gatesville Monday to be in the first service with the local church Monday evening.

The church plans prayer groups each evening at 7:30 for men, women, young people, and juniors. The recent religious census reveals that there are more than 1,000 people in Gatesville who are unattached Baptists or unsaved who prefer the Baptist Church. Thus the local congregation is faced with a great challenge to reach and enlist its possibilities which it seeks to do through the revival effort.

Visiting friends are invited to attend the services throughout the week.

City Delivery is Curtailed: No Funds, Says Post Master

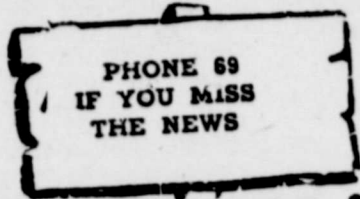

Jester said instances were reported to him of undertakers holding bodies without permission and refusing to return them to the morgue or relatives until high price funerals had been contracted for.

UNION AND PHONE CO. AGREE ON \$4.40 WEEK

WASHINGTON, D. C. May 8.—(P)—Company and Union officials agreed today to settle the strike of long distance operators for pay hikes averaging \$4.40 a week and the government predicted a quick end to the whole coast-to-coast telephone tieup.

John J. Morgan, President of the American Union of Telephone workers, said the long distance walkout would end as soon as his nine-member board oked the settlement, possibly late today in New York.

WASHINGTON NEWS



FROM OUR CONGRESSMAN



W. R. POAGE

May 1, 1947.

Dear Friends:

This letter is being written one day earlier this week as it is necessary for me to go to Texas within a couple of hours. Mrs Poage is now in the hospital at Waco and is to undergo an operation Saturday morning. I am flying down, but if she does well, I should be back long before this letter reaches most of you.

The House has had a very heavy schedule this week and has passed on some important legislation. For most of three days we debated the bill for the relief of the destitute in Europe and Asia. Since the termination of UNRA, there is no organization capable of doing anything like the job of relief that is needed in the war-ridden countries. Of course, the job is decreasing, but it is still challenging. The House voted \$200,000,000 for this work. There was considerable thought that we should deny all relief to communistic dominated countries. This would have amounted to telling the people of Poland, Hungary, and possibly of Czechoslovakia that even though they could not help themselves, we would not help them. The fact that the Red Army still oppresses them does not prove that they want to be communistic. It was therefore, finally agreed that no relief should be distributed in such countries except by American missions who would deliver the goods directly to the needy. In other words, we are not going to allow these governments to hand'e any of this relief, but we are not going to refuse to feed the hungry simply because the hungry person's government is controlled by Russia. We believe that in this way we can hope to show these people that America wants them as friends and that we feed them while Russia only oppresses them. At the same time we made sure that our representations will be admitted freely. If they are not, then there will be no relief.—In other words, we propose to push the "iron curtain" aside where we feed the people. I voted for the amendment and then voted for the bill.

Late tonight (8 p. m., May 1st.) we passed a bill to continue rent control and some building controls. The argument was made that the housing situation is bad, and we must extend controls. As I see it, much of our present housing problem is due to the fact that rent control has forced many people to buy homes at inflated prices. I realize that the problem of housing takes much more time to adjust than the problems of consumer goods. It is probable that any time we take off rent control there will be a violent and in many cases unfair increase in rent. On the other hand, I had hoped that the advocates of rent control would be willing to allow some reasonable increase in rentals across the board. I voted to allow 10% increase, but it was defeated. Therefore, the only way to do justice to those who depend on the income from their rented property is to let rent control die on June 30. In fact, this date itself involves a continuation of controls far past the date imposed on most commodities.

I believe that now that the war is over, we must decide whether we are to let the government go on running our business forever. Personally, I want to see us return to private control of private property. I doubt if there will ever be a time when this can be done without hurt, but I don't think that it will hurt any more now than later. In fact, the longer

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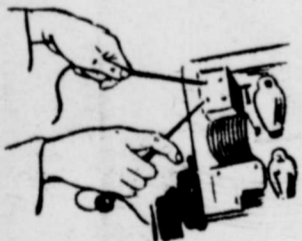

we retain these controls, the harder it is going to be to end them, and in the meantime, the less construction of new rental housing there is going to be for veterans or anybody else. In addition, this bill was so contradictory that even the advocates of continued control admitted it would probably only add to confusion. I, therefore, voted against the bill.

The House also adopted a conference report on the "portal-to-portal" bill. I do not think that this compromise between the House and Senate is as clear as the original House bill. It still leaves the question of what is "essential work" to the courts. I fear that further needless litigation will result, but it is certainly

far better than the present uncertain situation. I, therefore, voted for this bill.

We also passed a conference report on the first deficiency appropriations bill which made it possible to pay millions of veterans and after considerable debate, we allowed the District of Columbia to decide for itself whether it wanted daylight saving time.

In addition, we entertained President A'eman of Mexico at a joint session of the House and Senate on Thursday. He received a most enthusiastic greeting. I think that much good should come to the Presidents of the respective of the mutual courtesies extended by Mexico and the United States countries.
