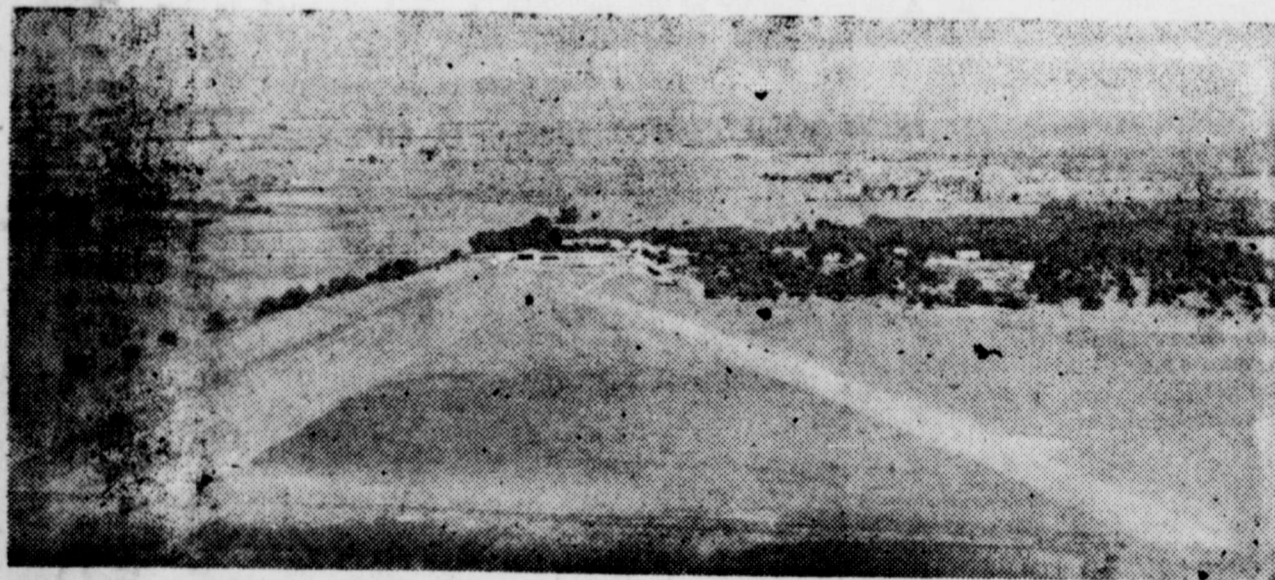

## Inventor Says Arid Lands Can Be Made Green Without Irrigation

 WASHINGTON, June 10, 1947. AP—Dr. Lytle S. Adams says the arid lands of the west could be made green without irrigation through air sowing of seed pelleted

acre by reducing or eliminating thinning.

Already, he says, Australia, New Zealand, Chile and Argentina are negotiating to apply the new method to their deserts.

Adams, a retired Seattle dentist, developed the seed and the planting method. He persuaded the Interior Department to give his invention a trial on more than 50,000 acres of arid Indian Lands in Arizona. In Texas, he has air-planted more than 10,000 acres for private owners.

"We think we've got something, but we DON'T want to go out on a limb and say it's wonderful," says Edward N. Kavanagh, director of Soil and Moisture Conservation of the Interior Department. "Time alone will tell. We should have a better idea this summer as to the results of the seeding of 10,000 acres of the Papago Reservation (near Sells, Ariz.) that was done in June 1946. That seeding was followed by one of the wettest rainy seasons on record, and the seeded grass looked pretty good. There's an extreme drought in the area now, and the real test is under way."

At Tucson, Ariz., Joel Eugene Fletcher, Agriculture Department soil technologist, says air sowing with pelleted seed on the Papago Reservation had met with success, but adds that "the method doesn't come anywhere near comparing with some of the other methods which cost about the same."

Adams counters on a part of the Papago Reservation barren when it was seeded a year ago, there were eighty bunches of grass per square rod by October. Thirty days later, he says, the plants had more than doubled although the region had not had 10 inches of rain since June.

Adams developed the pea-sized pellets he now employs. They contain husked seed, fertilizer, insect and rodent repellents and soil chemicals which may be lacking. At the first touch of rain the pellet dissolves, and the milled seed germinates, much more swiftly than does seed protected by its hull.

"In the Southwest," he says, "we have principally used Lehman's Love grass, a palatable, hardy import from South Africa. Cattle fed on it gain two pounds a day. It will grow on less than 10 inches of rain a year."

Normally at least 15 inches of annual rain is required for minimum forage.

In air seeding, the pellets are dropped on a pattern of one to a square foot. Each pellet can contain one or a dozen or more single seeds of a single or several grass varieties. Adams says there is a continuous saving in fertilizer, since all that is needed is clustered about the seed.

Secretary of Interior Krug, in his 1947 report to the President, said:

"Reseeding of grazing lands can be speeded up and also be done most economically by plane.

"The cost of seeding by this method is about \$2 an acre, compared to \$4 for seeding with ordinary farm machinery."

### What to Do About It

There is one way, and only one way, to avoid a serious depression, and that way is open to the American people. Responsibility rests firmly upon each of us, no matter what may be our economic status or individual social background, to choose out this proper course. There is no way to go, if we should face into a depression, except toward hard work and the high productivity of industrial peace.

That's the formula that will enable us to weather a business recession, provided we begin to use it now. We must all tighten our belts, get our feet on the ground, and go to work just as hard as we can work. A greatly increased measure of productivity per man-hour is the best answer to the present situation that can be thought up.

### Down With Prices

With increased productivity, with an honest hour's labor given for every hour's pay, we could see a considerable lowering of prices. Indeed, with genuine whole-hearted cooperation from labor and industry, it would be quite possible to increase output as much as 40% generally. This should be enough to bring about a general 25% reduction in prices. This could be done with our present labor force and without increased working hours.

This would in fact bring prices down until it would be equivalent to an increase in wages. This is the one sound answer to the present threat of a depression. Such answer would also give us hope of regaining our foreign markets, which have had little attention paid to them since the war.

### Wisdom of a Sage

The importance of this thing prompted Bernard M. Baruch to state recently that the whole post-war world would "get going only if men work" and to come out for a 5 1/2 day, 44 hour week. The seriousness of the problem we face is such that we may be able to save civilization if we accept the challenge. Mr. Baruch said, adding that this would mean greater effort than that exerted during the war.

In proposing a 44 hour work week, "with no strikes or layoffs to January 1, 1949," as a means of increasing production, Mr. Baruch recognized our present tendencies to put limitations on our work. He emphasized that a way must be found for production to flow smoothly. This achieved, then a "sense of security would return to worker and employer, and the reaction upon the economy of the world would be deep and lasting."

### Heads Together

The sage Mr. Baruch has more. "Until we have unity, until we straighten out and solve our problems of production, and have internal stability, there is no basis on which the world can renew itself physically or spiritually," he continued. If labor and industry would put their heads together, come to a realistic solution of their problems, shake hands across the table and go to work in earnest to whip this threat of immediate depression through maximum and whole-hearted production, then no one would have anything to fear.

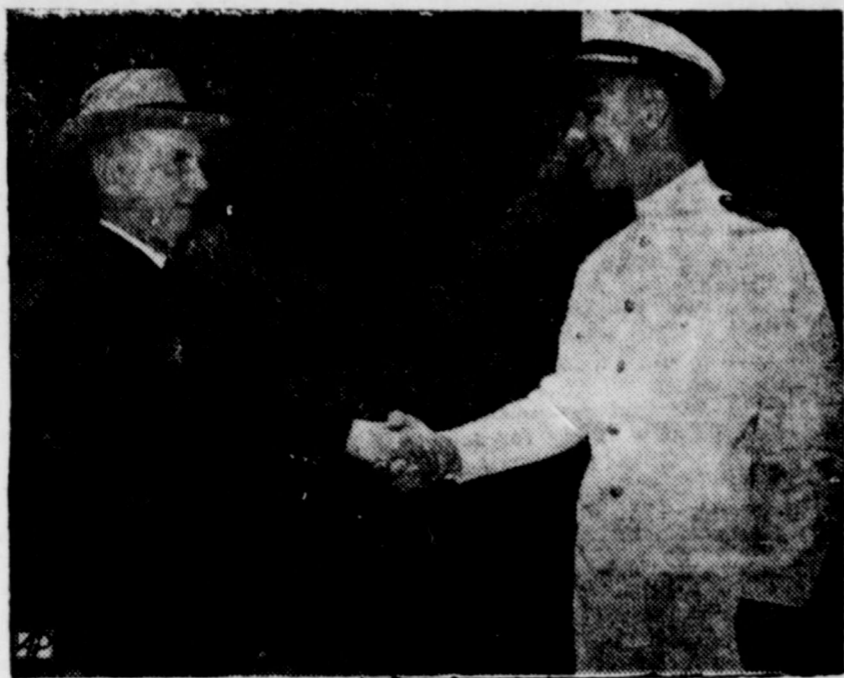

**Free Elections**

Ever pay any attention to your newspaper reports of trouble encountered in the smaller European nations concerning free elections? The former satellites of Nazi Germany, and the present satellites of Soviet Russia, are finding the ideal of elections incompatible with those political doctrines that have been foisted upon them. Such insane foolishness as having the masses go to the polls for honest and secret voting, they say, is reserved for the decadent democracies.

These classless and enlightened denizens under benevolent socialist governments (that's the picture drawn up for consumption of peoples still ruled by despotic capitalists) do not of course value the power of the vote. They do not know what a democracy the

will of the people to develop through free speech, a free press, and free elections, the fetters of ruling classes are likely to remain.

**Example, Britain**

No nation can have free elections, while at the same time it tries to artificially discipline its labor force and foster government management of industry. Recent events in Britain give point to this statement. It was evident to me while in England last August that the nation was in for trouble. Absenteeism of workers in coal mines had risen to about 25%, and this was reduced to 18% only in January, when the coal famine was already a reality. Productivity remained inexplicably low.

Because there was a lack of national discipline, that is, the normal self-discipline common in America's industrial workers, coal was not coming from the mines. Parliament was afraid to discipline the miners to get coal. Parliament feared results at the next election. This explains why the labor government calmly watched the coal crisis develop, step by step, fully aware that it was coming.

**No Ruling Classes**

No country can promote government management of industry, as England is trying to do, and maintain discipline of labor along with free elections. Stalin has the first two, in good measure, but he is not troubled with elections. Free elections under present conditions in Russia would have little meaning. They are a risk that the Soviet ruling class could never assume.

We in America have found that the best type of discipline comes from incentives found in the ambition to get ahead. When a man knows he can better his lot and is not afraid to try, the best kind of self-discipline is the result. The lowliest immigrant can become a great inventor. An assembly line worker can plan to own the factory, and can do it honestly. Things like these have happened too often to go unnoticed.

If we want to keep high efficiency, with the highest possible wages and an increasing standard of living, we must keep private ownership and private management of the tools of production. Holding to these things in a free market and cherishing the freedoms of speech, assembly, and press, we shall have little fear of dictatorship. Free elections would not permit it.

# WASHINGTON NEWS



June 6, 1947.

Dear Friends:

This week the House approved the conference reports (compromises between the House and Senate) on both the Tax bill and the Labor Bill.

The Tax Bill is finally passed was a great improvement on the original Knutsnon Bill which promised a "straight 20% cut across the board". The democrats were so successful in showing that if any tax cut were to be made that it should be in behalf of the small tax payers that the Republicans have made some attempt to graduate the reduction. I recognize the need for relief at the bottom of the load, and I voted to give it in the form of an increase in the personal and family exemptions in the lowest brackets, but I think that most of us who are making fairly good incomes should pay taxes while times are good. I think that now is the time to pay our debt—not after we get into a depression. I, therefore voted against this conference report.

The compromise Labor Bill which we passed will not cure all our labor troubles. It is definitely not as strong as the bill originally passed by the House, but it is certainly the best bill that we can get. Here are a few of the things it does:

1. It prohibits the closed shop but permits the union shop where agreed to by a majority of employees in a plant.
2. It undertakes to restore the freedom of speech to employers, which has been virtually prohibited by the Wagner Act.
3. It bans featherbedding practices that add to production costs.
4. It imposes a penalty on strikes against the government.
5. It prohibits political contributions by unions as well as by corporations and requires unions to make financial reports.
6. It attempts to prohibit Communists from holding office in labor unions under the Act.
7. It prohibits a check-off of money from a worker's wages for union dues unless the worker gives his consent in writing.

It gives the President authority to seek through the Attorney General an injunction to prevent a strike affecting the national

health and safety of the people. The injunction would expire after 75 days.

9. It defines unfair labor practice. It makes void the practices by unions as well as by employers. Heretofore no act of a union would constitute an unfair practice. It makes jurisdictional strikes and boycotts "unfair labor practices".

10. It permits suits for damages against either side to a labor-management contract for breach of the contract.

11. Employers are no longer required to bargain collectively with foremen, and any welfare funds provided by contract must be administered jointly by the employer and union.

12. It attempts to regulate picketing and to prohibit violence. I voted for the conference report.

Yesterday the House passed the Army Appropriation Bill with about a 10% cut. During the consideration we were able to restore \$40,000,000 which the Republican Committee had cut from the funds available for the construction of military aircraft. I consider it essential that America remain the strongest air power in the world. I, therefore, voted for this amendment. I am not going to knowingly allow our country to be caught without the latest and most modern aircraft.

As this is written (5:30 p. m., June 6th) we are still debating a bill to authorize the State Department to continue the foreign information program known as the "Voice of America". While I realize that this program has been conducted by some very inefficient and radical individuals, I feel that it is vital to our national welfare that other nations be given a fair picture of our country. Therefore, I am going to trust General Marshall to "clean house" and expect to vote for the bill.
