"Under House Joint Resolution 80th Congress, approved by The President on June 30, 1947, the 3-cent letter rate and other postage rates and fees in effect on that date are continued thereafter on a permanent basis.

"Postmasters should notify local newspapers and radio stations continue to require such rates and fees. This information will appear in the Postal Bulletin at a later date."

There you are!

First and Only Rotary Hay Baler In Texas Operating in Coryell!

Coryell County leads again! Nothing unusual about that! The only rotary hay baler in Texas is operating in Coryell County, and is owned by A. E. Whisenhunt of near Ater. It is being shown in different places in Coryell County and was last operating on Joe Hanna's Ranch near Pidcoke.

Now, we haven't seen this particular hay baler operate, but we saw a drawing of it, and one of the round bales it made.

Here's a nontechnical description of it. It looks like a part of a combine, with a gadget in front that scoops up the hay, after it has been windrowed. In some peculiar manner it gets mixed up with twine and the hay rolled like a "rollem up" or a jelly roll. They've even figured out the way to stack it on a truck or wagon. It is a small machine, and is called by Allis-Chalmers, according to Ernest McCorkle, local dealer, a Roto-Baler. Whether it ties, or not, don't know, but it has binder twine in it, and the roll won't come undone. The bales weigh from 24 to 44 pounds, depending on what you want.

When it was first shown in Coryell County nearly all the big shots from Allis-Chalmers, Dallas and Milwaukee were here for the premier. Included among these were J. E. Sexton, service manager, Milwaukee, Ed Elgin Service Department, La Porte, Ind. S H Sorenson, Implement Sales Manager, R H S Henderson, Assistant Branch Manager, Dallas, J E Edwards, Blockman, Dallas and the entire crew of blockmen from the Dallas headquarters.

This machine is so rare, and no more will be out until 1948, and the company has no cuts or pictures of it. So far, we are unable to get one from any source.

FEDERAL SURPLUS \$754, 00,000

WASHINGTON, D. C. July 2. (AP)—Secretary of the Treasury John Snyder announced today the government finished the fiscal year Monday with a budget surplus of almost \$754,000,000. Approximately \$500,000,000 less than President Truman's estimate of April 19.

This was the first surplus in seventeen years, and this surplus has already been applied on the national debt.

MOLOTOV TURNS DOWN MARSHALL PROGRAM

PARIS, France, July 2. (AP)—The Soviet's Foreign Minister, M. V. Molotov turned down today the British-French proposal for European recovery under the plan proposed by Secretary of State George C. Marshall, and thus, apparently ended the conference of the three foreign ministers on the subject of American aid to Europe.

He said the British-French proposals "would lead to no good results" and warned both Western nations that action would lead to a division of Europe.

THIRTY-TWO CONVICTS CONTROL CALAPAN

MANILA, P. I., July 2. (AP) Thirty-two heavily armed escaped convicts last night seized control of Capalan, capital of Mindoro Island, but Military Police reinforcements restored order late today after a bitter gun fight in which the rebel leader was killed.

Ten jail breakers were captured, 19 are at large and three killed.

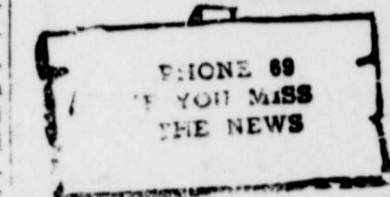

Texas Business Activity Index For May

A one per cent monthly decline marked Texas business during May but the index of activity prepared by the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research remained 87 percent above the prewar level.

The Index remained 10 percent above business in May a year ago.

All composite indexes making up the overall index of business activity showed April-to-May slumps except for the 10 percent gain in the seasonally-adjusted index of crude oil runs to stills and the fractional gain in the pay roll index. Greatest decline was the five percent in the index of electric power consumption, although consumption of industrial power dropped only one percent during the month.

Two percent declines were registered in the indexes of miscellaneous freight carloadings in the southwestern district and of department and apparel store sales. Employment dropped only slightly from April to May.

The index of crude oil runs to stills has been reduced by four

percent from its May, 1946, level, but all other indexes have advanced. Greatest were the 19 percent increase in the index of employment. Miscellaneous freight carloadings were up seven percent the index of department and apparel store sales rose six percent, and the index of electric power consumption was upped five percent.

A look at prewar levels of the composite indexes reveals gains all down the line. Department and apparel store sales are 184 percent above prewar sales, the index of electric power consumption has shot upward 156 percent, pay rolls are up 119 percent and the index of freight carloadings and crude oil runs to stills have gained 44 percent.

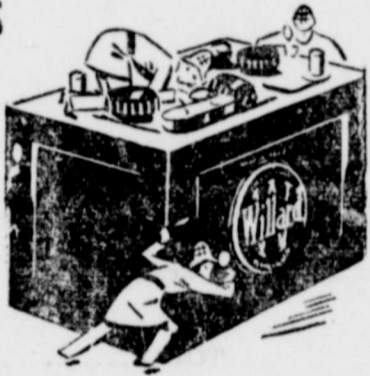
