While the motorist may be thoroughly familiar with the regulations in his own community and state, he cannot depend upon that knowledge when traveling any distance beyond his home borders. If he does, he may wind up either in the hospital or in fail. For in





tion of the Corps of Engineers, the miniature creek was built to test plans submitted by the district engineer at Galveston.

Tests, begun in 1945, have been completed on the plans submitted. Engineers at the experiment stacated actual conditions, brought recommendations for oonly slight changes, as in the channel alignment, in the proposed project.

Ernest Lipscomb, hydraulics engineer, said the tests were complete, except for a final report. However, periodic eports have been made to the Galveston office.

Rising in northern Menard and southern Concho counties in the central portion of Texas, Brady Creek is a small stream darining about 810 square miles of gently rolling country. It is subject to flash floods which on occasion have covered a major portion of the town of Brady.

There are NO levees to protect the town. Storms from July 19 to July 25 in 1938 produced 28 inches of rainfall resulting in a flood crest of 86,000 cubic feet of water per second. That was the

record flood at Brady.


