GUERRILLAS WITHDRAW FROM GREECE

ATHENS, Greece, July 17. (AP)—Military circles expressed belief today that the survivors of the 2,500 guerrillas who the government said invaded Greece from Albania Sunday, had withdrawn successfully eastward to towering Mt. Grammos range near the frontier. Only scattered minor clashes were reported in the Mt. Gamila area.

POLAND JOINS SOVIETS, BLAMING GREECE

LAKE SUCCESS, N. Y., July 17. (AP)—Poland joined Russia today in blaming Greece for the current Balkan disorders, and demanded the formation of a new coalition government in Greece. Also, new elections, and the immediate withdrawal of foreign military personnel.

Poland's views were stated by Dr. Oscar Lange, United Nations Security Council President as the group met in extraordinary session.

ARMS STANDARDIZATION LEGISLATION WANTED

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 17. (AP)The House Foreign Affairs Committee today approved legislation calling for arms standardization, and military co-operation between countries of the Western Hemisphere. Chances of enactment this session appear slight.

LOOKS LIKE WAR IN INDONESIA, TOO

BATAVIA, Java, July 17. (AP)—Acting Foreign Minister Tamsil of the Indonesian Republic flew to the Republican Capital of Jogjakarata today in an effort to resolve new differences between his government and the Netherlands authorities which threatened to participate war in Indonesia.
