### Farm Program Is Resumed In Coryell County—Stone

According to Clois D. Stone,  
Administrative Officer, Coryell  
County A. C. A., the local ACA of-  
fice was notified Tuesday to re-  
sume the issuance of prior ap-  
provals to carry out approved  
soil conservation practices.

Producers desiring to carry out  
these practices should contact the  
ACA office for prior approvals.  
The purchase order phase of the  
program was also resumed.

Practices on which approvals  
may be obtained at the present  
time, are as follows:

1. Construction of standard and  
spreader terraces for which prop-  
er outlets are provided.
2. Construction of diversion ter-  
races.
3. Constriction or enlarging of  
drainage ditches.
4. Establishing or improving  
permanent pastures by seeding  
adapted pasture grasses, pasture  
legumes, or mixture of grasses  
and legumes.
5. Application of potash and  
phosphate other than raw  
rock phosphate.
6. Application of raw rock phos-  
phate or colloidal clay.

WASHINGTON, July 22. (AP)—  
A \$225,000,000 Army construction  
program in the United States and  
abroad was approved Tuesday by  
the House armed services com-  
mittee.

Included in the projects is  
Camp Hood, \$4,455,950, and the  
projects proposed are for con-  
struction of family quarters and  
utility systems.

to sell the stock, and the capitali-  
zation will be announced when  
sales are completed. Then, the  
stockholders will name the board  
of directors.

European Recovery Plan is under consideration.

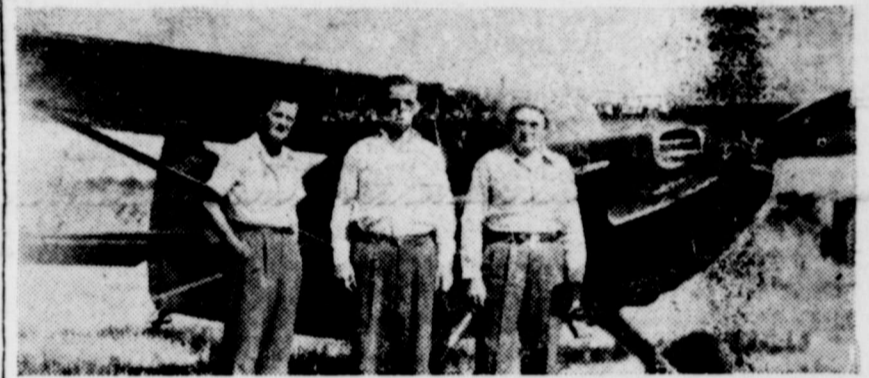
He made the statement at a news conference under

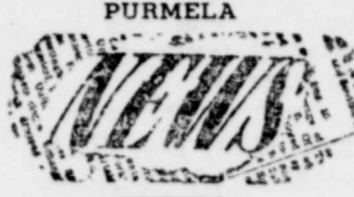

Dear Friends:

The House has now reached the stage which is reached each Session just before adjournment, at which sessions are long, tempers are short, and all kinds of legislation is passed with little if any consideration. I have been out on the Floor since 10 a. m.—I will hasten back as soon as I write this report. I expect the session to continue till possibly ten o'clock tonight. Most of the day has been devoted to the Conference Report on the Agriculture Appropriation Bill. The farmers have not fared so well. On a direct vote with every Democrat voting for the larger amount, the Republican Majority was able to defeat the extra \$25,000,000 loan authority for the REA which the Senate had been willing to grant. There won't be enough money to build nearly all the lines needed this coming year. If you can't get service don't blame your local manager—blame the 206 Republicans who voted against these needed funds.

The hottest fight of all came over the funds for soil conservation payments. The Senate had agreed to appropriate enough money to carry out the 1947 program as promised. The Republicans in the House had, as I previously reported, provided only only about half as much as promised. Today the Democrats made the motion necessary to accept the Senate figures. It looked like

in spite of the party "whips" enough Republicans were voting with us to carry this proposal when Congressman Case offered a substitute for which practically all Republicans voted giving little more than the House had originally given—but still \$30,000,000 less than what had been promised. He also provided that no farmer could be paid more than \$500, and he further struck out the promise of any program next year. I feel that the Case Amendment breaks faith just as the original bill did, but it carried by an almost solid Republican vote. We are still to vote on the funds for the school lunches and for the Farm Tenant Home Program.

In recent years a few law firms in Chicago, Minneapolis, Los Angeles and other cities have developed a practice of handling damage suits against railroads on a sort of "assembly line" basis. They get cases from all over the country. They take the plaintiffs and the witnesses across the Continent and keep them for months at great expense. They use so-called "expert" testimony which, to say the least, is likely to be prejudiced. They say that local courts are ignorant and that county juries are prejudiced. I think our local courts are just as fair and able as any in Chicago, and I know that our local juries are just as honest as they are in Los Angeles. I think our Texas lawyers and doctors are just as capable. I can see no justice in taking cases great distances at great expense. I, therefore, voted for a bill which the House passed yesterday to make these people bring their suits either where the injury occurred or where the injured party lives.

The House recently passed a bill changing the order of Presidential succession. As the law has been, the Secretary of State would succeed the President if there were no Vice President. Since all Cabinet Officers are appointed by the President himself, he has had the power to select his successor. I doubt the wisdom of such a policy. Last year President Truman suggested that we make the Speaker of the House next in line. I favored the proposal then, but the Senate would not vote for it. Now it will mean that Speaker Martin, a Republican, will be in line, but I think the principle is still sound so I voted for the bill.

It is expected that tomorrow (Saturday) the House will vote on the so-called "unification" bill. This measure at least tries to eliminate some of the duplication and friction that exists between the Army, Navy, and Air Corps. It is not a merger and I don't think it goes nearly far enough, but I do think it goes in the right direction. I believe that any future war will be an "all out" war and there will be no opportunity to divide our forces into separate groups.

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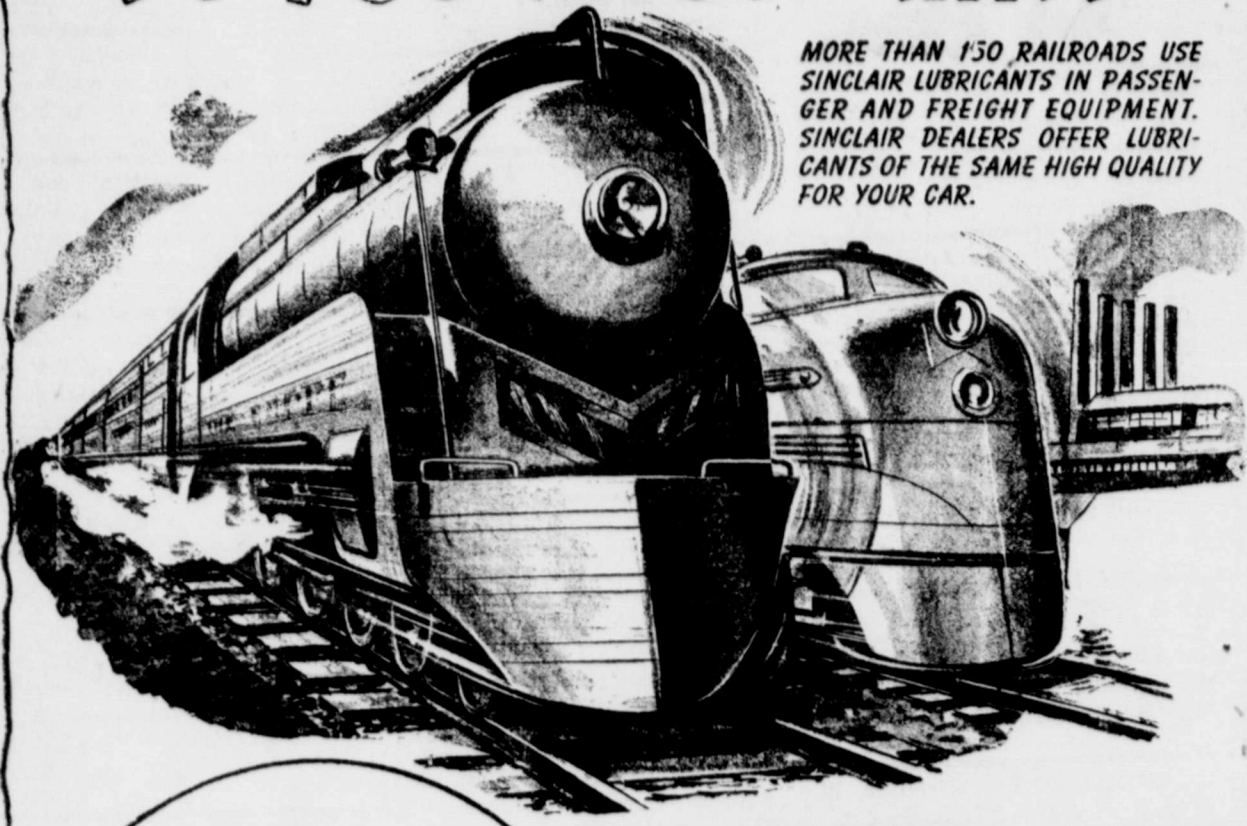
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## Tazewell Priddie, Banker Of Houston Died Funeral at Rogers

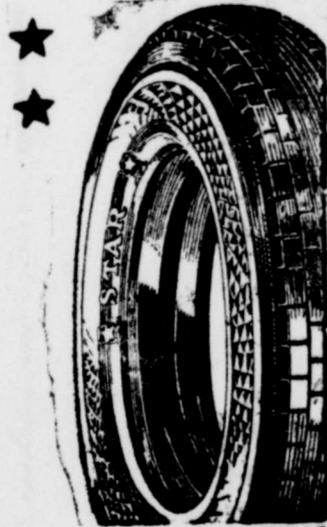

**EUROPE'S MAP A PUZZLER TO AMERICANS**

PRINCETON, N. J., July 19—How much do Americans know about the geography of Europe?

After fighting two wars there and spending billions of dollars for aid, with more proposed under the Marshall plan, American voters have some startling gaps in their knowledge as to just which country is which in Europe.

Only one third know where Greece is on the map, in spite of our widely-discussed aid-to-Greece program.

Nearly half do not know where Spain is. One third cannot locate France, on whose battlefields America shed blood twice in a generation.

Only one in four can correctly pick out Czechoslovakia; still fewer can find Hungary, Bulgaria, Yugoslavia or Romania.

Even people who have had college training fall down badly in identifying various Balkan countries. Six out of ten don't know where Czechoslovakia is and seven out of ten miss Bulgaria and Romania.

A test of the knowledge of European geography was conducted among adults from coast to coast by the institute. An outline map with the names of the countries removed was handed to each person by interviewers, and the voters were asked to identify 12 countries — Bulgaria, Czechoslovakia, England, France, Greece, Hungary, Holland, Italy, Poland, Romania, Spain and Yugoslavia.

The results, showing the percentages for correct identification, in correct and don't know, follow:

What do these results mean? Four observations seem warranted:

1. Ignorance of the geography of Europe reflects the long period of our national history when we

remained isolated and essentially aloof from Europe, with little or no travel there by average Americans. It seems likely that during the next generation, with world co-operation the keynote, Americans will come to have a much better conception of European geography.

2. Lack of knowledge about the exact location of some countries does not necessarily mean that Americans have no grasp of the broad problems facing Europe or no right to express an opinion on those problems.

3. While a low proportion in the survey were able to identify correctly such countries as Yugoslavia, Romania and Bulgaria, many placed them in the right general area, indicating a familiarity with the broad outlines of European geography if not with the specific national boundaries.

4. The survey indicates that there is considerable need for a more effective teaching of geography in American schools.

The result of the map test by education levels show wide differences. The following table gives the percentages correctly identifying the various countries.

Another method of scoring the test is the number of countries which any one group correctly identified. It works out this way:

The average college trained person in the survey was able to get seven out of the twelve countries. Those with only high school training got six out of twelve on the average, while those with grade school or no school got three right. The average for men was six out of twelve, for women five. The average for everybody was five out of twelve.
