Following the purchase of a  
\$1600 machine for handling "hot

## TEAM MANAGERS VOTE TO HAVE COUNTY- WIDE BASEBALL PLAY OFF HERE: 4 ENTER

Meeting at the Chamber of  
Commerce office Tuesday, three  
of the possible four managers of  
baseball teams in Coryell County  
voted to have a Coryell County  
Baseball Championship play-off  
for Championship for 1947, and  
Rabon Balch was named the local  
Baseball Czar to handle the de-  
tails, along with representatives  
of both the News and the Mes-  
senger.

Play-off dates will depend on  
how Purnela comes out in their

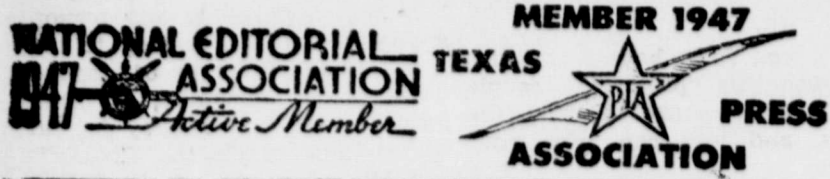

Dear Friends:

Before this reaches you the Congress will, no doubt have adjourned. There will, however, be a great deal of legislation finally passed within the next 24 hrs. I expect to make one more report from Washington, but will doubtless be in Texas myself before it. Yesterday the House finally approved the last item in dispute in

the Agriculture Appropriation Bill. The final agreement included an item of \$265,000,000 for soil conservation payments this year and an agreement that we would have a \$150,000,000 program next year, but next year no one individual can receive more than \$500. This will mean that practically all cooperators will be paid this year, and it is much better than the "no program" for next year on which the Republicans of the House had insisted. The bill also provides \$65,000,000 for school lunches, \$10,000,000 of meeting the Democratic request, but it is a substantial victory for the program. At the last minute \$15,000,000 was inserted for the Farm Home Program. It had been proposed to get nothing for this fine program. On the whole, the bill is far better than when first presented, but every item was secured only after a long struggle.

We have just passed a bill continuing the crop insurance (largely on an experimental basis). I feel that crop insurance is important to our farmers, and I believe that if we can have it in operation for a few years, we can get a more workable system. We have suffered tremendous losses in the past—much of the loss was on cotton, but it must be remembered that the past two years have been the most unfavorable cotton years in the past half century. Any insurance business would suffer losses under such circumstances. There are, however, lots of members who would like to kill all crop insurance. The best we could get was a continuation on a very restricted experimental program. This will mean cotton in only a few counties, but it does keep the program alive with a chance to expand as we get better records. I, therefore, voted for the best we could get.

Probably one of the major accomplishments of the session was the passage yesterday of the Armed Forces Unification Bill. This measure places the Army, Navy and the Air Force under one head—the Secretary of Defense. I believe that it will do much to prevent duplication, to reduce expenditures, and to increase team work between the three branches. I voted for the bill.

The House has authorized a large number of studies and investigations. I think that the power of Congress to look into matters which would otherwise never be brought to public attention is a most wholesome power. I realize that the Majority Party will always control these investigations and that there will be some partisanship in some of them, but on the whole I think they can do much good. My own Committee is going to hold hearings here in Washington and possibly in some other parts of the country, on a permanent farm program. This will make it necessary for me to come back to Washington and to spend quite some time this Fall. I shall, however, leave for Texas sometime next week. I can

only plan my schedule through the month of August, but during that time I will be in my office at Waco one day per week (Monday) maintain an office in the Post Office building at Temple and will be available there each Wednesday. Other days will be devoted to visits to other communities over the District. I realize that it is difficult, if not impossible for everyone who may want to talk with me to come to Waco or Temple. I have, therefore, prepared a schedule that will take me to almost every post office and to some non-postoffices. My visits will necessarily be brief, and it will help me a great deal if anyone who wants to discuss any problem will prepare a written memorandum to leave with me. However, I want every one to feel free to present any problems they have, if they think I can help.

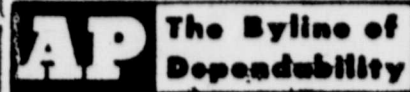
**T. E. L. Class of Baptist Church Had Party July 28**

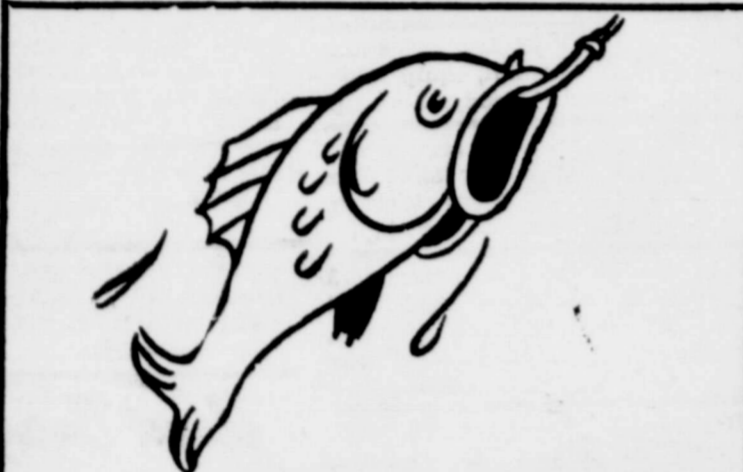
