CORYELL CITY-TURNERSVILLE SQUARE OFF IN SECOND OF COUNTY LEAGUE PLAY-OFF

At 2:30 and SHARP, Sunday afternoon, Coryell City and Turnersville baseball clubs will square off in the second of a series of baseball games in the 1947 Coryell County League Baseball Tournament, and, an even larger crowd of spectators is expected than greeted the teams on the previous Sunday.

STATE SCHOOL BOARD TO LEASE GULF LAND

AUSTIN, Sept. 11. (AP)—The State School Land Board today voted unanimously to include 1,989,840 acres of submerged lands in the Gulf of Mexico in its mineral lease sale November 4, despite a recent Supreme Court decision upholding a Federal claim to California's tide-lands.

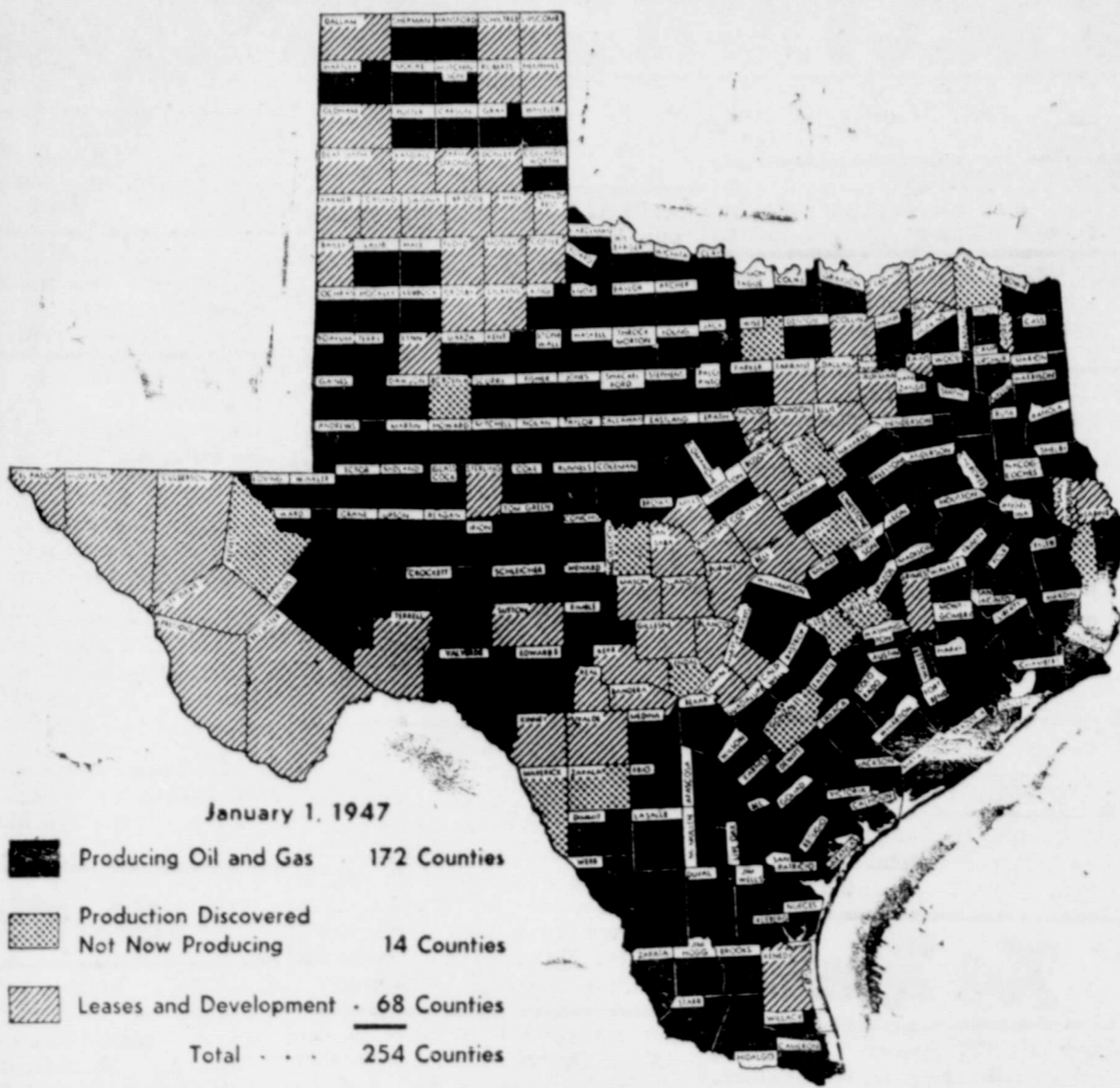

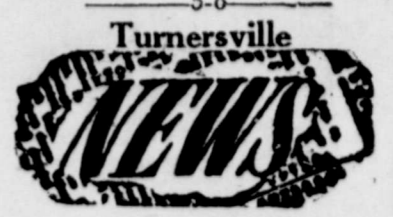

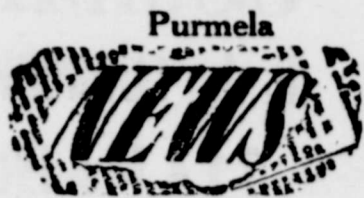
