### Dr. Lawrence Hayes Resigns as Pastor of First Baptist Church

Dr. Lawrence Hayes offered his resignation Wednesday evening as pastor of the First Baptist church. He has been leader of the congregation here for nearly six years. Perhaps this year has been the best so far as physical results are



concerned; the church has had a total income of \$22,607.15 the past eleven months, and the Sunday School average attendance has averaged approximately 400 since January 1st, the best attendance in its history. Other organizations are in proportion.

During the time of Dr. Hayes' pastorate the church has had a total of 737 additions, and \$165,876.16 has been raised for all purposes. He led the local church during the trying war years; and while the service men were located at North Camp Hood, a Service Center was maintained at the church. This served thousands of men in uniform.

In 1943 the edifice of worship was paid for, and in October of that year, dedication services were

"OLD JAIL MUSEUM" TO BE  
DEDICATED SATURDAY:  
MANY RELICS THERE!

Saturday afternoon at 4 o'clock the "Old Jail Museum" will begin its historic part in the history of Colorful Coryell County, when with a program, it is dedicated as a folklore and historic museum for Coryell County.

The program, which has already been published is sponsored by the temporarily organized Coryell County Historical Society, which at present is headed by Mrs. Tom R. Mears as president, and Mrs. Jack Straw as secretary. A constitutional committee composed of Judge Bates Cross, chairman, Mrs. A. C. Schloeman, Mrs. J. O. Brown and Mrs. John R. Colgin Sr., has been named and they will develop a proper constitution for the Society.

A committee in charge of "historiana" (relics and historical pieces, includes Mrs. H. J. Jackson, chairman; Mrs. Roger Miller, Mrs. Bob Saunders and Mrs. A. C. Schloeman, Emmett Dickie and Eiland Loveoy.

Included in the opening day displays, will be original letters from George Washington, Abraham Lincoln, and General Robert E. Lee, and Gode Prints, which are famous collector's items.

People in Gatesville are asked to visit the Museum at 10 o'clock Saturday morning, and then, when folks from the rural sections get here, they'll have time to go thru and see the exhibits. ### Truman Says Save Food For Hungry Europeans

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 25. (AP)—President Truman asked Americans today to save food for Europe's hungry. He said he still hoped emergency aid can be met without a special session of Congress.

He said a special session will be discussed at a conference Monday with Republican and Democratic Congressional leaders, and that the return of rationing and of price controls is a matter for Congress to decide. He said the plan called for saving, not wasting food.

### Australian Acuses Russia of "Blackmail"

LAKE SUCCESS, N. Y. Sept. 25. (AP)—The Australian delegate to the UN here, W. R. Hodgson today accused Russia of using "blackmail" aimed at forcing the Security Council to admit Soviet Satellites to membership in the United Nations.

Hodgson's charge was made in answer to Russia's declaration that the Soviets would vote for the admission of Italy only if the council also admitted Hungary, Romania, and Finland.

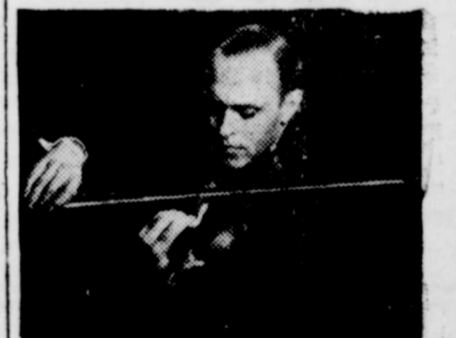

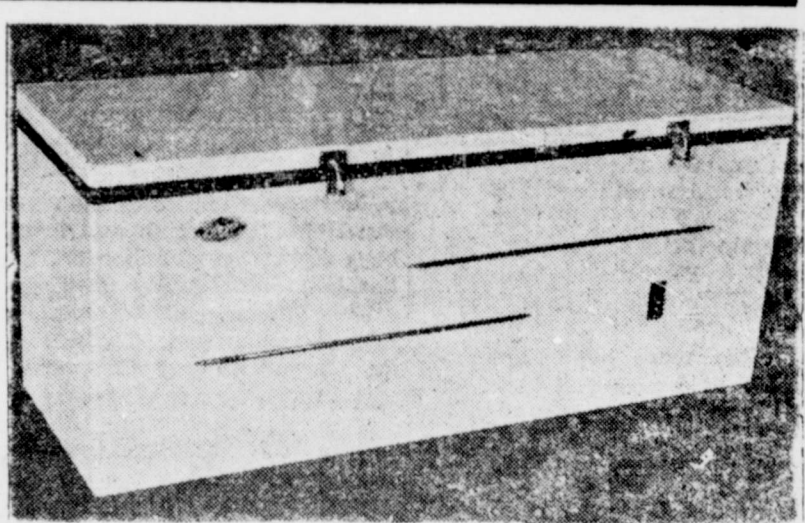

**New Ohio Bridge**

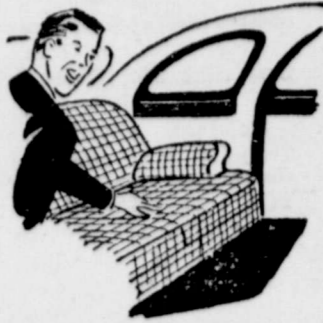

been here too long. The Billingsley bridge was a small weak structure to begin with, and since it floats down stream everytime the Cowhouse reaches flood stage, we all know that it is absolutely unsafe.

The erroneous report that we are building that bridge to move our school to Evant is as fantastic as it is untrue. The only thing that can cause us to lose our two-teacher school is the lack of young children to keep it going.

A survey of Liberty's large school district show less than a dozen pre-school age children, counting the babies. Almost half of these are children of wage-earners, who may not be here when next year's school opens. If a certain element in our community want to continue the local school, hey had better quit fighting the bridge construction and get busy importing children.

The construction of the bridge is practically insured, but we still need more funds. Evant and the Ohio area are away over their quota of donations.
