## How To Make A Rocket AP Newsfeatures

Rocket-minded engineers and  
scientists of the General Electric  
Co., who are doing missile re-  
search for the U. S. Army, have  
developed a way to make minia-  
ture "parlor-sport" V-w rockets.  
Here's how they do it, but the di-  
rections are not for children.

1. Take scissors, empty cigar-  
ette package with tinfoil, matches  
paper clip. Place one match and  
one match head together, head to  
head.
2. Separate the tinfoil from the  
paper, and cut off a 1 1/2 inch strip.
3. Wrap matches in tinfoil  
tightly, then twirl the top apart.
4. Bend paper clip so it will  
form a base for the small rocket.
5. Light tinfoil at point where  
the match heads bulge.
6. SWISH! The rocket zooms  
off—to a distance up to 15 feet—  
so make sure you give it some  
clear space. And also be careful  
of fire.

fels, May 25, got under way here today before a packed  
courtroom. The case was transferred here after an ef-  
fort to select a jury at New Braunfels failed.

### Supreme Court Refuses to Reconsider Oil Decision

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 13. (AP)—The Supreme  
Court refused today to reconsider its decision that the  
Federal Government has paramount rights to oil under-  
water lands off the California coast.

California asked a rehearing, contending the decision  
would deprive every coastal state of enormous areas and  
valuable property rights.

### VISHINSKY ATTACKS TRUMAN GREEK AID

LAKE SUCCESS, N. Y., Oct. 13 (AP)—Andrej Vi-  
shinsky today launched another major attack on the Tru-  
man program to aid Greece and pressed Soviet demands  
for immediate withdrawal of all foreign troops from  
Greece.

Russia also demanded the creation of a United Nations  
Commission to supervise the American aid program.

### THREE THOUSAND HOMES DAMAGED

MIAMI, Fla., Oct. 13. (AP)—More than 3,000 homes  
in Greater Miami were reported damaged by floods today  
in the wake of a freak hurricane which moved northeast-  
ward in the Atlantic after slicing across Florida.

Crop damage was placed around \$20 million dollars.

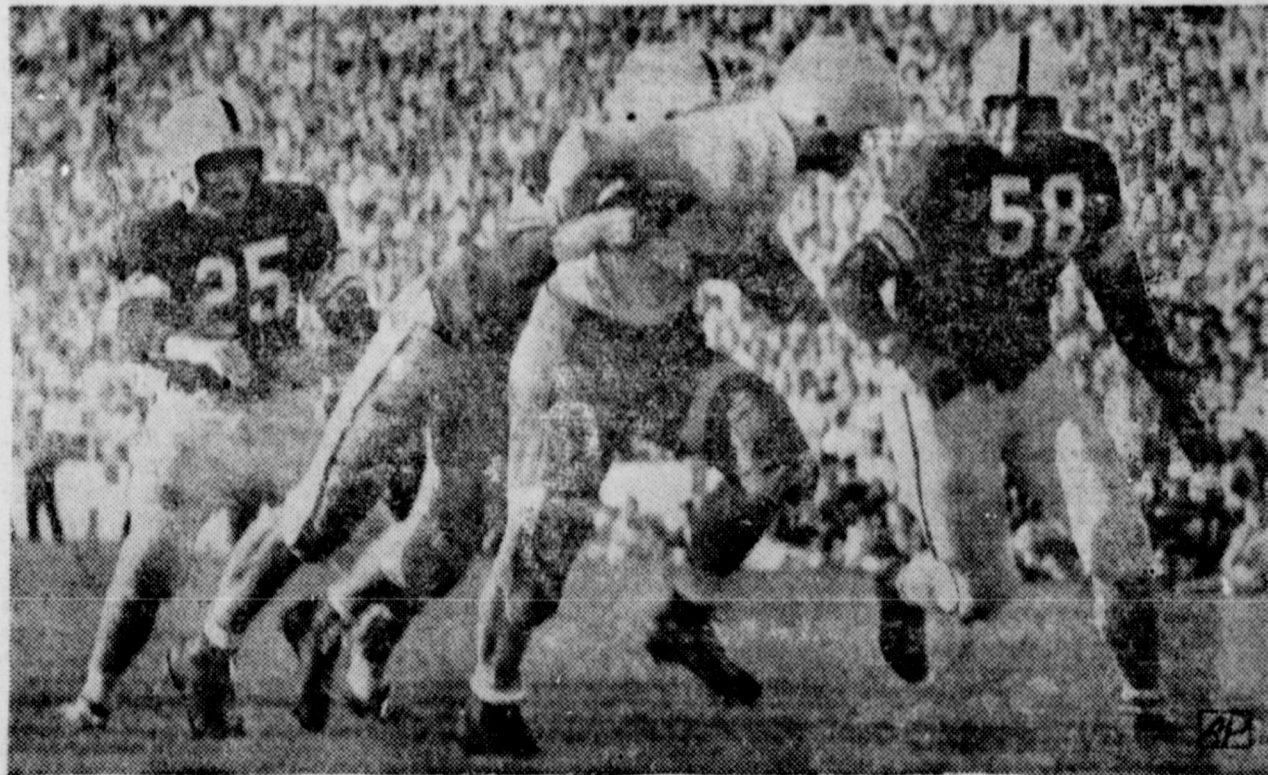

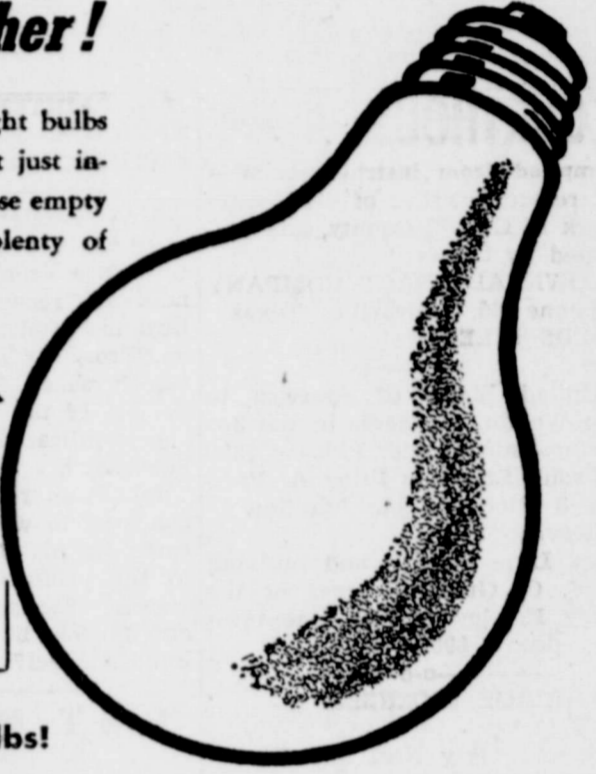

### Poland Finds War Loot In Czechoslovakia

WARSAW—(AP) The Polish government, having recovered a major share of industrial machinery and equipment which was carted off by the Nazis during the war, now is concentrating on getting back other former properties found in Czechoslovakia and Austria.

Equipment recently returned from Czechoslovakia included much electro-technical material. Long distance telecommunication equipment, valued at 1,500,000 Czech crowns and considerable factory machinery were retrieved by the Revindication and War Reparations bureaus.

In Austria, in the American Army occupation zone the Poles found 111 carloads of equipment for the Moscice nitrous compounds production plant.

### Czech Glass Town Keeps Its Germans

JABLONEC NAD NISOU, Czechoslovakia—(AP)—This northern Bohemian town, well known for its glass and fancy jewelry industries, still has the largest percentage of Germans of any community in this country. Out of its 60,000 inhabitants, 15,000 are Germans.

# Maul-Match Is 7-All, Clifton Cubs And Gatesville Hornets

THAT DOESN'T TELL HALF THE STORY. WHICH CAN'T BE TOLD

It simply can't be told. It MUST have been seen to be appreciated. Friday evening's game was one of the most vicious, trying and hard-fought football games we've seen and you can put your "period" down right there.

Breaks were bad for both, and began bad for the Hornets when

Gene Anderson's 50 yard run with the ball was ruled back on account of the ball touching the ground. Equally as upsetting, were some of the penalties against the Cubs.

The play was double-rough, and sometimes yes a lot of times, so rough that the officials called it "unnecessary" and both clubs lost yardage by that route.

They were out for blood, and scores.

They got both. This was THE ball game of the season and we don't name stars. They were all that and on both sides. We just wish you could have seen this one.

Anderson took the kick-off on the 15, returned to the 32. Davidson passes to McIlroy, who laid out at sideline, and he took it in the 50 but dropped it. Darned near killed him. They fumble, but recover on the 29. Davidson punts nicely to Elder on the Cub 30, returns to 48.

Canuteson hits line for 4, nailed by Vandiver. Hornets off side, drop 5. Ball on Hornet 42. Dysinger stops Rice on 47. Canuteson carries fumbles and Anderson snatches up fumble and runs 50 for touchdown, but officials ruled ball hit ground and was already dead. It was Clifton's last down and ball went over on the 49 line.

Davidson at end makes 4. Anderson carries and it's 1st Down. Davidson to Dysinger, pass, is knocked down by Richards. Both sides off side. Davidson completes to Gilmer carrying to the 21 where he's immediately downed. Davidson passes incomplete to Price. Hornets lose 5. He passes to Anderson, incomplete. Anderson makes 4 at tackle. Davidson passes incomplete to Crawford who couldn't get. Davidson trapped, couldn't pass or run and ball goes over on 28.

Bronstad makes 6. Canuteson is stopped for none and then he makes 1st D. on next play. Gilmer slows Rice and he is downed for 1. Canuteson stopped by Gilmer and Anderson, 4. Elder passes over C to Bronstad and he goes to Hornet 25 as quarter ends.

### 2nd Quarter

On a reverse Canuteson fumbles and recovers back on the 43. Holt make 10 thru C on a fast worker from Elder. Elder passes to Rice, complete on the 25 where he's downed. Cubs off side lose 5. On fast reverse Elder runs to other end going to 30. Elder kicks out. Hornets on 20. Penalty puts ball on 15, unnecessary roughness. Hornets. They carry and Hornets lose 5, off side. Alfie in Elder to Canuteson and he goes to 6 runs out of bounds. They make 1st D. on the 1 yd. line. Penalty, next play, and they lose 15. Illegal position. Holt fumbles, Hornets recover on 12. Anderson fumbles. Cubs recover on 10. Canuteson stopped by Crawford on 6. Holt puts it on 4. Elder fumbles but recovers, no gain. Canuteson goes over standing from 4. Gilmer winded but stays Bronstad kicks extra. Cubs 7. Hornets 0.

Cubs kick to Davidson on 15, returns to 32. Brynie out. Alfie

in. Davidson runs, can't get by official, makes 0. Davidson passes, broken up by Canuteson; interference with passer ruled and ruled complete. Davidson's pass to Gilmer over C, incomplete. Vandiver at line takes to 39. Hornets back up 15 holding. Anderson is nailed by Canuteson. Davidson completes to Gilmer, putting ball on 46, close for 1st D. Vandiver makes it. Davidson passes, incomplete to Gilmer who drops, but there's a penalty. Clifton off side, 5 yds. Ball on 47. Vandiver to Anderson puts ball on 33. Davidson passes incomplete to Anderson. Anderson pitches to Davidson and he's stopped for none as the half ends.

### 3d Quarter

Hornets boot to Canuteson on 18 return to Hornet 47. Elder to Canuteson and he passes and receiver gets 66 yds. Elder passes over Holt. Canuteson carries, is sidelined, but it's 1st D. Vandiver takes Holt who makes 4 at C. Frede and Big Crawford stop Canuteson for 3 yd loss. Elder laterals to Holt and he's nailed by Anderson and Rice follows, putting ball on 8, and ball goes over.

Anderson makes 9, off tackle. Davidson, with good interference at end, takes to 33 and 1st D. Vandiver is stopped at line, 1 yd. Anderson plows thru for 8. Clifton loses 15 unnecessary roughness, piling on. Vandiver at tackle gets 5. Davidson at end, gets 1 fore; blocking not so good. Anderson at tackle makes 3 and Vandiver 6 and 1st D. Anderson is piled by Richards (little guy) none. Anderson pitches to Davidson who incompletes to Crawford. Davidson spins at C for 3. Vandiver makes 16 and goes to 10 piled by 2 Cubs. Vandiver goes for 4. He hits hole for 4 more, then 1. Anderson fumbles, recovers, but Hornets lose ball on 1 foot stripe.

Elder kicks out on own 26, a short one. Davidson completes to Gilmer for 1st D and 12 on the 11 yd stripe, as quarter ends.

### 4th Quarter

Davidson carries for 1 at end then runs trying to pass, and drops 1 yd. Vandy makes 5, but it's really 4, because they'd lost 5. 6 to go for touchdown. Vandiver carries but don't make it, and ball goes over on 5.

Elder kicks to Davidson, fumbles, but recovers. Cubs penalized to 1 ft of goal for holding. Elder kicks to Davidson on 33. Elder walks on blocker. Cubs lose 15 more for roughing. Davidson pass to Gilmer incomplete wide. Vandiver at T makes 3. Price for Crawford. Anderson makes 1st D. on 10, then carries. Cubs penalized: ball on 1 yd line. Gustafson throws Anderson for a 3 yard loss. Another penalty. Hornet backfield in motion. Harvy throws Davidson for 5 yd loss. Davidson to Gilmer in NE corner of field makes touchdown. Dysinger kicks extra. Cubs 7, Hornets 7.

Hornets kick to Canuteson, he fumbles. Bronstad recovers on 34. 5 minutes to go. Elder passes, incomplete. They drop 5, backfield in motion. Elder runs back, then passes incomplete. Holt hits tackle for 4. Elder passes to Bronstad over C for 1st D. on 44, somebody misses Canuteson and he goes 8 yds, but there's a penalty. Canuteson hurt. Cubs lose 15 holding. Canuteson stays. Elder completes to Canuteson for 4. Elder can't pass, runs ball on 40. Spread. Elder passes and Anderson or Vandiver knock down. Elder kicks out on Hornet end of field.

Davidson carries and they help Bronstad up lose 4. Davidson carries, drops but ball ruled dead. Anderson carries, penalty refused by Clifton. Gilmer kicks to Elder who is finally downed on Hornet 46. Elder to Bronstad over C, but there's a penalty, backfield in motion, 5 yds on Cubs. Elder passes incomplete over center as game ends.

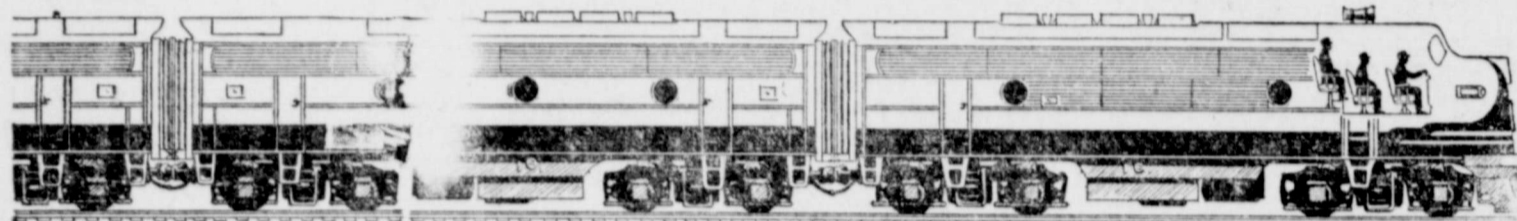

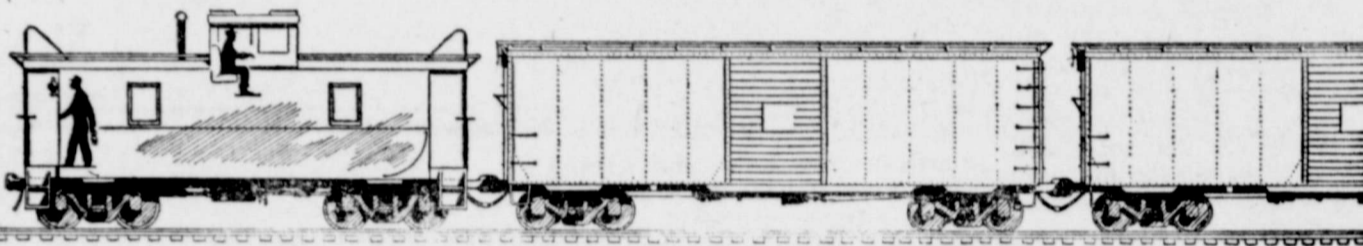

In July, the railroads filed an application for increased freight rates to close the gap which then existed between wage and material costs, and railroad revenues. Since then it has been necessary, because of further increases in wages and material costs, to supplement that petition and to ask for an additional freight rate

increase. No other course is open.

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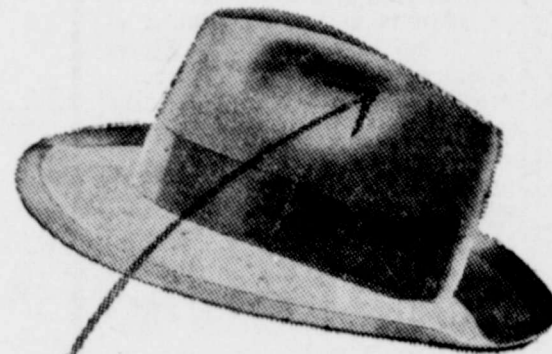
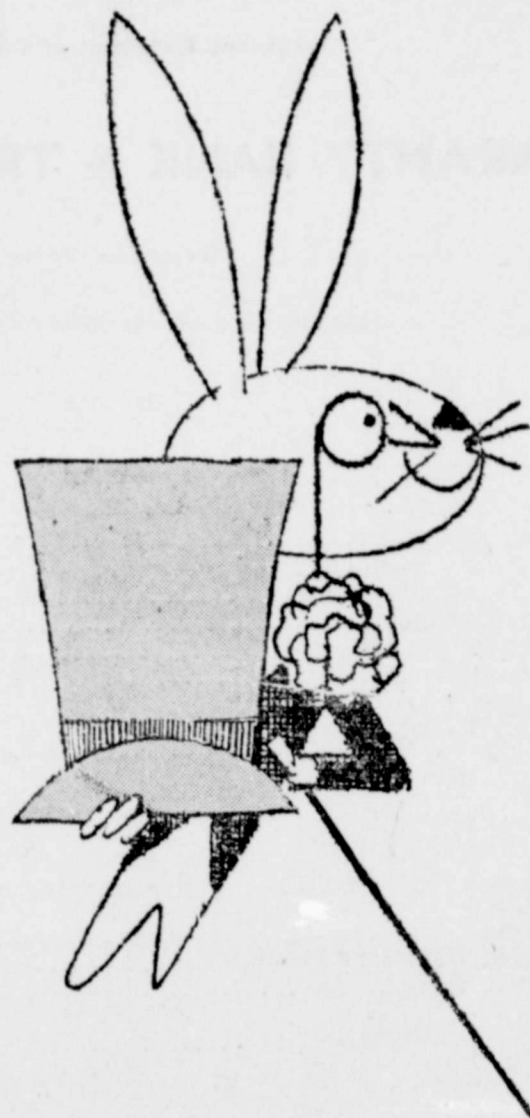
