

**INDEX OF TEXAS BUSINESS**

An August gain in the Texas Index of Business activity pushed business more than 100 percent above the prewar average and placed activity close to where it stood when the Japanese surrendered in August, 1945. The Uni-

versity of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported. The July August upward movement was the result of gains in five of six major indexes combined in the state index. The seasonally adjusted index of department and apparel stores were up five percent, electric power consumption index went up four percent and

the index for miscellaneous freight carloadings gained three percent. Employment and payroll's registered fractional gains. Only the index of crude oil runs to stills turned downward. In comparison with August 1946 figures only the index of department and apparel stores failed to match last year's late summer boom.

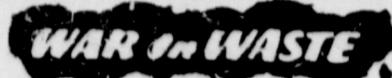

**Revival At Main Street Church of Christ Begins**


