FORGERS OPERATING SINCE '40 FORGED CHECKS IN POSSIBLY 30 COUNTIES, BEAUMONT TO AMARILLO

Sheriff Joe White, Texas Ranger Clarence Nordyke, stationed at Brownwood, and A. O. Curry, who's headquarters is Fort Worth, Postal Inspector for the United States Post Office Department, have just cracked a case of forgery, implicating at least two men, who have been operating in nearly 30 counties in Texas from Beaumont to Amarillo, and have passed \$30,000.00 in forged checks or more.

Implicated are W. A. [Doc] Lucas, 52, who Sunday, was lodged in the county jail at Gatesville and Walter J. Wallace, who was placed in the Brownwood jail.

Also assisting the three men in this work, was Sheriff Fred Mason of Lampasas County.

According to information we have, this is the largest forgery combine that has operated in Texas, and in their operations, they included the National Bank of Gatesville where the trail of their operations "heated up" when bankers in that institution became suspicious but the men made their exit hurriedly, and were not then apprehended.

Sheriff Joe White, and those working with him took the men to Austin Monday to have them finger printed and "mugged" by the Department of Public Safety. and "copies" will be rushed to other communities for possible identification.

The story of these men, which cannot be released yet, reads like a detective story magazine and all the officers involved have been working for months on the case. The operations of the men, gave them time, plenty of time to elude the law enforcement officers, and hoodwink the ones who cashed their checks.

Texas Ranger Joe Thompson, announcing in the Waco Times-Herald Monday, confirmed what

Sheriff Joe White told us Sunday, that the men would burglarize mail boxes or homes in rural areas and obtain bank statements to determine how much money farmers and ranchers had on deposit. The two Wacon's would then forge the name of a rancher or farmer to a check and pass it by telling bank officials the check was in payment for cattle or farm equipment.

The two men, Wacon's, according to that paper are charged in checks amounting from \$250 to \$1300, and charges will be filed in Brownwood, Plainview, Gatesville and other Texas cities.

COTTON CROP REPORT IS 4,790 BALES TO OCTOBER 1, 1947

Mrs. Myrtle E. Lee, in her Cotton Ginning Report, reports 4790 bales as compared with 1,066 bales for the 1946 crop to the same date last year.

Evidently more was planted, and the weather's been favorable to harvest. Yet to be gathered are many bales, for the simple reason the labor is not available, and farmers cannot get the pickers. We've seen some fields in the county that didn't look like they'd had a sack in them yet.

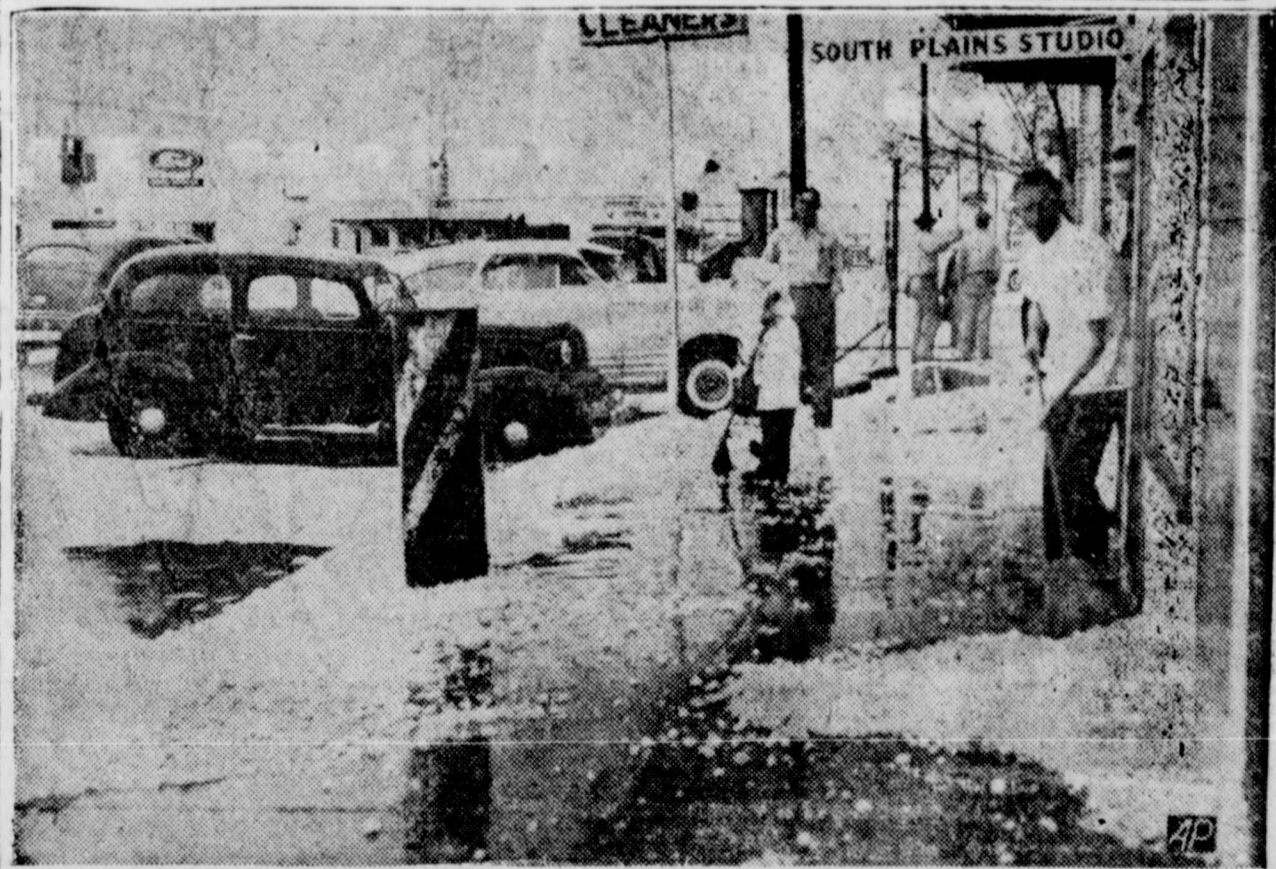
Another tragedy hits the county. The infamous pink boll worm. This creature has been found at nearly every gin operating in the County by Federal Inspector A. K. Ivy, who's headquarters is at Stephenville, according to N. F. Bennett, of the Coryell County Cotton Oil Company.

Already this has meant a sharp drop in the cotton seed price from nearly \$100 to \$85. Also, cotton raised in the county must be sterilized, and sent to designated buyers who have these sterilizers or they must be installed here. What the "worm" has done to the price of cotton we were not told, but, evidently it would be down.

All trucks hauling this cotton, according to Mr. Bennett, must be specially registered, and all handlers must also be certified in some other ways.

Fields, where cotton has been grown, must be plowed up within a certain time, and all in all, it really puts the county in a hot spot.

Some observers say in the end, it'll be a benefit, like quarantine for other causes, but, we'd have to see it.

HORNET MACHINE DIDN'T START MUCH UNTIL HALF: FANS ABSENT

Gatesville Hornets still with a Clifton hangover, met a snappy club from Itasca, with not much to offer, and managed to keep their record further untouched with a 19-6 win.

An old Chinese proverb says—"Fool me once—shame on you. Fool me twice—shame on me". The multitude of slick promoters, swindlers, sharpers and racketeers continually preying on a gullible public have no feeling of shame at fooling anyone. They will fool you once, twice or as many times as they can and then they will give their particular scheme or racket a new twist of somekind and come right back at you again. The only way a person can protect himself against these various rackets is to learn in advance how to operate so they may be recognized for what they are. Following are examples of the way some of these "schemes" operate:

The "single news clipping gyp". You get a post card or note from some distant city stating that your name appeared in a paper and for a sum (generally 25c) they will send the clipping to you. You send the quarter and get back an article clipped from your own city's paper—perhaps some insignificant item that you yourself gave the local press. Perfectly legal—but still a swindle!

The "addressing envelopes at home racket"—You are asked to send \$1 to qualify for the job of addressing cards or envelopes in your spare time. You are told this company will send you the envelopes and list of names and will pay you 1½c for each one addressed. You send your dollar and the company discharges their legal obligations by sending you perhaps ten envelopes—and 15c. Their profit or "take" is 85c.

The "free encyclopedia scheme"—You are approached by a smooth talker who tells you that his company wants your name on their list of encyclopedia owners so badly they want to give you a complete set absolutely free. All you have to do is say a good word about the publication to your friends—and Oh, yes, there there is a slight mailing charge on the books and on the loose-leaf pages sent out from month to month to keep the set up-to-date. The amount of this charge? Well, you'd better check on it because you'll probably find it is equal to the purchase price of the books. And so again, your Chamber of Commerce urges you to—**Investigate Before You Invest.**
