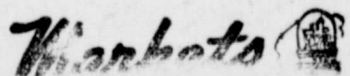

SHERIFF JOE WHITE "IS" PRINCIPLE IN LUCAS-WALLACE RING ROUND-UP!

Evidently, from the "daily
press" Sheriff Joe White just
wasn't in the picture at all.
That is just plain, unadulterat-
ed no so.

In a confession, signed by Lucas
himself, he states specifically that
the three "principals" in the
round up and identifying of him
were The Ranger, the P. O. In-
spector and Sheriff Joe White.

To begin cracking the case,
Sheriff White, accompanied by
Andrew Kendrick, Jack Straw,
and C. L. Hord went to Waco,
Friday last, believe, and identi-
fied Lucas as one of the men who
passed checks at the National
Bank of Gatesville.

The way it worked here accord-
ing to Sheriff White, and the con-
fession, they'd steal bank state-
ments out of a armer's mail box
(that made it federal) and take
the checks with the signature.
Then, heyd take the check, put it
up where the sun would shine
thru it and trace the signature to
a new check which they'd write
ou to any amoun they'd want.

Six charges have been filed a-
gainst each man here, for burg-
lary and forgery. Mrs. Lena
York of near Purmela was the
first victim, about August 16, for
\$250. Then, on August 20, they
successfully are alleged to have
passed a \$200 check on one of two
men, Henry and Alfred Kiphen of
Pidcoke Star Route but the \$175

check didn't jell, when C. L.
Hord, who was standing at one
Distribution Center. (AP Wire-win-
dow in The National Bank of
Gatesville, made Wallace wait

too long, and Andrew Kendrick
went into the vault, and Wallace
got "panicky" and as he would
say, "took it on the lam".

Reports are, they went up the
alley back of he News office (no,
we didn't see 'em) and got in their
car parked near the City Hall and
left.

After Lucas was identified in
Waco, Sheriff White, accompan-
ied by Ranger Nordyke and Post-
al Inspector Curry (who Sheriff
White says was the main stem in
the man hunt) took Lucas to
Escapout, where a vice-president
of the Securities National Bank
identified him as the man who
allegedly "clipped" his bank for
\$250, on a plea of sickness in his
family.

Checks in a large number of
counties have been passed, so of-
ficers say from \$150 up to \$1300
or more, and the total amount
ranges nearly \$30,000 which has
been going on since '40.

Both men are "two timers"
and were operating a wrecking
yard in Waco. Complaints have
already been filed or will be filed
in Potter, Ellis, Milam, Burnet,
Lampasas, Tom Green, Wichita,
Harris, Bexar, Hale, Jefferson and
Archer counties.

Sheriff White, with the 12
counts already filed turned his
prisoner over to Postal Inspector
A. O. Curry and they are now
held in the jail at Wichita Falls
which is a federal prison, and
they will be tried first by the
federal authorities.

Sam Still Gets His From Texans

With no sign of relief in sight, Texas taxpayers kept feeding Uncle Sam's till during September to the tune of \$109,097-551, The University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported.

Total federal internal revenue collections for the State from July 1 through September 30 reached \$241,309,020 to exceed last year's itake for the same period by 5 per cent.

Income taxes slid 4 per cent loower than during the three-month period in the 1946-47 fiscal year, but all other kinds of taxes shoveled more money into government coffers. Employment taxes brought in 22 per cent more revenue withholding taxes were up 19 per cent, and miscellaneous taxes advanced 7 per cent.

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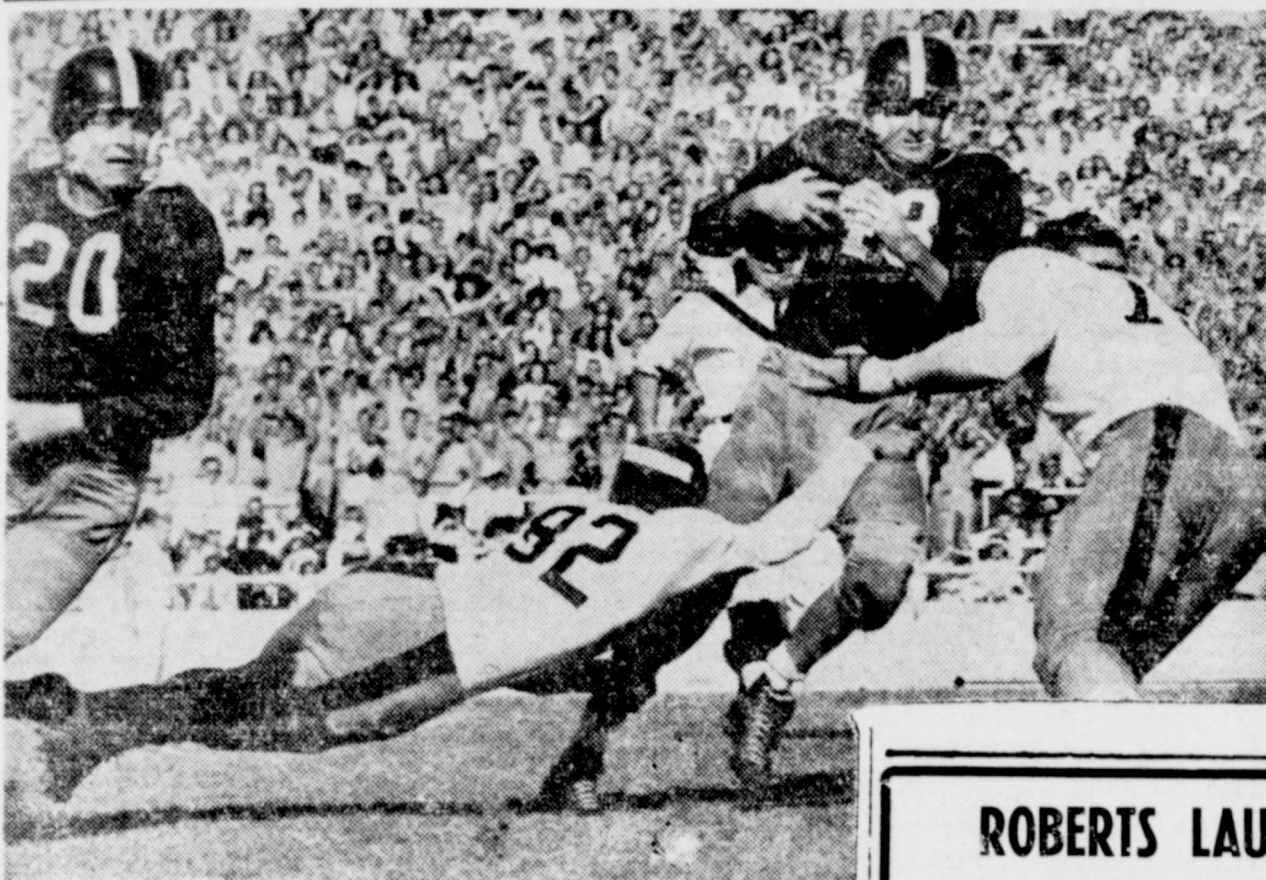

Baylor Bears Watching — Win While Building

WACO, Texas—Southwest Conference football fans don't know what to think of the Baylor Bears.

Poor little Baylor, which was supposed to build character this year while Bob Woodruff, the new coach, got firmly planted, won the first two games of the 1947 season with ease. That meant they already have done twice as well as last year when they took the opening contest and then dropped the next eight.

The lull in the Baylor schedule (no game was scheduled for the first week in October) found the Bears the talk of the league.

Licking Stephen F. Austin, a weak sister in Texas college football, was no achievement altho the Bruins did it 34-0. So when the Bayers went to Miami to play Harry Ghaul and Co. at Miami University, not even a relative of one of the squadmen ventured the forecast that the Bears would get anything more than the ride and a view of her country.

But Baylor gave Miami an 18-7 licking.

There's such a thing as being overlooked in football and it may be Baylor will cash in on it.

Woodruff, who bids fair to take away the league moaning title from such experts as Matty Bell of SMU and John Barnhill of Arkansas, didn't promise anything when he came here to succeed Frank Kimbrough as coach "Why," he said, "I never have even seen a Southwest Conference team play."

Bob opined that the Bayers given to him to play football with were pretty lean on fundamentals. "I'm having to spend time teaching the things all other teams already know. They can concentrate on plays and such," he said.

Woodruff, a tireless worker, appears to have done a pretty good job. They are calling him the most thorough coach ever to tutor football at Baylor.

He's a youngster as coaches go but has plenty of experience behind him. He was an assistant to Bob Neyland at Tennessee and later, when Barnhill became head coach, stayed on as line coach. He entered the Army in 1942 and served in the corps of engineers. Transferred to West Point he helped mold the national championship teams of 1944 and 1945

under Col. Earl Blaik.

Upon discharge from the Army, Woodruff went to Georgia Tech as line coach under Bobby Dodd.

He knows the bowl business pretty well. The 1939 Tennessee team was in the Rose Bowl. The Georgia Tech team last year played in the Oil Bowl at Houston.

But don't mention bowl games to Woodruff, please. Why it would scare the shirt off his back. "It takes football players to play in a bowl game," he would say. "Right now, I am teaching fundamentals."
