





Dear Friends:

The past week I have visited the three Scandinavian countries of Denmark, Norway and Sweden. After being in Germany it is re_ freshing to be here. Of course Sweden escaped the physical destruction of war entirely and as would be expected seems to be more prosperous than any country we have seen. While Denmark was occupied by the Germans, there was little actual fighting there. In Norway there was more real fighting and more destruction but even Norway shows few scars, and, compared with Ger_ many seems untouched.

However, the war has completely disrupted the government and economy of all these people. Their natural markets were shut off. Now their customers have nothing with yhich to buy their products and they in turn do not have the needed dollars to buy the things they need in the U.S. Before the war Germany and Great Britain bought most of the products of these nations. Now Germany has no buying power



Denmark can probably supply a large part of her own food as it is a great dairy and bacon producing country, but it cannot begin to supply itself with bread. Norway can supply itself with fish and have a substantial a_ mount for export, but it also lacks cereals. Swedens food production is better balanced and she could come nearer to feeding herself. She has much more tillable land than either Denmar, which is very small or Norway, where only three percent of the land is tillable. All of these countries need stock feed desperately. I visited a diary in Norway where even now they are feeding wood pulp which is ground and rolled out in sheets like paper. While they treat this with a slightly acid solution and feed i with other fee as a filler, I personally fed some of it dry to cows and saw them eat if. The reason for their se_ rious situation this early is the continued dry weather, which has burned up their pastures as well as other crops. At the moment. meat is plentiful in these countries because the farmers are selling their livestock, even though their total livestock production has not yet recovered from the effects of he war..

PUBLIC FAVORS STRONG ACTION IN GREECE Gallup Poll: How About Russia?

BY GEORGE GALLUP Director, American Institute of Public Opinion

PRINCETON N. J. Oct. 14 .-Secretary of State George C. Marshall's call for United Nations action on Greece is closely in tune with American public opinion.

A survey of public opinion completed by the institute only a few days before Secretary Marshall spoke at the U. N. Assembly a week ago shows that the major_ ity of American voters favor firm action in combating Russian influence in the Balkans, and that the possibility of Russia's developing atom bombs does not change attitudes substantially.

The Secretary disclosed that Washington will ask the U. N. to condemn activities of Russian satelite countries in Greece, to de_ mand that these activities cease and to set up a commission o aversee compliance.

Do these defands reflect the tone and spirit of American pubic sentiment? One answer is provided in the results of the institute's poll. Four alternatives were presented to voters from coast to coast and each was asked which alernative appealed most to him. The poll question and the vote
