BUMPER WHEAT CROP STILL POSSIBLE

WASHINGTON, D. C. Nov. 13. (AP) A bumper wheat
crop is still possible despite serious seeding delay in the
Great Plains, the Agriculture Department said today.

The Department's crop report said 25 percent of the
intended wheat acreage in Texas, Oklahoma, Nebraska,
Kansas, Colorado and New Mexico remained unseeded
November first because of critically dry weather.

HARRIMAN SAYS STOP AID SOVIET LOVERS

WASHINGTON, D. C. Nov. 13. (AP)—Secretary of
Commerce Averil Harriman testified he would favor
stopping at once any American aid to a nation which
in the future come under the Russian influence, in the
Foreign Affairs Committee hearing on emergency aid to
France, Italy and Austria.


