"King-Size Mesquite" Is World's Larges.:

American Forrestry Association Says "This Is The World's Largest Tree" By Weldon D. Woodson

"In 1881, Charlie and Andy Smith journeyed by ox cart from Tennessee to Texas in search of a permanent home. Two years later, meat control authority, but ex_ they settled in Coryell County, near Gatesville, on a piece of land pressed the opinion that there was at the foot of a hill. > "But in September of 1940, the American Forrestry Association launched a campaign to located the largest living specimens of American trees. The writer of this article-a cousin of Allen Smith, and therefore, long familiar with the "big mesquite"-sent in the measurements of the tree to the association. It was definitely recognized as the "WORLD'S LARGEST" and took its place in the Hall of Fame for Trees in Washington, D. C.

> As Mesquites go, it is a giant, indeed. Its measurements are: circumference at 41/2 feet, 10 feet 91/2 inches; spread, 65 feet; height, 60 feet. At one time, states Alln Smith, it had a limb spread of 75 feet, but a high wind broke off some of the large limbs."






