North Camp Hood Is To Be Dismantled: Says Fort Sam

Coming from the Fourth Army Headquarters, Fort Sam Houston, San Antonio, is this release, which at least will release a lot of the "hopes" that have been held by Coryell County people, one way or the other.

North Camp Hood, is to be dismantled. The Gatesville establishment, located 19 miles north of Camp Hood has served the purpose for which it was temporarily established in 1941 and 1942....

The Department of the Army recently approved the disposal of all remaining facilities at North Camp Hood, with the exception of certain utility systems which will be retained for possible further use....

The remaining structures, after 800 had been sold, temporary in nature, having been constructed for a contemplated use of approximately five years do not meet the requirements for inclusion in the plans of the peacetime army.

Removal of the facilities at North Camp Hood will not affect the status of Camp Hood proper which is scheduled for permanent utilization by the Department of the Army. All land will be retained as a part of Camp Hood for future training requirements and certain portion will be outleased for grazing purposes to insure full utilization.

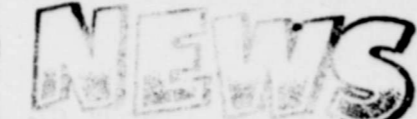

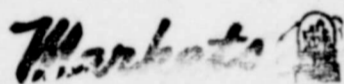

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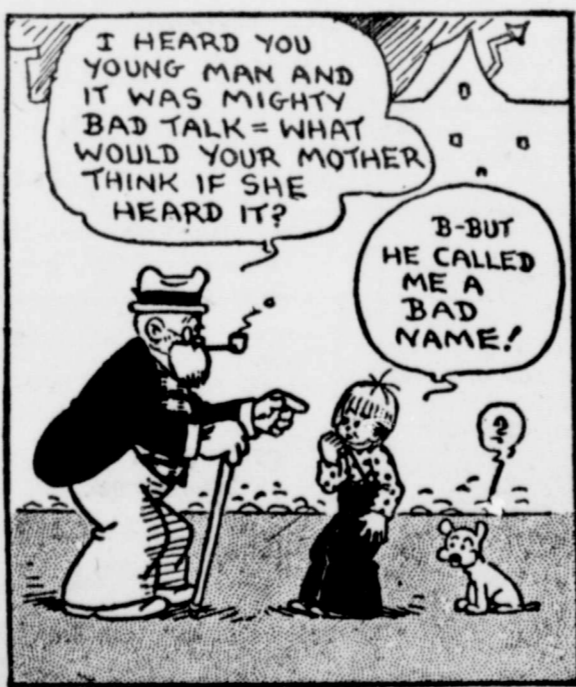

**A & M TRUSTEES
OK TERMS OF
BLUEBONNETT**

By Charles K. Boatner
COLLEGE STATION, Jan. 10. Deed to \$1,950,318 worth of land, buildings and equipment in McLennan and Coryell Counties probably will be delivered to Texas A&M College by the government without cost to the college Jan. 30, at a ceremony at McGregor.

The contract of sale at a 100 percent cash discount under this public benefit allowance was approved for the signature of Board Chairman Rollie White of Brady at a meeting of the board recently at College Station.

The college has been negotiating with the Far Assets Administration for more than two years for the land and improvements which constitute the wartime Bluebonnet Ordnance Plant.

The directors appropriated \$150,000 as a revolving fund for the properties which they named A&M Bluebonnet Farms and \$50,000 more as the initial fiscal year operating fund.

Payment for the properties will be made through 25 years of operating them as public services. After that the college may sell or otherwise dispose of the lands as it sees fit.

Gradual Development
D. W. Williams, vice-president in charge of agriculture, said development of the farms will be gradual and will include agricultural research and demonstration and educational training.

Terms of the contract provide that the college may out-lease portions of the property as long as net cash proceed from such leases are paid to the government. Total acreage of the properties is 17,483.37.

An area of 4,500 acres of rich Denton and San Saba series soils has been set aside tentatively for production of pure strain seeds and feeds, production of pure strain hybrid seed corn and the rapid expansion of basic seeds stocks developed in experiment station work in other parts of the southwest.

Four 500-acre tracts, two sets of duplicates, have been designated for demonstration farms, showing side-by-side results of fertilization, rotations, soil improvement crops and supplementary irrigation as compared with standard practices.

Approximately 6,000 acres of rolling land have been designated for range livestock and management, with bottom lands to be used for rotation pastures to supplement native grazing lands.

Newton Acting Chairman
Another 2,000 acres will be used for experimental and development work with sheep and goats. Large scale feeding demonstrations and experiments are to be conducted on a 2,000-acre plot which also is held to be the logical location for agricultural terminal training program which the college hopes to develop.

A final area of 2,000 acres of deep soil is proposed for school farm use. This location also is suitable for horticultural research and development.

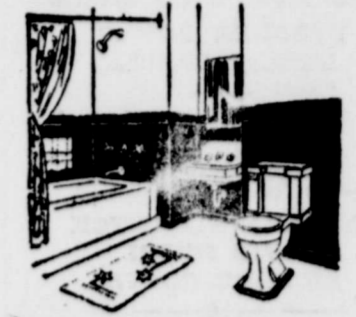

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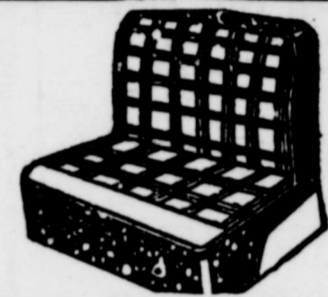
