Face Fuel Crisis Gatesville Homes By End of Week

AUSTIN, Feb. 4. — (AP) — Four hundred Gatesville homes will be out of butane gas by the end of this week, State Representative Sid Gregory said today.

Gregory said retail butane distributors have advised him they will not have sufficient supplies to carry Gatesville customers through the winter.

Gregory said he was in Austin to confer with Railroad Commissioner William J. (Bill) Murray, who is chairman of the Governors Emergency Fuel Commission. But Murray was out of town.

"I'm told the commission has quit functioning," Gregory said.

However, a spokesman for Mr. Murray's office said the commission is still operating. Mr. Murray was unable to locate any companies the past two days who had any butane reserves left", the spokesman said adding:

"Mr. Murray said from the start there wouldn't be enough butane to take care of everybody" The Emergency Fuel Commis-

Here's a good warming punch the crowd will enjoy, particularly if the party falls on a cold night. To 1 gallon of sweet cider add 3 teaspoons all-spice; 1½ cup of brown sugar; 3 teaspoons of whole cloves; dash of salt; dash of cayenne.

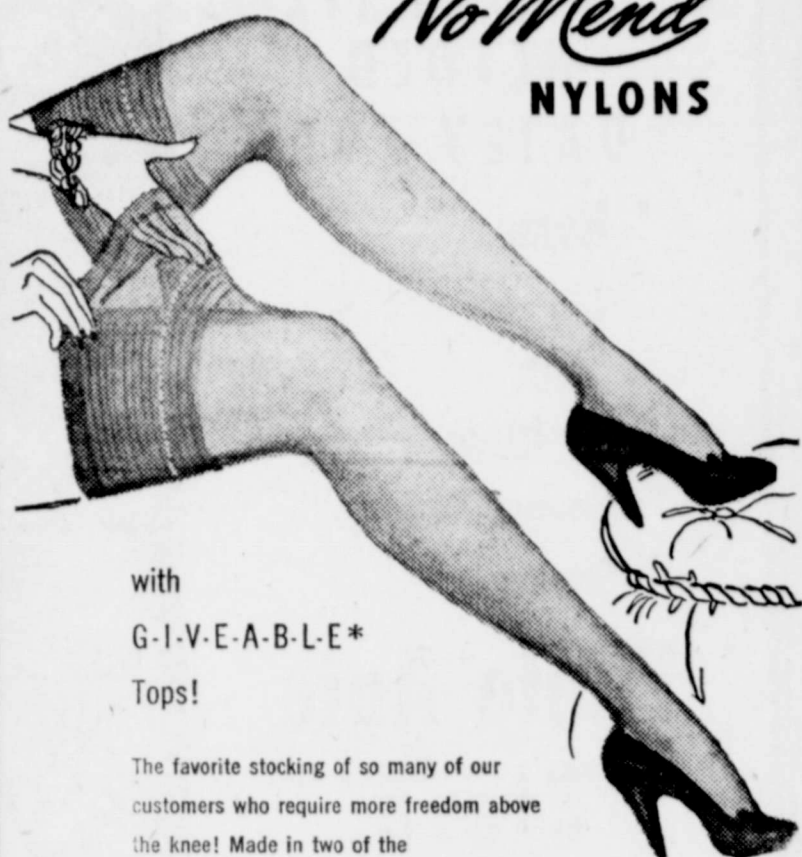

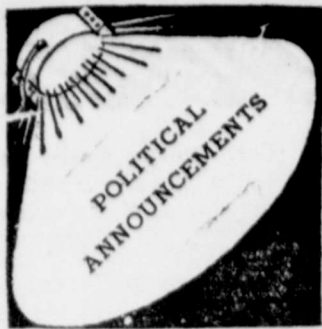

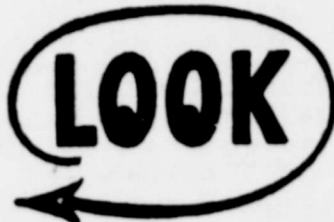

End of India's Salt Tax Fails To Help Poor

NEW DELHI—(P)—Abolition of the tax on salt, an impost by the former British rulers of India which this country's patriots fought as a badge of servitude, has brought little benefit to the poor man, to whom availability of salt means life itself.

Dr. Syma Prasad Mookerji, minister of industry and supply told the constituent assembly that salt production remains 10 per cent below the country's needs, and the price actually has risen in some areas since the heavy tax was removed.

Although patriots sacrificed their lives and endured imprisonment to fight the salt tax as an injustice especially to the poor, Mookerji said "in areas where supplies are deficient the benefits of the abolition of the salt tax have gone solely to the producers and middlemen."

The tax represented two thirds of the retail purchase price, and its abolition was one of the first actions of the free Indian government.

Large quantities of salt must be eaten by the people to compensate for the loss of bodily salt in India's heat, and it is an important item in the poor man's food budget.

The salt tax was a heritage from the rule by the old East India Company, whose ships arriving in India carried salt as ballast, sold it to the people who were forbidden to manufacture their own.

Salt manufacture later became a British-Indian government monopoly, and people including Mahatma Gandhi were imprisoned for evaporating sea water to obtain tax free salt.

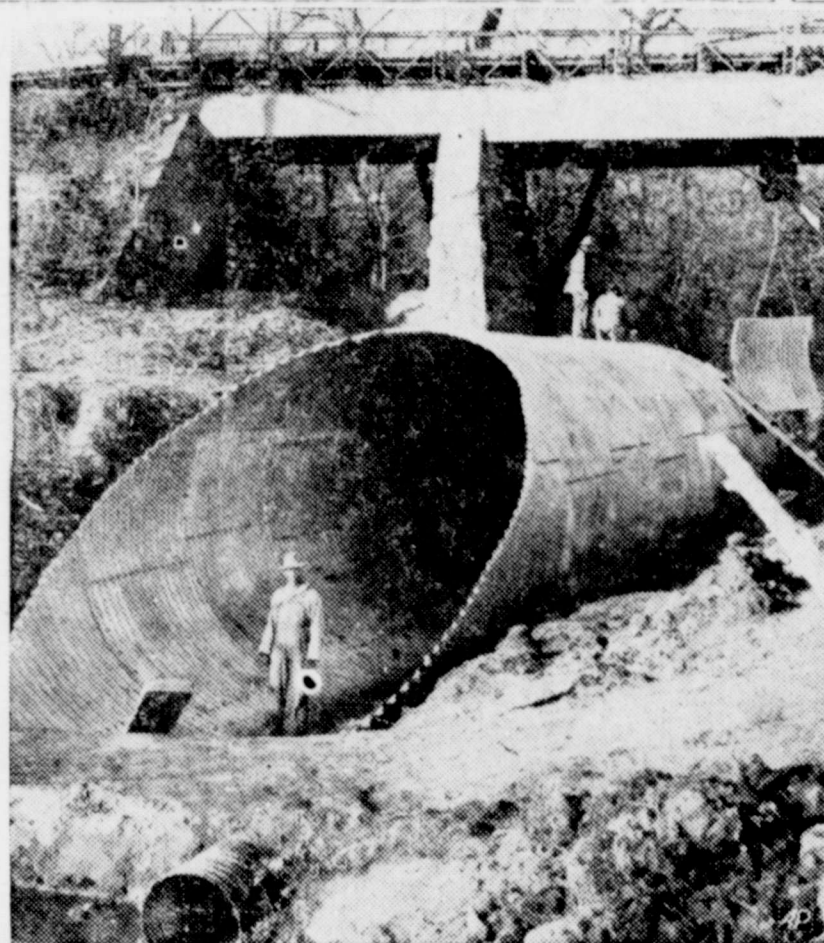
