Texas Farmers' Income Sets Record in 1947

AUSTIN, Feb. 7.—Final tabulations Saturday indicated that Texas farmers received nearly \$22,000,000,000—a new record—for their crops in 1947.

University of Texas bureau of business research analysts report that the farm cash income last year was 47 per cent higher than in 1946, with all products except oats, mohair, wool, poultry, eggs, fresh vegetable and peanuts, registering substantial gains.

The bureau estimated the total income of the states' farmers at \$1,838,387,000.

Cotton was the big money-maker for the Texas farmer, bringing in slightly more than \$500,000,000. Cattle sales totaled \$326,000,000 and wheat brought \$252,000,000.

Income dropped off in two districts—the trans-Pecos area and the Lower Rio Grande Valley—but increases were recorded in all other districts. The largest gain was 152 per cent on the southern high plains.

FLOYD HODGES WINS 2nd AND EIGHTH IS WON BY A. J. BLANCHARD AT HOUSTON

Gatesville boys, with their pigs and calves did right well at the Houston Fat Stock Show & Livestock Exposition.

Floyd Hodges, Jonesboro perennial winner, came off with the second prize in his calf's class, the 851-1000 lb. Aberdeen-Angus in the Boy's Livestock show at Houston. His calf sold at a 54c top, which adds to a tremendous lot of folding money.

A. J. Blanchard, Gatesville, placed eighth, with his 220-290 lb. class of Duroc-Jersey division in the Boy's Pig Show.

The two Smith boys, who captured calves last year in the calf scramble, put them back on the auction block and got 50c plus for these calves.

And, Melvin Hempel's Angus, according to County Agent W. P. Graham, got 6th—didn't get this

in the release from Houston, and Billy Pruitt's Hereford collected for 35th place.

Clarence Smith's calf scramble calf won 15th, among this class of stock, and this 15th is among the 10 per cent, since 15% of these "calf scramble" calves were exhibited in the show.

Mr. Graham said the recent drop in commodity markets cut the prices that would have been paid for all classes of stock, since some of the largest bidders had lost most of their shirts, when cotton dropped \$6 a bale in two days and other market prices dropped accordingly. It kind of chilled the big money bidders. Prices paid, however, were especially good, and ranged from 41c to 54c per pound, and a lot of these animals had a lot of pounds.

CANBERRA—(AP)—Ten thousand penguins clustered around photographer David Eastman when he descended rocky cliffs on Heard Island to film the domestic life of a penguin rookery for the Australian Antarctic expedition.

The Department of External Affairs said in a report on the expedition that savage skua gulls hovered overhead waiting to pounce on baby penguins separated from their parents while Eastman was taking shots.

The landing on the island, 2,000 miles south-west of Fremantle, was made during a few hours' calm weather in 18 consecutive days.

Landed equipment included a bulldozer, 50 tons of lighter stores and more than 200 drums of oil which were floated ashore.

NATIONAL SAFETY COUNCIL

A safety check may save your neck!

That was the terse advice offered today by W. J. Elliott, Chief of the Texas Highway Patrol, in urging motorists to keep the safety equipment of their cars in tip-top-shape.

"We are cooperating with safety authorities throughout the nation in a 'Learn and Obey Traffic Laws' program during February," Chief Elliott said. "The law requires that your car have certain equipment for safety, and it's there when the manufacturer delivers the car. But it is up to the driver to keep it working properly."

He said National Safety Council figures show that 18 per cent of all vehicles involved in fatal accidents are defective. A recent nationwide police check-up revealed that one out of three cars are defective, and one out of seven with bad brakes.

The most safety equipment was listed as brakes, lights, mirror, windshield wiper, horn and safety glass. Many of these items will wear out or become damaged with use, and the motorist must see that they are maintained in good condition.

"Periodic inspection by trained mechanics is the answer," he said.

U. S. Relinquishes 7,600 German Homes

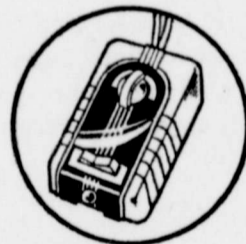

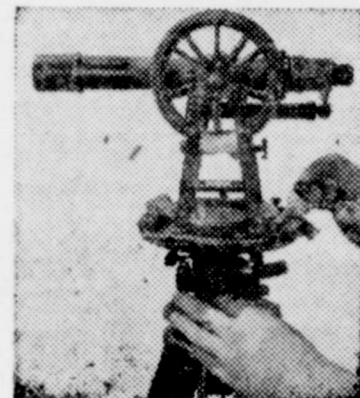

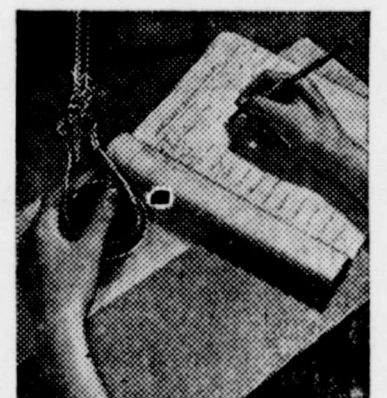

Irreconcilable

Russia today is firmly opposed to almost everything and anything that America suggests. There is one possible exception, and that is: aid to Russia. Since Russia's cross-purposes with us are so evident, it is natural to ask why she got that way. Why does she find it convenient, ever to go out of her way, to oppose America?

It is not because we did not help Russia enough during the war. Matter of fact, we helped Russia then to the extent of \$11,681,000,000. This was lend-lease, of which we will expect to get little or nothing in return. What we got from Russia in reverse lend-lease, compared with the more than \$11½ billions that went her way, was little more than 1-500 of one billion — only \$2,213,000.

Disguised Purposes

Then, when UNRRA decided to accumulate a big fund to help needy nations, America gave 70 per cent of the total. Our part was \$2,279,000,000. The Russians did not put up anything. Yet Russia has helped to manage UNRRA. Actually, Russia has so manipulated the aid to several European countries that the people there thought they were being helped by Russia, rather than by America.

Now, the Marshall plan calls for additional help for European countries. It proposes that America use from \$15 to \$22 billions in an effort to get those countries on a self-sustaining basis. Not only does Russia oppose this aid, but she has inspired the creation of the Communist International. This organization operates in nine different countries and is dedicated to complete opposition to anything that resembles American policy in international affairs.

Good Neighbors?

Just why this continued opposition from Russia? In my opinion, it comes definitely from the fact that Communism is irreconcilable to the American way of life. If it be observed that Communism did not offer opposition during the war, it may also be observed that Communist leaders temporarily went underground while America was helping Russia stave off disaster.

As soon as the war was over, as soon as lend-lease quit flowing to Russia, the Communists began to oppose every move for peaceful stabilization. They wanted defeated countries to remain defeated. Peaceful and prosperous countries find Communism unattractive, indeed. But Russia has now solidified her opposition to peace. Russia offers long-range opposition to America's desire for peace, through her International.

This is the answer: Communism is antagonistic to almost every basic principle in the American way of life. It is opposed to religion, to the sacredness of marriage, to private ownership of property, to freedom of the individual, to freedom of the press and of speech. The Russians deny that we can be their neighbors. They fear a demonstration of the superiority of the American way—a brand of democracy that does not need to call up an International to protect itself.

Get the children off to school before you attempt your reconversion program.

Another for girls with straight hair is the side part which runs from the forehead to the nape of the neck, the hair on the full side is gathered together in one big sleek bun and placed wherever it looks best. The other side is set in one curl that is anchored to the side of the head with pins. There are any number of attractive hairstyles which can be concocted. Certainly, one can be found that is unusual and just suits YOU.

If you are lacking in imagination, turn to your newspaper and fashion magazine advertisements and select a few interesting hairstyles worn by models. Adopt one or two that you think may look well on you and assemble your combs, brushes and water and start to work.

Your hair should be shampooed before this big beauty event. However, if you are ill with cold and your hair is oily and in need of washing, use a dry shampoo to clean it before you start your hair creations. However, don't use water to set it if you do use the dry powder shampoo.

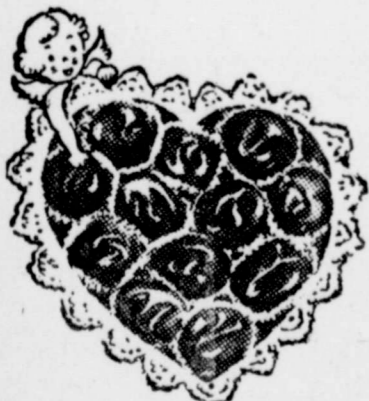
