#### European Sketch

A Midwestern acquaintance of mine recently gave to a group of businessmen what he called a report of "a roller skate trip over a very large subject." Sterling Morton, Chicago banker and industrialist, was reporting on a seven-weeks' trip to Europe. His remarks seemed to me worthy of a larger audience. This recent trip, according to Mr. Morton, was no V.I.P. excursion. (The Very Important People sometimes arrive at conclusions that have been planned by their hosts in advance.) Actually, Mr. Morton rented a small French car and drove it 2,500 miles, talking to everybody along the way. Because he speaks French fluently, our Midwesterner was taken for a Frenchman when outside France, for an Englishman when in France—but hardly for an American at any time.

#### Peace-time Damag.

In France, Mr. Morton reported the cost of living up ten times over 1937, with wages having increased six times. "How an elevator operator, for instance, can live on 8,000 francs a month is a mystery. Or how a laborer can be content on the official ration of two-fifths of a pound of bread a day. Things are very much out of balance." However, Mr. Morton sees France on the road to recovery, in a physical way.

BUT: "France is cursed with government employees. There always were droves of them—now there are hordes! One former Maqui suggested the way to improve conditions was to machine gun half the 'fonctionnaires'! Even Senator Byrd doesn't go that far! . . . French production figures are highly encouraging. If governmental expenses could be cut down, the printing of money stopped, confidence and prosperity would soon return."

#### Help Them Produce

Of the British: "One can have nothing but admiration for . . . what they went through so steadfastly. That they should be afflicted, in peace, with a government which has done, psychologically, financially and commercially, probably as much damage, is a cruel tragedy. Only the miracles of socialistic planning, applied to a fertile island underlaid with coal and surrounded by seas teeming with fish, could bring about a situation in which the people are cold and hungry."

On loans and gifts: "I think it would be pouring money down a rat hole to make any more loans to governments, yet I feel that we should, for our own sakes, help those who are willing to help themselves. My idea would be to make loans direct to private producers on very easy terms and for productive purposes only. . . . We can't stop Communism by giving corrupt or inefficient or minority governments the means of remaining in office."

"We can stop it by building up the productive capacity of the threatened nations. . . . I doubt that Europe's economy will be healthy until Germany again is producing and consuming. . . . Britain, France, Italy, yes, Germany, too—help them to produce again. That is the way to bring stability and peace."

Walter Robert, pianist with international reputation in chamber music, played a solo recital Thursday night at Scott Hall that rewarded well the audience who braved the weather. It was not what was in Mr. Robert's fingers that counted but what was in his head. The fingers, to be sure, were usually obedient and evoked a persuasive tone. The revelation was the artist's return to urtexts, original metronome markings and the traditions known only to immense scholarship.

too enlightening, as I have been on Mr. Poage's staff for only some three weeks. Working in political circles though, is not exactly new to me, as I worked for the State of Texas for quite a while after leaving my home (Cameron) to enter the business world; and, very proudly do I still maintain my residence in the 11th District. At the present time my husband is stationed in Washington as a Naval Officer, U. S. N. Naval Medical Center, this giving me the opportunity to work and thereby see what makes politics in the Nation's Capitol "tick".

Shortly before beginning work here, and through the generosity of Congressman and Mrs. Poage, both of whom I have known for many years, I had the privilege of hearing President Truman make his "State of The Union" address before Congress on January 7. The gallery seat that I had was an excellent one and was very near the Diplomatic Corps and the White House Sections. I also had a very good view of the Speaker's stand, the President and his Cabinet. The entire occasion was rather breath taking, and certainly one that I shall always remember. Several evenings later, I attended an Open House gathering, and there met several of the Cabinet Members, their wives, and other dignitaries. So I have been fortunate in these incidents to observe and obtain impressions of Washington and Capitol Hill.

I think it might be interesting to most of you to know just what a typical and ordinary day in a Congressman's office might, and usually does, involve. Upon arriving in the office each morning, we find Mr. Poage has been working for some time opening and reading the mail. (Incidentally, there is not one letter he misses reading—in the event some of you people back home might think that Congressmen never see their letters—I can assure you that he reads them all and answers them all). There are letters of every type received, covering every subject; letters from not only his Congressional District but also letters from people throughout the United States who write him concerning legislation he has introduced. Letters regarding veterans' cases; immigration; post office and rural route matters; rural electrification problems; requests for Farmers Bulletins and Agricultural Yearbooks; Vocational Agricultural School problems; pending bills in Congress; requests for copies of bills; numerous other subjects, inquiries and requests. The Congressman begins answering mail, receives visitors, and telephone calls are taken and made. At ten A. M. he attends Committee meetings, which usually last until noon, at which time Congress convenes. After adjournment in late afternoons, the Congressman returns to his office for more dictation, receives more visitors until late evening.

This is, as I see it, the daily life of a Congressman whose efforts seem tireless in trying to get things done, and getting things done, for his people in the 11th Congressional District.

It is very good to have the boss back this week, and to get a report on you folks back home, so in his letter he will see you next week. Sincerely,

Bach's unaccompanied Concerto for Clavichord in Italian Style sounded as if it were played on one. For this Mr. Robert managed a tintinnabulatory touch, set up a clear-cut, loud-soft, double manual level of dynamics and pedaled with consummate adroitness the soft echoes of Bach's favorite instrument. Still the concerto was more than a tour de force of simulated clavier effects. It was rippling, polyphonic Bach as it was intended to sound.

More dash accuracy and tonal brilliance have been given Beethoven's "Appassionata" Sonata but seldom as cogent a musical logic. The first movement had its quota of feeling and vitality with no pounding or blurring. The andante was a gem of tender lyricism without excessive sentimentality. The pace was steady and metrical without seeming rushed.

A notable command of more modern sonorities was exhibited in Debussy's "La Puerta del Vino" from the Second Book of Preludes, which was extraordinarily expressive Debussy-playing if not exactly virtuosic. The slight Toccata from "Pour le Piano" was the other item by the French composer. There was much to commend in Brahms' Variations on an Original Theme, Opus 21, although the work is now more interesting for its execrable technicalities than for its music.

Digging into conservatory repertoire Mr. Robert found an unexpectedly winning piece in Johann Nepomuk Hummel's D Minor Eeplet, Opus 74. This highly talented protege of Mozart and contemporary of Beethoven was melodically resourceful and owned a captivating galante idiom. The Septet is predominantly a piano piece with a curiously original and darkly-colored obbligato. Mr. Robert drew his instrument-ists from the Dallas Symphony and they were Joseph Hawthorne violinist; Aaron Shapinsky, cellist; Victor Gerard, bassist; Alex Fielder, flutist; Walter Kessler, oboist, and Harold Yelton, hornist, and all played well.

The prettiness and shallow facility of the Septet wore thin ere its four movements were completed, but there was much show of appreciation. The second movement, a menuetto, had to be re-

peated. A Chopin mazurka was the encore.

The presentation was part of the series offered by Mrs. Z. Rozan, who conducted the Municipal Concerts in the Southwestern towns. Philip Williams, the Dallas violinist, will be heard March 2. Mr. Robert formerly of North Texas State College, of Denton, is now on the faculty of the University of Indiana.—The Dallas Morning News.

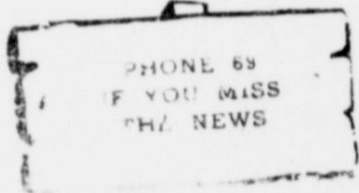

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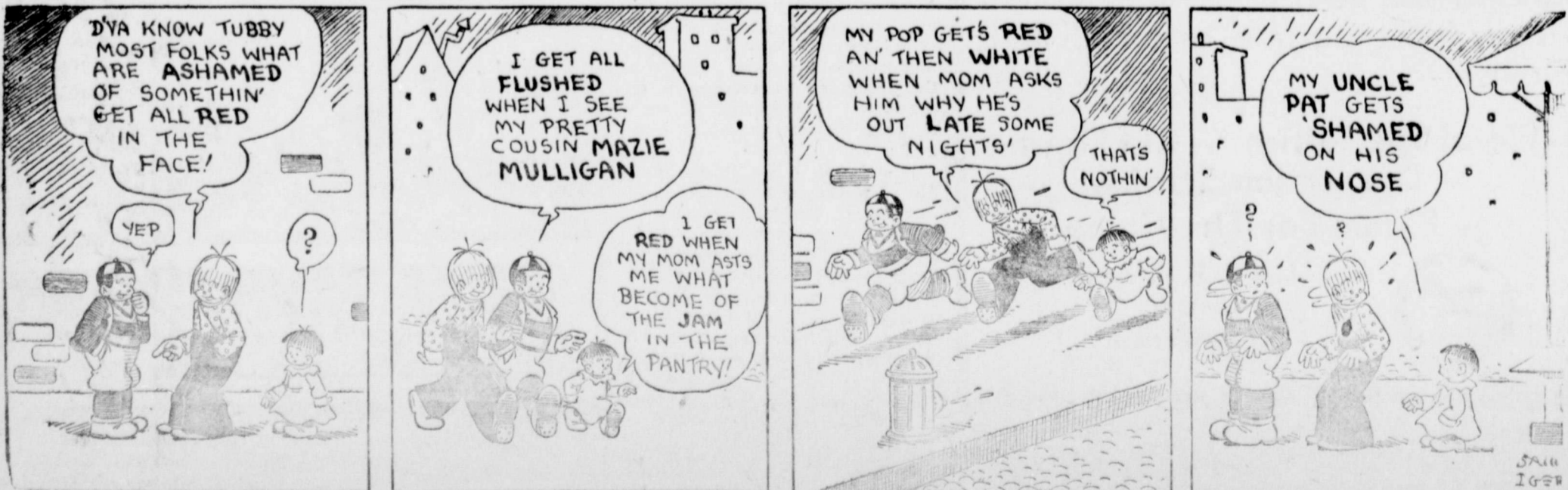

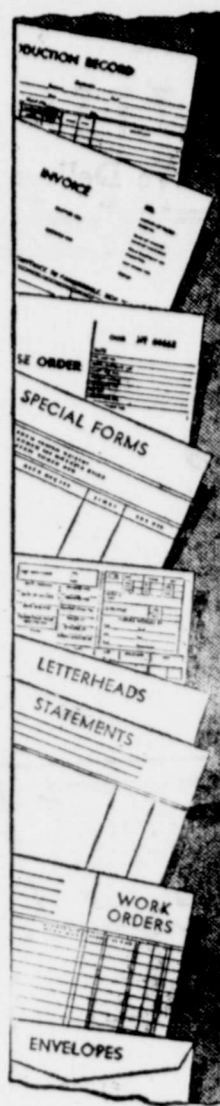

### SAFE DRIVING —BY— NATIONAL SAFETY COUNCIL

If you want to do a good turn for yourself and your fellow motorists, learn the proper way to make a right turn while driving your car.

The law on making a right turn was explained today by W. J. Elliott, Chief of the Texas Highway Patrol, in cooperation with a nationwide "Learn and Obey Traffic Laws" program during February.

The program seeks to reduce the huge motor vehicle accident toll by familiarizing the public with traffic laws and the necessity for obeying them.

"A right turn is one of the simplest of maneuvers in an automobile, yet turning errors are reported in about 5 per cent of all accidents," Chief Elliott said.

- He emphasized these points:
1. Keep as close as possible to the right edge of the roadway both before and after turning. Don't swing out.
  2. Don't forget to make the hand signal well in advance of the turn.
  3. Anticipate the turn far enough in advance so that you can be in the proper lane. This means keeping your mind on your driving.
  4. Keep close to the right after turning to cause a minimum of interference with the traffic flow you are entering.

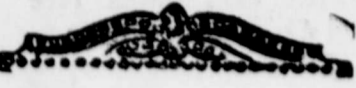
