



An audit has been completed of the books and records of the Coryell County Vocational School. The office procedure was reviewed and accounting records and other supporting evidence were test checked in accordance with approved auditing practice. The files of the individual Veterans in training were inspected. All deposits to and withdrawals from the depository were verified. Each check was examined as to payee, amount, and endorsement.


